LAYING OF THE FOUNDATION STONE OF NEW BUILDINGS FOR NEW ASIA COLLEGE

A Ceremony of the Laying of the Foundation Stone of New Asia College's Buildings on campus in Shatin was held on 30th June. His Excellency the Governor and Chancellor of the University, Sir Murray MacLehose, officiated. The Ceremony was attended by Mr. J.M. Addis, British Ambassador to Peking; Dr. the Hon. Sir Yuet-keung Kan, Chairman of the University Council; Mr. Tsufa Lee, Chairman of the Board of Governors of New Asia College; Dr. the Hon. Sir Sidney Gordon, Member of the University Council; Mr. E.R.

Udal, Member of the University and Polytechnic Grants Committee; Mr. S.F. Bailey, Secretary of the University and Polytechnic Grants Committee; the Hon. W. Szeto, University Architect; Dr. Choh-Ming Li, Vice-Chancellor of the University; Dr. C.T. Yung, President of Chung Chi College; and Mr. T.C. Cheng, President of United College. Other distinguished guests included Government officials of the New Territories, prominent leaders of the community, architects and contractors of the College's new campus.

The Ceremony began with an address by Dr. Y.P. Mei, President of New Asia College, who thanked Sir Murray for officiating at the Ceremony, and the Government and the taxpayers of Hong Kong for their contribution to the building of the campus. He recalled the difficult circumstances under which the College was founded twenty-three years ago. Sir Murray pointed out in his speech that the laying of the foundation stone of New Asia was not only a milestone in the history of the College but also an important stage in the overall development of the University. The Governor expressed the hope that the University would continue to strive for true scholarship and serve the people of Hong Kong.

After the speech, Sir Murray laid the Foundation Stone for the Administration Building and a souvenir was presented to him by President Mei. Guests were invited to a reception at the Benjamin Franklin Centre of the University.

The single Foundation Stone which was laid in the Administration Building symbolically represents the five buildings of New Asia College, namely, Administration Building, Arts & Commerce Building, Staff/Student

Amenities Building, the Library and the Student Hostel. The construction work for the buildings began early this year, and the total cost, not counting the site, amounts to 13 million Hong Kong dollars. Construction is scheduled for completion in early 1973.

Opening Remarks by President Y.P. Mei

We are here today to lay the single foundation stone for the five buildings of New Asia College. It is a great honour for us that His Excellency the Governor and Chancellor of our University has kindly consented to officiate at this function. On behalf of New Asia College I would like to welcome His Excellency and thank him for his presence with us on this auspicious occasion.

The foundation stone which is to be laid will also serve as a milestone marking another important stage in the development of our College. On such an occasion our thoughts inevitably turn to the founders and the benefactors of the College. The eminent Chinese scholar, Dr. Ch'ien Mu, founded New Asia College twenty-three years ago to perpetuate the values of traditional Chinese culture and of academic freedom. The fervour and devotion to these ideals on the part of Dr. Ch'ien and his associates in those early years touched everyone who knew them.

While we are all rejoicing over the prospect of moving out to this beautiful new campus, we should keep reminding ourselves, lest we forget, of these founding ideals and purposes of the College. May we strive to keep them alive and viable in our new home.

Many are the benefactors of New Asia College, but I shall take time to single out only the Yale-in-China Association for special mention. Without the moral and material support of Yale-in-China, the beginning years of New Asia would have been even more arduous than they were.

Today, and for the past nine years, we have also been enjoying the very substantial support of the Hong Kong Government. It is to the Government, and indeed the taxpayers of Hong Kong, that we must express gratitude for this new campus. The construction cost of these five principal buildings, not counting the site, amounts to more than 13 million dollars. We humbly hope our performance will justify the generosity shown us.

Finally, I wish to thank all of you for your generosity in honouring us this afternoon with your presence.

I now have great pleasure in asking His Excellency to address us.

Sir Murray MacLehose's Address

When President Mei asked me to officiate on this very happy occasion I accepted with alacrity. I like coming to The Chinese University in any case, and this is a great day in the consolidation of the University as well as in the life of New Asia College.

Might I say what a happy coincidence it is that makes it possible for Mr. Addis, the British Ambassador in Peking, to be present.

New Asia has come a long way since it started in 1949 with a few students in a flat in Kowloon. On its second site in Farm Road it steadily expanded. Now it is about to take its rightful and final place with United and Chung Chi on this University campus. I do wish to congratulate President Mei on this extraordinary progress.

And may I say that the College does not seem to me to have lost by being last, as it has still obtained a superb site. With such a view to look at its members will need to concentrate to keep their eyes on their books.

I must pay my tribute to the planning committees, the architects, and the contractors. Also, as your Chancellor, I feel we should commend the Government and the taxpayer who are paying the entire cost of the five major buildings to be built here.

As a hardened Civil Servant I have a weakness for making lists. One of my lists is of things in Hong Kong which are not only fairly good, but which are absolutely good and can stand up to comparisons with anywhere in the world. High on this list is the construction and the concept of this Chinese University of Hong Kong. A magnificent idea, a magnificent site, and splendidly executed under Dr. Li's leadership.

What purpose do we want it to serve?

For my part I want it to serve two causes: that of Learning and that of Hong Kong.

Hong Kong desperately needs learned people of all ages. We have already plenty of enthusiasm, plenty of enterprise, plenty of hard work, commercial instinct, even compassion. But to turn Hong Kong into the place we want it to be, and to obtain the resources to do this, we need the help, at all levels, of people with the skills and knowledge and comprehension that can only be acquired from a basis of learning: the sort of learning that can be acquired here.

And what a lot there is for such people to do in Hong Kong and how short we are of them, whether in industry, the professions, business, the places of teaching or Government.

But learning must also be an end in itself. I reject the sausage machine concept of a University whose only object is to turn out types in short supply. Learning and knowledge for its own sake is what gives a university inspiration, authority and repute and gives it the ability to command the respect of those who learn in it.

And if the pursuit of learning for its own sake involves some people wanting to push doors marked "pull" or walk up escalators that are going down, I suggest that this may be regarded with a benevolent eye — within reason.

In laying this foundation stone I initiate the final event of the construction and consolidation of this University. The arrival of New Asia College on the Campus will enable it to make its own creative and distinctive contribution. But it will also facilitate the necessary pooling of resources within the whole University, including the coordination of administrative functions, and the integration of academic programmes.

Both as Chancellor and Governor it is of this University — completed by the arrival of New Asia College — that I think today, of the great contribution it can make to the world of letters, and of the contribution it can make to our Hong Kong where so much has been accomplished against such odds, and where so much remains to be done — and can be done with the help of the learning and the wisdom that only higher education can give.

PROF. S.S. HSUEH ACCEPTS VICE-CHANCELLORSHIP OF NANYANG UNIVERSITY

Dr. S.S. Hsueh, Professor of Government and Public Administration of the University, has been invited by Nanyang University in Singapore to accept an appointment as Vice-Chancellor to succeed Dr. Rayson L. Huang, who is assuming duty as Vice-Chancellor of the University of Hong Kong in September this year. The services of Prof. Hsueh are being seconded as an expression of co-operation between this University and Nanyang University, thus strengthening the academic relations between Hong Kong and Singapore.

Prof. Hsueh obtained his B.A. honours degree from Yenching University in Peking and a doctorate from the Graduate Institute of International Studies of the University of Geneva, and conducted post-doctoral research at Oxford University.

He was a member of the Department of Economics and Political Science at the University of Hong Kong from 1956 to 1963 before leaving for the Philippines to be Assistant Secretary General of the Eastern Regional Organization for Public Administration (EROPA) and Visiting Professorial Lecturer at the Graduate School of Public Administration of the State University of the Philippines from 1963 to 1966.

He returned to Hong Kong in 1966 to take up a new appointment as Reader in Public Administration at United College. In 1968 he became the first Chair in Government and Public Administration of the University, concurrently serving as Associate Director of the Institute of Chinese Studies. He served as Dean of the Faculty of Commerce and Social Science from 1969 to early 1972.

Prof. Hsueh has written and edited several books and seminar reports and is author of numerous research articles published in Asia, Europe and the U.S.A.

Prof. Hsueh has been active in educational circles, and is serving as a member of the Committee of Management of the Centre of Asian Studies of the University of Hong Kong, President of the Southeast Asian Social Science Association, Chairman of the Development Administration Group of Asia, member of the Executive Council of the Eastern Regional Organization for Public Administration, and academic alternate member of the Administrative Board of the Association of Southeast Asian Institutions of Higher Learning (ASAIHL).

Prof. Hsueh will leave for Singapore in September.

In May this year, the former University Grants Committee expanded its organization and was re-named the University and Polytechnic Grants Committee. Sir Kenneth was appointed by His Excellency the Governor to serve on the Committee, and hence resigned from the United College Board of Trustees.

After Sir Kenneth's resignation, the Chinese Unofficial Members of the Executive and Legislative Councils nominated Dr. the Hon. P.C. Woo to serve on the Board, which has elected him its Chairman and representative of the Board on the Council of the University.

Dr. the Hon. P.C. Woo, a prominent lawyer and scholar, has had an outstanding record of public services in Hong Kong.

- The Dedication Service of Wen Lin Tang by the Rt. Rev. Gilbert Baker, Bishop of Hong Kong and Macao, was held on 15th July at Wen Lin Tang, a new student hostel built for Chung Chi College by Sheng Kung Hui Diocese of Hong Kong and Macao. President C.T. Yung unveiled the plaque of the hostel. A tea reception in the hostel followed the ceremony.
- The Board of Governors of Chung Chi College has announced that Dr. C.T. Yung has accepted its invitation to extend his term of office as President of the College for two years until 30th September, 1975.
- New Asia College held the 21st Graduation Ceremony for its undergraduate departments and the 16th Graduation Ceremony for its Research Institute at the College Auditorium on 1st July. Dr. Y.P. Mei, College President, and Dr. Andrew T. Roy, Vice-President of Chung Chi College, addressed the assembly. There were altogether 186 graduates from the undergraduate departments and 5 from the Research Institute.
- The 18th Graduation Ceremony of Chung Chi College was held on 11th June, in the College Chapel. Dr. Daniel C.W. Tse, President of Hong Kong Baptist


