GROUND-BREAKING CEREMONY OF THE UNIVERSITY SITE

It was a bright sunny morning on Saturday, 9th December, 1967, when the University held its memorable Ground-Breaking Ceremony of the new campus site next to Chung Chi College, high above the hills of Shatin and overlooking Tolo Harbour.

The sounds of a helicopter hovering above heralded the arrival of His Excellency the Governor Sir David Trench. As soon as it landed, His Excellency stepped out and was welcomed by the Vice-Chancellor Dr. Choh-Ming Li. Together they rode up to the campus site and were greeted on arrival by Dr. the Hon. C.Y. Kwan, Chairman of the University Council, Mr. Edwin Webb Martin, U.S. Consul General in Hong Kong, Dr. R.C. Lee, Vice-Chairman of the Council and Chairman of the Campus Planning Committee, and the Hon. W. Szeto, University Architect.

The Vice-Chancellor opened the ceremony with a short welcome address to approximately five hundred guests, including many prominent members of the community. Then His Excellency, accompanied by the Hon. C.Y. Kwan, Dr. R.C. Lee, and the Hon. Szeto proceeded to the tree planting site to plant a tree.

"By the planting of this tree, I am symbolizing the start of construction work on the new building of The Chinese University of Hong Kong," said Sir David. "This is another land mark in the history of the University's progress—and I hope and expect that the development of this site will now proceed with all speed," he added. Then the Lancashire Fusiliers' Band played a fanfare and His Excellency returned to the dais with the party.

Mr. Edwin Webb Martin, U.S. Consul General in Hong Kong, accompanied by the Hon. Szeto, proceeded to lay the foundation stone of the Benjamin Franklin Centre. The funds for this Centre had been contributed by the citizens of the United States. Again, the band played a fanfare as Mr. Martin returned to his seat. The Vice-Chancellor, in his address to the assembly, said, "This University was created by the Government and the people of Hong Kong. Its creation was possible because so many people had the will and the vision to work together... Here we shall remember the long history of Chinese higher education and pledge our allegiance to its great traditions: the Chinese language and its literature." He then concluded, "This University is set on a hill. Nothing that is set on a hill can be hidden. Let it be known that this University is set on this hill as a beacon. With humility and with courage we shall endeavour to give light to the world." (Full text of the speech on page 2).

ENGLISH VERSION OF THE VICE-CHANCELLOR'S SPEECH

A New Beginning that is making History

Your Excellency, honoured guests, ladies and gentlemen:

Today we see a new beginning: one built upon the foundation of many generations. The Chinese University of Hong Kong has deep roots. This new beginning is possible first of all because education in Chinese culture has a history on its own soil of two thousand five hundred years. Any beginning in Chinese higher education today is therefore not *the* beginning but a *new* beginning.

I want to emphasize that this new beginning is important. What you have seen and heard here today is not only a witness to the past; it is a glimpse of the future. University education in the twentieth century is here and everywhere a global venture. There is no nation on this globe that has not contributed to The Chinese University of Hong Kong through its poets, its historians, its scientists. To the degree that any modern university is a good university this is true of universities throughout the world.

I think I can say that the groundbreaking of The Chinese University of Hong Kong is a new beginning that is making history. It is Chinese. Here we shall remember the long history of Chinese higher education and pledge our allegiance to its great traditions: the Chinese language and its literature. I do not need to remind you that Chinese culture has given its greatest attention to history and to social institutions. But we have come to appreciate the place of science in our heritage and the contributions of Chinese technology to the rise of the West.

Hong Kong today stands at the crossroads not only of Asia but of the whole world. And The Chinese University of Hong Kong aspires to contribute to the foundation of generations not only of China but of the whole new world as well.

This University was created by the Government and the people of Hong Kong. Its creation was possible because so many people had the will and the vision to work together. I take this opportunity to congratulate the Government of Hong Kong on its foresight and for its generous support. The Government has undertaken to provide the basic buildings on this site for this University. Already it provides the basic needs of the University in instruction and equipment. This is a costly venture. Few people in any society realize the cost of university education today. The Government knows what the cost is. The Government accepts the cost because it counts on the 'appreciation' of its investment in terms of value to the whole community. I use this term 'appreciation' as an economist. This

University, Your Excellency, will make its return to the people of Hong Kong. That is what you ask of it. That is what I demand of it.

It is fitting that our first foundation stone should be laid for the Benjamin Franklin Centre. The people of the United States of America, represented here by Mr. Edwin Martin, have made this project possible. Benjamin Franklin held an honoured post under the government of His Majesty, George the Third. He was the postmaster-general of the British colonies in the New World. He was also the special ambassador representing the growing pains of the American colonies to His Majesty's Court on several occasions. But I would like to remind our American friends that he was the first citizen of their country to be honoured by the British Royal Society as a research scientist.

Franklin was a practical man as well as a philosopher, scientist and statesman. He loved young people. Our first building is primarily for our students — for their cultural, social and physical welfare. It will be the centre of student life of this University — I trust next to the library and the laboratories. Franklin had wisdom, learning and humour. I hope there will always be good humour here in the years to come — the good humour of students. Good humour is something we all need and shall always need. And I hope Franklin's good humour will reach out from this Centre to enliven our days and enlighten our decisions. Humour means that we understand each other and that we like and trust each other.

Now I want you to look around you. Look at this magnificent view from which students and teachers and even administrators will receive inspiration as this University grows to serve Hong Kong and the world. Few universities in the world are fortunate enough to have such a view. I pledge to the people of Hong Kong that we shall do all in our power to turn this view of sea and mountain into a vision — a vision of greatness worthy of all who have made this day a day of history.

Sir David, you have planted a tree. It is the symbol of life and of growth. Life and growth shall be the watchword of this University. Now let me quote a very old Chinese sage — older even than Confucius. Just a few lines from Chou Kung.

"but when a father, wishing to build a house, had laid out the plans, if his son be unwilling to raise up the hall, how much less will he be willing to complete the roof. It is on this account that I set myself and you to this undertaking."

Now I want to say to all of you that much has been given to us by friends abroad. But I want you all to know also that local businessmen have helped us and have pledged generous contributions to the building programme. I want to thank all of them most sincerely,

particularly because they have contributed not only in dollars but in good sense. But I want to tell you that we have not yet all that we need to make this the great university that is worthy of this site. To him who hath much shall be given is a saying from the Bible that I hope will come true for us. And what comes to us here for The Chinese University of Hong Kong will, I hope, enrich the whole world.

This University is set on a hill. Nothing that is set on a hill can be hidden. Let it be known that this University is set on this hill as a beacon. With humility and with courage we shall endeavour to give light to the world. From ancient beginnings today is a new beginning. We have faith in this new beginning. We have faith in this University.

Remarks of U.S. Consul General Edwin W. Martin at the Cornerstone Laying of the Benjamin Franklin Centre

Your Excellency, ladies, and gentlemen;

I am most pleased to be here to join in these ceremonies at Chinese University and to lay the foundation stone of the Benjamin Franklin Centre.

Coming to Philadelphia a poor boy with a loaf of bread under his arm, Benjamin Franklin obtained an education through his own efforts—and these efforts were amply rewarded. Surely one of the most versatile men America has ever produced, Franklin made outstanding contributions to the fields of letters, science, diplomacy, and politics.

It is most appropriate, then, that the name of Benjamin Franklin has been chosen for this student centre which is a gift of the American people through the Department of State and the Asia Foundation.

When it is completed, the ultimate significance of the Benjamin Franklin Centre, like the ultimate significance of Chinese University itself, depends on the students it will serve.

It will become part of *their* education. I hope it will come to stand as a symbol not only of the pleasures of university life, but also of the same dedication to education, despite the sacrifices involved, which moved the man after whom the centre is named.

I congratulate you, and wish you the very best for the future.

STAFF PROFILES

Prof. Marion A. Wenger, Director, University of California Study Centre

Prof. Marion Wenger, born in 1907, received the B.A. degree from the University of Michigan in 1928. He then attended the University of Iowa, where he obtained the M.A. and Ph.D. degrees in 1933 and 1935 respectively. He was a research associate at the University of Chicago from 1935 to 1938. In 1938, he became associate professor at Antioch College and research associate at The Fels Research Institute. He served in the U.S. Maritime Service during World War II. In 1945 he joined the Faculty of the University of California, Los Angeles, and at present is a Professor of the Department of Psychology at that university.

Prof. Wenger's many publications include a series of Psychophysiological studies of children, male and female college students, and patients with psychological

and psychosomatic disorders. He has done extensive research on the measurement and significance of individual differences of autonomic balance.

He is serving as Director of the University of California Study Centre at the University for the academic year 1967-68.

Mrs. Mabelle B. Nardin, Visiting Lecturer, School of Education

Mrs. Mabelle Nardin, a native of Masonville, Wisconsin, attended the University of Chicago and the McCormac School of Commerce, Chicago, before going to Stanford University to finish her B.A. degree in 1944. She then served in the U.S. Department of State and in 1945 joined the U.S. Foreign Service where she served on the staff in Bogota, Columbia. From 1949 to 1958, she was Cultural Affairs Officer in Cairo, Vienna, Bremen-Bonn, and Washington, D.C. respectively. During her service in this capacity, she went on educational leave and received both her M.A. degree in Education and diploma in the teaching of English as a Second Language from Teachers College, Columbia University in 1957-60. After her resignation from the U.S. Foreign Service, she was Visiting Lecturer at Balwant Rajput College of Education, Agra, India, in 1960. From 1962 to 1963, she was Consultant on textbook revision in the English Language Education Council, Inc., Tokyo. She became Instructor in

Teaching English as a Second Language in the English Language Institute of the University of Hawaii in 1963. She came to The Chinese University as a Fulbright Scholar in September, 1967.

Mrs. Nardin has written many articles, among which were contributions to *Indian Education*, Agra; the English Language Education Council Bulletin, Tokyo; and ELEC Publications, Tokyo. She is a member of the Linguistic Society of America, the American Association of University Women, Teachers of English to Speakers of other Languages and the International House of Japan, Tokyo. She was listed in Who's Who in American Education, 1963-64.

△ Professor H.L. Elvin, Director of the Institute of Education, University of London, visited the University from 15th to 23rd December, under the sponsorship of the Inter-University Council for Higher Education Overseas.

COLLEGE NEWS

△ Mr. T.C. Cheng, President of United College, has been appointed by the Governor as (a) Chairman of the Police Children's Education Trust Committee and (b) Chairman of the Police Education and Welfare Trust Committee constituted under section 6(2) of the Ordinances Nos. 68 and 69 of 1967.

△ Mr. W.J.K. Booth, Assistant Establishment Officer, Mr. Chui Kam, Assistant Secretary for Chinese Affairs, Mr. M.D. Sargant, Acting Chief Executive Officer, Mr. A.G. Bailey, Acting Deputy Principal Executive Officer and Mr. Philip Law, Secretary, Social Welfare Department, visited United College on 12th December and talked to 46 students of various departments who were interested in Government careers. The Government officers sat in two panels before which the students appeared in groups of 3 to 4. The talks lasted for over three hours.

△ Examinations for the Yale-in-China Scholarships were held at New Asia College on 3rd December. Out of the six candidates this year, two were students of Economics, the rest being students of the respective departments of History, Philosophy, Chemistry and Sociology.

Examination results will be announced at the end of January.

△ Mr. T.C. Cheng, President of United College, gave a talk to West Kowloon Rotarians at their weekly luncheon held on 6th December. He briefly traced the events leading up to the founding of The Chinese University on 17th October, 1963, outlined what the University had done during the past four years to meet the needs of the community and appealed to the audience for continued guidance and support.

△ A Biology Seminar, sponsored by the Biology Department of Chung Chi College, was held on 14th December. The guest speaker, Dr. D. Eggleston, Acting Director of Fisheries Research Station, Agriculture and Fisheries Department, spoke on "Aspects of Fisheries Research in Hong Kong."

△ At the invitation of the United College Student Union and the Commerce Society, Mr. Q.W. Lee, General Manager of Hang Seng Bank Ltd., and Treasurer of the University, gave a lecture on the short-term effects of the devaluation of the Hong Kong dollar on December 16 in the College Hall. A large gathering of interested students benefited much from the lucid exposition and analysis made by Mr. Lee.

△ The Faculty of Commerce and Social Science of New Asia College held a seminar on 8th December. Professor David H. Li from the Lingnan Institute of Business Administration was invited to lecture on "The Management Information System." △ A record number of fifty three staff and students of United College, including Mr. S.K. Fang, Vice-President, came forward to donate blood to the Hong Kong Red Cross Society blood bank on 21st December.

The donation, which was arranged by the College Student Union, took place in the College Hall. The donors received a souvenir medal each from the Society and enjoyed soft drinks and tea after the donation.

△ In observance of the 50th Anniversary of the Independence of Finland, the Chung Chi College noonhour recorded Appreciation Concert on 7th December was dedicated to Finnish Music. An open house coffee party for staff members and their spouses was held on the following day.

△ The Chung Chi College Boy-choir presented a Carol Vesper in the college chapel on 17th December, under the direction of Dr. Ruth Esther Hillila. The hour-long presentation featured Advent and Christmas Music.

△ During the weekly Chung Chi College Assembly on 22nd December, a programme of Harp and Choral Music was presented by Mrs. Mary Elizabeth Collins, harpist, and the Chung Chi Choral Society, under the direction of Dr. David Sheng.

△ Mr. N.H. Young, Academic Registrar, United College, has been invited to serve on the Hong Kong Committee for the selection of local students for award of scholarships and postgraduate studies at East-West Center, Honolulu, U.S.A.

△ Dr. Kai-keung Mark of the Biology Department of New Asia College, gave a lecture on "The 7th International Congress of Biochemistry" on 8th December, at a seminar sponsored by the Department.

△ Professor S.C. Joseph Fu has been elected a Fellow of the American Association for Advancement of Science.

△ Dr. L.S. Chuang, Lecturer in Physics at Chung Chi College, was elected as an associate of the Institute of Physics of London, on 5th December, 1967.

△ Dr. S.C. Loh, Reader in Electronics and Head of the Department of Physics and Electronics, United College, delivered a lecture on "The Implication of Computers for Modern Society" on 3rd December at the Sunday Evening Forum sponsored by the Student Christian Centre, Kowloon.

△ Dr. S.C. Yang, Senior Lecturer and Head of the Department of Accounting and Finance, United College, acted as External Examiner in Accounting for Ngee Ann College of Singapore in its examination held from 11th to 16th December 1967. △ At the invitation of the Department of Chinese Literature of New Asia College, Mr. Chung Ying-mei, Head of the Department of Chinese Literature of Chung Chi College, gave a lecture on "A New Look at Some Old Problems."

△ A New Year's Party for Staff Club members and their families was held at Chung Chi College on 29th December. Besides dancing, music, and bridge games provided for adults and cartoons and games for children, there was a lucky draw by Mrs. C.T. Yung.

△ Mr. William C.C. Kung, Lecturer in Business Management, United College, gave a series of three lectures on 11th, 13th and 18th December to a class of 20 smaller business proprietors/executives and bank officials under the sponsorship of the Hong Kong Management Association.

The course was aimed at solving the financial problems facing smaller businesses in Hong Kong and consisted of talks on (a) A Bank's Requirements to Give, (b) Presenting a Case for Credit and (c) Commitments, Legal or Otherwise, of Bank Credit.

Mr. Kung also gave a talk on the devaluation of the Hong Kong dollar to members of the Happy Valley Lions Club at their dinner held on 5th December.

△ To raise fund for its cultural activities, the New Asia College Sociology Club presented a performance of folk dances in the college hall on 9th December. More than fifteen dances of different countries were performed at what could be called the first large-scale folk dance performance in Hong Kong.

△ Six delegates and observers from the student union of each college of the University participated in the Third Students Seminar held from 27th to 30th December at the University of Hong Kong. The Seminar was sponsored by the Hong Kong Federation of Students and the International Students Conference.

As General Secretary of the Hong Kong Federation of Students, Mr. Luk Hung-kei, a third year student of History, United College, presided over the 4-day Seminar, at which the participating student delegates were called upon to look into the youth problems in Hong Kong after the 1966 and 1967 disturbances.

△ Over 350 people attended the Annual Ball of the United College Student Union held at the Hong Kong Hilton on 28th December. Mr. Koo Yee-yin, President of the Union, together with Miss Peggoty Cheng, Chairman of the Ball Committee, presided at the function. The Guests of Honour were the Hon. Fung Ping-Fan, Chairman of the College Board of Trustees, and Mrs. Fung; other guests at the official table included the Hon. Wilson T.S. Wang, Vice-Chairman of the Board,

and Mrs. Wang, Mr. Ng Tor-tai, Mr. & Mrs. Andrew K.W. Eu, and Mr. & Mrs. T.C. Cheng.

The main feature of the Ball was a students fashion show staged with youth vigour and yet profound elegance. The programme also included a draw of prizes donated by the Hon. Fung and some leading commercial firms and airlines.

△ Officers of the Chung Chi College Student Union were elected on 8th December, at the College Assembly. Mr. Tang Hon-shu, a third year student in Sociology, was elected President of the Union. Vice-Presidents were Mr. Siu Yuk-cheung (internal affairs) and Mr. Liu Yan-Wah, (external affairs).

△ The second seminar of the Philosophy Society of New Asia College was held on 10th December. Mr. Lee Chit Sung and Mr. Pong Yuen Leung, students of the Department of Philosophy, each presented a paper.

△ Mr. T.F. Kwan, Chemistry Convenor, and ten members of the Hong Kong Science Teachers' Association visited the Chemistry Department of United College at Caine Lane on 30th December. They were shown around the laboratories of the Department and had tea afterwards.




