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## A DEGREE IS NOT A LICENCE

(The following is the text of a speech delivered by the Chancellor, H.E. the Governor Sir David Trench, at the Third Congregation for the conferment of degrees and award of diplomas on October 16.

'Today the Chinese University of Hong Kong confers its first degrees upon its own graduands. This therefore is an important occasion in the history of the development of the University, comparable in its significance to the ceremonies held recently in which we installed our first Vice-Chancellor and conferred our first Honorary Degrees

'It is also an important occasion in the lives of the young people who today receive their degrees, with the added distinction of being the first to do so. 'I am sure I speak for all here when I say we share their pleasure and expect great things from them in the future. This is their great day, and it is to them I would chiefly like to speak.

'First, I would like to remind our graduands that a degree is by no means a licence to stop learning. It is an indication that the holder has reached a certain level of academic attainment, and is valuable as such but it should not be mistaken for more than that.

'Here I stress the words "academic attainment". You have been given a certain, most useful level of background knowledge, and I hope also that in the course of gaining your degrees you have learned how to learn, and how to think logically and dispassionately.

'Of all the gifts that the University can give you, this is the most valuable—and is, on the whole, of more importance to you than the mere body of knowledge you have gained.

## Future Potentials

'When you leave here, therefore, to go out into the world, your colleagues and your employers are entitled to expect you to be well-grounded in a general knowledge of your subject, and to be alert to learn. It is your future potentials that will be valued, not your existing abilities in your chosen careers—for these will at first still be rather slight.

'You will have to discover how to apply your academic knowledge to practical situations before you can claim to have mastered your new jobs, and this takes time and experience.

'So, as I have said, you must not make the mistake of thinking you can stop learning now that you have got your degrees; for if you are to realize the dormant powers that should now lie within you, you will have to continue to study both to keep up with modern developments in your field and to ensure that your knowledge is applied to the best advantage.

'Next, I hope you will all remember that although you have now graduated, you are still members of this University; for a university is the whole body of those associated with it, whether as teachers, students, administrators or graduates. Its future fame lies to a large extent in your hands.

'If in the course of your careers you prove your competence, and demonstrate your ability to be leaders in your chosen spheres, your associates will give much of the credit to your University, whose reputation will thereby be enhanced with the result that the world will place increasing confidence in its graduates.

## Public Confidence

'This public confidence is important to the growth and development of any university; and you owe it to your University to see that you enhance its reputation and do nothing to impair it.

'Finally it remains for me to congratualte the University, its constituent Colleges and their staffs on the graduation of these young people, the University's first products. Then, of course, I would also like to congratulate the graduands themselves very sincerely on successfully achieving their degrees.

'You have all, I know, had to work very hard to gain these distinctions, which are the culmination of many years of prolonged study. You can be proud of what you have accomplished, and I hope the knowledge that you are capable of reaching this level of attainment will give you confidence for the future.

'I wish you all every success in the life which now opens up before you.'

## AT THE GRADUATION DINNER

Graduation in Chinese is 'pi-yeh', literally the 'end of a course or study' but it is by no means the end of anything but the beginning of a life-long quest for knowledge and experience, Dr. Choh-ming Li told the 1964 graduates and diplomates at the Graduation Dinner on the evening of October 16.

The Vice-Chancellor was speaking of his own experience when he received his Ph.D. degree from the university. He said the feeling of being unlearned became stronger as one progressed in his pursuit of knowledge. 'The more you learn the more you feel unlearned.'

He praised the fine work of the faculties of the three Foundation Colleges. 'The University conferred upon you a degree or diploma today but the claim of accomplishment belongs to the three Foundation Colleges and their staff,' said the Vice-Chancellor in his short predinner speech to more than 300 guests and students. He asked the guests and the faculties to join him for a toast to the future success of the graduates and diplomates.

In responses in Chinese and English by Miss Lau Woon Ying and Miss Yu Yuen Wai respectively, the graduates expressed their gratitude to the Colleges and the University. Miss Yu asked the University to cultivate the local characters of the University along with its international emphasis. She also expressed the hope of

the organization of a University Student Union and the immediate establishment of a University Alumni Association.

The First Graduation Dinner ended at 10.35 p.m.

## THE FORMATION OF THE SENATE

The Senate of the University has been formed and held its first meeting at the University Conference Room on October 8.

The Senate, as specified in the University Ordinance, is primarily concerned with programmes of instruction, education, research; conducting of examination; the conferment of degrees other than degrees honoris causa; and the award of diplomas, certificates and other academic distinctions of the University. Decisions of the Senate are subject to the review of the University Council.

The Vice-Chancellor is the Chairman of the Senate. Members of the Senate include: Presidents of the three Foundation Colleges; one Vice-President from each of the Colleges; the Professors; the Directors of University Studies who are not Professors; six members who shall be Readers, Senior Lecturers or Recognized Lecturers but not Directors of University Studies and who shall be elected two from each College by the Readers, Senior Lecturers and Lecturers within such College; and the Librarian.

Rayne (Vice-President of Chung Chi College), Prof. Chen Cheng-siang (Geography), Prof. Noah E. Fehl (History), Prof. Bertha Hensman (English Language and Literature), Prof. Hsu Bay-sung (Physics), Prof. Li Hui-lin (Biology), Prof. Mou Jun-sun (Chinese History), Prof. Tang Chun-I (Philosophy), Prof. Pauline V. Young (Director of Studies, Sociology and Social Welfare), Dr. Daniel Y. Chang (Director of Studies, Chemistry), Mr. Pan Chung-Kwei (Director of Studies, Chinese Language and Literature), Dr. S. T. Tsou (Director of Studies, Mathematics), Mr. K. H. Tung (Acting Director of Studies, Economics), Dr. J. M. Yang (Director of Studies, Business Administration).

## CAMPUS PLANNING COMMITTEE

The Hon. R. C. Lee will head a planning committee of the University to supervise the overall planning and the development of the University campus at Ma Liu Shui.

Other members of the Campus Planning Committee include: the Hon. P. C. Woo, Mr. Q. W. Lee, the three Presidents of the Foundation Colleges or their deputies and the Hon. Szeto Wai, the University architect. The University Registrar, Mr. H. T. Wu, will serve as secretary.

The Hon. R. C. Lee is the Vice-Chairman of the University Council. The Hon. P. C. Woo is a member of the Council and Mr. Q. W. Lee is the University Treasurer and Chairman of the Finance Committee. The Hon. Szeto Wai is the author of the University development plan.

The Campus Planning Committee, an advisory board to the Vice-Chancellor and University Council, will deal with problems connected with the overall planning of the University site including costs of roads and other services. It will also examine building proposals of the three Colleges in relation to the master plan of the University and coordinate their building projects.

Site formation work at Ma Liu Shui is already being carried out and it is expected that construction work may begin next year. Presently, soil removal work is done in coordination with the Plover Cove Water Scheme.

## DEFERMENT OF RETIREMENT FOR ONE YEAR

The University Council confirmed an arrangement made by the Vice-Chancellor with Government to defer the retirement of over-aged personnel till the academic year of 1965/66.

Government was approached in May of this year with a request for deferring the retirement of over-aged staff. The Vice-Chancellor, in his statement to the Council, said the retirement of over-aged personnel generally required a preparatory period of six to nine months, not only to give the person involved an opportunity to make personal plans, but also to allow the University enough time to secure qualified replacements.

Government, in a reply dated May 29, agreed to defer the enforcement of Statute 18 of the University Ordinance till the academic year of 1965/66, with the exception of those who are physically incapable of continuing to perform their duties and those who voluntarily retire.

The specified age of retirement in the University Ordinance is 60.

## READMISSION OF PRE-1960 GRADUATES

The University Registrar, in a reply to a petition submitted by the Alumni Association of the three Foundation Colleges requesting the University (a) to exempt pre-1960 College graduates from the qualifying examination for readmission to courses of study leading to a degree and (b) to establish external degree or evening courses for these graduates, said:

'The policy on readmission of graduates before 1960 was stated in our letter dated August 18. The second petition was studied by the Academic Planning Committee, which reached the following decisions: (1) the requirement of a qualifying examination was based on the need to examine the academic standing of the applicant and to determine the required courses of study for each of them. Graduates before 1960 have been engaged in various positions in society for many years; now that the University has been established with higher academic standards, it is appropriate to comply with the requirement of Statute 22(4) of the University Ordinance in having a qualifying examination. The examination will include three papers and is to be given by the College concerned. (2) As to the request for establishing external degree and evening courses, these projects require extensive research on the need; provision of equipment; recruitment of extra teachers and application of financial resources. The University, at the present formative stage, has a great deal to undertake and is unable to divert its limited resources to such projects in this time.'

## PROFESSORS HONOURED

Professor Chou Fa-kao of the Department of Chinese Language and Literature, and Professor Li Hui-lin of the Department of Biology, were elected on September 1, 1964, to be academicians of the Academia Sinica, the highest academic body of the Republic of China.

The Academia Sinica is dedicated to the promotion and encouragement of research and studies of all sciences. The President is Dr. Wang Shih-Chieh, his predecessor having been the late Dr. Hu Shih.

Every year, a handful of distinguished scholars nominated by leading academic personages and organizations are awarded membership of the Academia if they secure four-fifths of the votes cast by members. This year, six scholars have been awarded the honour, bringing the number of academicians elected since the establishment of the Academia to a total of forty-nine.

## STUDENT WELFARE COMMITTEE

The Student Welfare Committee of the Chinese University of Hong Kong held its first meeting on September 3, 1964, at the University Central Office. The Committee is a permanent advisory body appointed by the Vice-Chancellor with the aim of promoting the general welfare and corporate life of the students of the University. The Committee is responsible directly to the Vice-Chancellor.

## NEW MEMBER OF COUNCIL

The Hon. Kan Yuet-keung was recently elected to replace Dr. Pang Shao-hsien as Chairman of the Board of Governors of Chung Chi College and the representative of the Board at the University Council.

## DELEGATION TO JAPAN

A ten-member delegation of the University, led by the Vice-Chancellor, visited Japan from July 26 to August 9 on the invitation of the Japanese Government. The itinerary included visits to ten universities and various libraries and museums in the cites of Tokyo, Osaka and Kyoto.

Composed of three faculty members from each of the Foundation Colleges, the delegation included teachers in the fields of science, commerce, arts and social science.

The main object of the trip was to establish a closer relationship between the universities of Hong Kong and Japan. 'There were not only opportunities to discuss generally the organization, planning and problems of the universities, but also professors of their own fields were available to exchange views on teaching and research experience', said Mr. S. K. Fang, deputy leader of the Delegation.

'The delegates were impressed by the atmosphere of learning in the universities and some of the modern teaching and research facilities. It was of particular interest to note that, for undergraduate teaching, the universities rely almost entirely on Japanese books written by Japanese authors or translated from other languages', Mr. Fang added.

Several official dinners were given in honour of the visitors by the Japanese Government in Tokyo and Kyoto.

Dr. C. T. Yung, the Pro-Vice-Chancellor, replaced Dr. Li as leader of the delegation during the last stretch of the visit. Dr. Li left Japan earlier to visit the University of the Philippines.

## COLLEGE VICE-PRESIDENTS

Dr. Ou Tsuin-chen, Vice-President (Acting President), New Asia College

Dr. Ou Tsuin-chen was born in Jukao, Kiangsu, China, in 1901. He graduated from the National Southeastern University with a B.A. degree in 1924. Later he pursued graduate studies at the University of Paris and obtained his Ph.D. there in 1931.

The National Peking University appointed Dr. Ou Professor in the Department of Education upon his return to China in 1931. He became Head of the Department two years later, and remained in the post until he was appointed Director of the Department of Higher Education, Ministry of Education, in 1938. Leaving the Ministry in 1945, he taught at the National Central University from 1946 to 1948. Between 1949 and 1958, Dr. Ou served twice as Vice-Minister of Education. During this period



he also taught at New Asia College and the National Chengchi University and worked as Managing Editor for Cheng Chung Book Company.


In addition to administration and teaching, Dr. Ou has spent most of his spare time in writing. His publications include: An Outline of Philosophy; A Treatise on Logic; Logic; Education Essays; Principles of Moral Education; La Doctrine Pédagogique de John Dewey; Chinese Translation of A. Lalande's Précis Raisonné de la Morale Pratique; Chinese translation of John Dewey's Freedom and Culture.

### Mr. S. K. Fang, Vice-President, United College

Mr. Fang received his B.Sc. degree in industrial engineering at the National Chiao-Tung University of Shanghai in 1949. Later he studied mechanical engineering at the University of Manchester, England, where he received another B.Sc. degree in 1952.

After serving a two-year graduate apprenticeship in the National Gas & Oil Engine Co. in England, Mr. Fang went to Canada to pursue postgraduate studies at McGill University where he also worked as a demonstrator in the Department of Mechanical Engineering. He was awarded the degree of Master of Engineering in 1956 and was appointed Research Engineer at the Gas Dynamics Laboratory of McGill University for one year. He later joined Montreal Engineering Co. Ltd., a consulting engineering firm in Canada, as Design Engineer of thermal power stations.


In 1958, Mr. Fang was appointed lecturer at the University of Hong Kong and assisted in planning the revival of the Department of Mechanical Engineering. He was appointed Head of the Department of Mechanical Engineering when it was resuscitated in 1961.



Mr. Fang assumed his present post of Vice-President of United College in 1963. He is married with five children. His wife, a social worker, is a field work supervisor in the Board of Social Studies at the University of Hong Kong.

Mr. Robert N. Rayne, Vice-President, Chung Chi College

Born in Kenya Colony in 1913, Mr. Rayne was educated at boarding schools in England and at Brasenose College, Oxford (Greek and Latin Classics). He taught at Bolton School, Lancashire 1937–1940, but became a bomber pilot



in the Royal Air Force from 1940 to 1945. During the last three years of the war he was held a prisoner in Germany.

In 1946 Mr. Rayne served in the Education Branch of the Control Commission for Germany. Later he taught at Manchester Grammar School for three years until 1950 and then at the University of Keele from its foundation in 1950 (as the University College of North Staffordshire) as lecturer in Classics and Warden of Horwood Hall.

Mr. Rayne is married and has a son aged 15 and a daughter aged 11.

Dr. Andrew T. Roy, Vice-President for Public Relations, Chung Chi College

A native Texan born in 1903, Dr. Andrew Roy graduated from Washington and Lee University in 1925 with a chemistry degree. He then went for a year's study of English and philosophy at Princeton University where he earned an M.A. in philosophy in 1938 and ten years later his Ph.D.

Between his periods of study at Princeton, Dr. Roy held various positions and attended several other schools. From 1926 to 1928 he was a travelling secretary in the Student Department of the YMCA. Following this he studied theology for a year in Edinburgh, Scotland and then later attended the College of Chinese Studies in Peking in 1931–32. Afterwards Dr. Roy taught and did Christian student work in Nanking until 1936. During the war years he was the director of religious activities and part-time lecturer for four Christian universities in Chengtu.

In 1954 Dr. Roy came to Hong Kong and taught philosophy and ethics at Chung Chi College at which he also served as Chaplain. Presently he holds the posts of Vice-President for Public Relations and senior lecturer in the Department of Sociology and Social Work.


Dr. Roy is the author of two books: Risk and Hope and On Asia's Rim. He is married with two sons.

## NEW UNIVERSITY STAFF

Mr. Paul Yen, Finance Officer

Born in Hong Kong in 1926, Mr. Yen attended Queen's College before World War II. During the war, he served in the Chinese Army.

Mr. Yen returned to Hong Kong in 1945 and attained extensive practical experience in accounting and banking during his eight years of service with British and Chinese banking institutions in Hong Kong. In 1953, he joined the Dairy Farm Co. where he held various positions, including the supervision of the general operations of accounting affairs. Prior to his joining the University, he was Assistant Accountant of the Diary Farm Co. and its subsidiary, Dairy Lane, Ltd.



In 1955, Mr. Yen obtained his AASA accountancy qualifications and was admitted as an Associate Member of the Australian Society of Accountants.

△Dr. Ou Tsuin-chen, Acting President of New Asia College, has accepted an invitation of the University of Hawaii to take part in the Advanced Scholars Resident Research Programme of the East-West Centre, for a duration of five months. Dr. and Mrs. Ou left for Hawaii on September 24.

△Miss Lak Kung Mei, Assistant Lecturer in Mathematics at New Asia College, was awarded a World University Service Scholarship to pursue an M.A. degree at the University of California. Miss Lak left for the United States on August 7.

△Mr. Huang Yang Chih, an assistant of the New Asia Institute of Advanced Chinese Studies and Research, also obtained a WUS scholarship, and left on August 7 to study at the University of Indiana.

△Mr. George F. S. Ling, Assistant Dean of Students, left for England via the United States, on September 8 to study for a Ph.D. at Mansfield College of Oxford University.

△Dr. Pi-kai Tchang, Senior Lecturer in Economics and Head of the Department of Economics at New Asia College has accepted an invitation to lecture at Marburg University, Germany, for a duration of six months. During her trip Dr. Huie will examine various aspects of American literature and methods of teaching English as a second language.

△Dr. Chan Nai Ng, a newly-appointed lecturer in Mathematics at the United College, arrived on August 4 from the United Kingdom to assume his post. Dr. Chan was previously a lecturer in Mathematics at the University of Newcastle-upon-Tyne in Britain.

## COMMONWEALTH SCHOLARSHIP AND FELLOWSHIP

According to a recently published report of the Commonwealth Education Liaison Committee there are still available awards in the Commonwealth Scholarship and Fellowship Plan. At present, 924 scholars are holding awards as against the target of 1,000 awards envisaged at the First Commonwealth Education Conference at Oxford in 1959.

The continuing popularity of the Plan is indicated by the considerable increase in the number of applications received for awards in the various Commonwealth countries (9,533 for the present period as against 7,533 in the previous year) as well as by the increases in the number of new Scholars taking up awards (390 as against 358) and in the total number of awards held in the period. There is however great need for an increase both in the number of nominations made by several countries for awards and for an intensification of publicity for the awards offered by some countries.

The Commonwealth Scholarship and Fellowship Plan was brought into being by the first Commonwealth Education Conference held at Oxford in July 1959, which in turn was convened as a result of deliberations at the Commonwealth Trade and Economic Conference at Montreal in August 1958. The general basis of the Plan, which is essentially that of bilateral arrangements between

separate Commonwealth countries, was confirmed at the second Commonwealth Education Conference at New Delhi in January 1962.

Commonwealth Scholarships are intended to provide opportunities for study overseas to young graduates of high intellectual promise who may be expected to make a significant contribution to life in their own countries on their return. The awards are normally tenable for two years' postgraduate study at universities or institutions of higher learning in the awarding country. Awards for undergraduate study may also be made where facilities do not exist for the study of a particular subject in the country of a candidate's permanent home. Commonwealth Visiting Fellowships, which have been instituted by a few Commonwealth countries, are normally intended for senior scholars of established reputation and achievement.



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


