




The emblem of the University is the mythical Chinese bird feng (鳳), which is chosen because of its symbolism as Bird of the South since the Han dynasty. It is also a symbol of nobility, beauty, loyalty and majesty.

The University colours are purple and gold, representing devotion and loyalty (purple), perseverance and resolution (gold).

The motto of the University is '博 文約禮' (bo wen yue li): '博文' is to broaden one's intellectual horizon; '約禮' is to keep within the bounds of propriety.

These words of Confucius have long been considered a principal precept of his teaching. It is recorded in the *Analects of Confucius* that the Master says, 'The superior man, extensively studying all learning, and keeping himself under the restraint of the rules of propriety, may thus likewise not overstep what is right.' (Legg's version of the *Four Books*)

ntroduction

Incorporated in October 1963 under a Hong Kong Ordinance, The Chinese University of Hong Kong is a bilingual (Chinese and English) and bicultural institution of higher learning. Its objectives are to (i) assist in the preservation, dissemination, communication, and increase of knowledge; (ii) provide regular courses of instruction in the humanities, the sciences, and other branches of learning of a standard required and expected of a university of the highest standing; and (iii) stimulate the intellectual and cultural development of Hong Kong and thereby assist in promoting its economic and social welfare.

The University has its origin in three post-secondary colleges: New Asia College (founded 1949), Chung Chi College (founded 1951), and The United College of Hong Kong (founded 1956). In December 1976 a new ordinance was enacted, making important changes in the constitution governing the University and its constituent colleges. An ordinance for the fourth college was enacted in July 1986, and the new college - Shaw College - became operational in 1988.

The University is a self-governing corporation drawing its income mainly from grants made by the government, supplemented by fees and donations from private sources.

The governing and executive body of the University is the Council, which has the management and control of the affairs, purposes, and functions of the University. The Senate has the control and regulation of instruction, education, and research.

A wide range of full-time undergraduate programmes leading to the BA, BBA, BEd, BEng, BMedSc, MB ChB, BNurs, BPharm, BSc and BSSc degrees are offered by various departments under the faculties of arts, business administration, education, engineering, medicine, science, and social science. There are eight part-time degree programmes leading to the degrees of BA, BBA, BEd, BNurs and BSc.

Postgraduate programmes leading to the degrees of DMus, EdD, PhD, MA, MAcc, MArch, MBA, MClinPharm, MDiv, MEd, MFA, MMus, MNurs, MPH, MPhil, MSc, MSSc, MSW, and to five diplomas are offered by the Graduate School through its 38 graduate divisions* and four graduate boards/ programme.

^{*} The Division of Basic Medical Sciences to be replaced by the Division of Anatomy, the Division of Pharmacology and the Division of Physiology with effect from 1998-99.

Since its inception, the University has adopted bilingualism and biculturalism as the basis of its teaching, giving equal emphasis to both Chinese and English languages and Eastern and Western cultures. The majority of the teaching staff are bilingual (Chinese and English) and have studied and/or taught in major universities all over the world. The University is international in outlook and enjoys close association with many universities, foundations, and organizations abroad.

The total enrolment of the University in the academic year 1997–98 was 12,814, of whom 9,639 were undergraduate students and 3,175 post-graduate students.

The University has nine research institutes, under which are a number of research centres. They are the Institute of Chinese Studies, the Research Institute for the Humanities, the Asia-Pacific Institute of Business, the Hong Kong Institute of Educational Research, the Hong Kong Cancer Institute, the Institute of Science and Technology, the Institute of Mathematical Sciences, the Hong Kong Institute of Asia-Pacific Studies, and the Hong Kong Institute of Biotechnology, which has been incorporated as a limited company.

Extensions of the University include the School of Continuing Studies and the New Asia Yale-in-China Chinese Language Centre.





HE University

ORIGIN

The University has its origin in three post-secondary colleges: New Asia College (founded 1949), Chung Chi College (founded 1951), and The United College of Hong Kong (founded 1956), which drew, in their early days, a sizeable proportion of their teachers and some of their students from mainland China.

In 1957, these three colleges came together to form the Chinese Colleges Joint Council with the objective of securing government recognition of their efforts in providing higher education for the young people of Hong Kong. In 1959, Mr. John S. Fulton (later Lord Fulton of Falmer) was invited to advise on the general lines of development for the three colleges as a whole. In 1960, the government introduced the Post-Secondary Colleges Ordinance and Regulations, which approved financial support to the three colleges with a view to raising their academic standards.

In 1961, a University Preparatory Committee, chaired by Dr. the Hon. Sir Cho-Yiu Kwan, was appointed to advise on sites and buildings, and matters relating to the establishment of the University. A group of advisers from Britain and the United States visited Hong Kong in the same year to advise the colleges on the development of university level courses in arts, science, commerce, and social science. The report of these advisers was encouraging, and in 1962 the government appointed a commission under the chairmanship of Mr. John S. Fulton to consider and determine whether and how a Chinese university could be created from the three colleges.

The Report of the Fulton Commission, known as the Fulton Report and published in April 1963, recommended the establishment of a new university. Shortly after its publication, the Report was approved in principle by the government. A Provisional Council was set up in June 1963, and The Chinese University of Hong Kong Ordinance and Statutes were enacted in September of the same year. On 17th October 1963 the University was formally inaugurated.

THE ORDINANCE

In November 1975, the Governor of Hong Kong, in his capacity as Chancellor of the University, appointed an external commission to review the constitutional arrangements governing the University and its constituent colleges. Lord Fulton of Falmer was again invited to serve as chairman of the commission.

The second Fulton Report was submitted to the Chancellor in March 1976 and published in May. The *Report* recommended important changes to the constitutional arrangements governing the University and the colleges. Under the new arrangements proposed by the commission, the University would be responsible for academic and development policy, financial management, the matriculation of students, the appointment of staff, the determination of the curriculum, the conduct of examinations, and the award of degrees. The participation of senior academics in the governing bodies of the University would be strengthened. In addition, the Report recommended that the University should strive to strike a balance between 'subjectorientated' teaching and small group 'student-orientated' teaching, and that the latter should be entrusted to the colleges. This 'student-orientated' teaching would be designed to build in the students habits and frames of mind characteristic of experts in their chosen fields and to equip them with the necessary skills for meeting new challenges in a rapidly changing world. A new ordinance to give effect to the recommendations in the second Fulton Report was enacted in December 1976.

In 1986 the University received a generous donation from the Shaw Foundation (Hong Kong) Ltd. for the specific purpose of establishing a fourth college, Shaw College. The Ordinance and the Statutes were further revised to provide for its establishment, and it began admitting students in September 1988.

The Ordinance and the Statutes of the University incorporating the amendments over the years are printed in Part 7 of this Calendar.

ACADEMIC STRUCTURE AND POLICY

The Chinese University of Hong Kong is a growing university offering a range of full-time and part-time programmes which lead to bachelor's degrees, master's degrees, and doctorates.

There are seven faculties (arts, business administration, education, engineering, medicine, science, and social science) and 60 departments offering 46 major programmes and 33 minor programmes for full-time undergraduate students, and eight part-time undergraduate programmes for part-time students.

Postgraduate programmes including 50 doctoral programmes, 85 master's programmes, and five diploma programmes are offered by the

Graduate School through its 38 graduate divisions* and four graduate boards/ programme.

The Senate has control over instruction and research. The faculties advise the Senate through the faculty boards on the programmes of studies recommended by the departments, who are responsible for subject-orientated teaching. The colleges, in turn, are responsible for student-orientated teaching and the provision of residential accommodation. All teaching staff and fulltime undergraduate students are assigned to different constituent colleges.

At its inception the University's undergraduate curriculum was based on a combination of the credit unit system and the degree examination system. After a comprehensive review in the mid-80s, the University decided to adopt a pure credit-unit based curriculum structure. From 1991–92 onwards, greater flexibility was introduced into students' selection of courses and pace of study.

Undergraduate Studies

Full-time Undergraduate Studies

The University endeavours to provide a wide variety of major and minor programmes to meet the changing needs of society. In 1994-95, several new major programmes were introduced: translation under the Faculty of Arts; physical education and sports science and primary education under the Faculty of Education; mechanical and automation engineering under the Faculty of Engineering; environmental science, and food and nutritional sciences under the Faculty of Science. In 1995–96, in addition to the post-registration nursing programme introduced in 1991–92, the Faculty of Medicine launched a fouryear pre-registration nursing programme for secondary seven students. The programme operates on a modular curriculum structure instead of a creditunit system and prepares graduates for registration as general nurses in accordance with the requirements of the Nursing Board of Hong Kong. In 1997-98, the University introduced three more minor programmes — European studies under the Faculty of Arts, environmental science under the Faculty of Science, and gender studies under the Faculty of Social Science - so as to provide more choices for students. In 1998-99, four more new major programmes were introduced: quantitative finance under the Faculty of Business Administration; language education under the Faculty of Education; and materials science and molecular biotechnology under the Faculty of Science.

Part-time Undergraduate Studies

The Part-time Degree Programmes were first launched in 1981-82 with classes conducted in the evening. The eight part-time degree programmes currently offered are biology and chemistry, business administration, Chinese and English, mathematics and statistics, music, nursing, physical education and sports science, and primary education.

Postgraduate **Studies**

Master's programmes were first offered in 1966-67, and the number of programmes has, in 1998-99, increased to 85. Doctoral programmes were first introduced in 1980-81, and the number of programmes has increased to 50 in 1998-99.

FINANCE

The University's main source of income for both capital and recurrent expenses is the local government. Fee income represents a relatively small percentage of the University's total revenues. Total income for the year 1997-98 was HK\$3,893 million. In addition, the University and its constituent colleges have small endowment funds at their disposal and also receive contributions from private donors for research and other designated purposes.

Negotiations between the University and the government are conducted by the University Grants Committee. This committee advises the government on the financial requirements of the University.

LANDS AND BUILDINGS

The University campus, measuring approximately 134 hectares, is located on a tract of land under lease from the government north of Sha Tin New Town in the New Territories. It commands a scenic view of Tolo Harbour to the north and Tide Cove to the east.

The campus varies in elevation from 4.4 to 140 metres above sea level and has been carved from a rocky promontory into a number of plateaux to provide the sites for buildings of the University and its four colleges, as well as blocks of staff residences.

In the last three decades, some 95 buildings, large or small, have been erected on this once barren hillside.

Buildings for central activities are located mainly at the mid-level. The expanse of land in the valley next to the University Station of the Kowloon-Canton Railway (East Rail) is the campus of Chung Chi College. At the highest level are United College and New Asia College while Shaw College occupies the northwest tip of the University campus.

Around the tree-lined University Mall and the University Square featuring a sculpture by Ju Ming and a Roman-style forum and fountain, the following buildings cluster: the University Administration Building; the University Library; the Tin Ka Ping Building (incorporating an extended section of the library and several research and academic exchange centres); the Institute of Chinese Studies and the Art Museum; the Siu-Loong Pao Building (housing offices of the Registry); the Pi Ch'iu Building (housing the Computer Services Centre); the Y.C. Liang Hall (a lecture hall complex); the Sir Run Run Shaw Hall (an auditorium and performance hall); the Lady Shaw Building (for the science and engineering departments); the Ho SinHang Engineering Building; the Science Centre Complex; and the Choh-Ming Li Building for Basic Medical Sciences.

Other buildings around the central campus include the Benjamin Franklin Centre and John Fulton Centre (two amenities buildings with a swimming

pool for staff and students) to the south; the Li Dak Sum Building, Fung King Hey Building, and Leung Kau Kui Building (housing academic facilities mainly for the arts and business administration departments) to the west; the Health Centre, the Yali Guest House, the Chan Kwan-tung Inter-University Hall and the Chiangs Building (a complex of guest house facilities) to the east. By the main entrance on Tai Po Road stands a Transport and Security Depot whilst blocks

of staff quarters dot the hilly slopes to the north.

Descending towards the bay, one finds the Postgraduate Hall Complex, the Estates and Maintenance Building, the University Sports Centre and the Kwok Sports Building, and on the waterfront, the Hong Kong Institute of Biotechnology complex and the Marine Science Laboratory.

Flanking the road to the University Station are the Shanghai Fraternity Association

Research Services Centre, the Fong Shu Chuen Building and Fong Yun Wah Hall (housing a Chinese language centre), the Ho Tim Building (housing the Faculty of Education), the Hui Yeung Shing Building (housing the University Press and several departments of the Faculty of Arts), the Wong Foo Yuan Building, Chen Kou Bun Building, and Sino Building (housing the Chung Chi College administration and several departments of the Faculty of Social Science).

The clinical departments of the Faculty of Medicine are housed in the Clinical Sciences Building at the Prince of Wales Hospital, the regional hospital of Sha Tin, about eight kilometres from the main campus.

RESIDENTIAL ACCOMMODATION

The University provides several types of accommodation for staff members, academic visitors, and students.

Staff Housing

Staff quarters are allocated by the University to appointees who are eligible for staff housing. There are about 300 senior staff flats on campus in multistorey apartment buildings, some 100 flats for single teachers and other staff, and several blocks of quarters for junior staff.

The Inter-University Hall provides fully-furnished and self-contained quarters for academic visitors coming to the University for a period of one to two years.

Guest Houses

The University operates several guest houses which provide room and board facilities for guests on short periods of stay in the University, including the Yali Guest House, the University Guest Houses I and II, the Chan Kwantung Inter-University Hall, and the Chiangs Building, which together provide lodging for up to 180 visitors.

Student Hostels

The University and its constituent colleges operate a number of hostels for students who wish to live on campus.

The Postgraduate Hall Complex, consisting of Sir Cho-Yiu Hall, Lady Ho Tung Hall, and the Postgraduate Hall, provides 350 places for graduate students. Chung Chi College has eight hostels: Ming Hua Tang, Wen Lin Tang, Ying Lin Tang, Hua Lien Tang, Theology Building, Madam S.H. Ho Hall, Wen Chih Tang, and Lee Shu Pui Hall, which together provide 1,084 places. At New Asia College, Chih Hsing Hall, Xuesi Hall, and Grace Tien Hall can accommodate 770 students. At United College, Adam Schall Residence, Bethlehem Hall, and Hang Seng Hall also have a combined capacity of 770. Hostels I and II of Shaw College provide 880 places.

With the exception of the Postgraduate Hall Complex which has 120 single rooms, most student hostels provide shared accommodation in the form of twin-bed rooms. There are also a small number of special rooms for married students without children. Telephone and computer network connections are provided for individual rooms.

The Faculty of Medicine operates the Madam S.H. Ho Hostel for medical students at the Prince of Wales Hospital in Sha Tin, the teaching hospital of the faculty, providing accommodation for 148 senior clinical students.

Hostel fees range from HK\$3,310 to \$6,820 a term, depending on the type of accommodation. Detailed information on hostel fees is listed in Part 6 of this Calendar.



LIAISON WITH THE WORLD OF LEARNING

The University has since its inception in 1963 striven to enhance the crossfertilization of Chinese and Western academic and cultural traditions. To this end, the University has over the years established and maintained relationships with a large number of institutions the world over, including universities. research institutes, centres of learning, governmental agencies, and in particular, regional and international associations of universities. It has so far set up exchange programmes with a hundred universities all over the world.

The University's first exchange programme was launched in 1965 with the University of California system. Since then university-level student exchange programmes have been established with more than 60 institutions in other parts of the world through the Office of Academic Links (International). Exchange partners include Yale University and Georgetown University in the USA, Tsukuba University and Nanzan University in Japan, Yonsei University in Korea, and the University of British Columbia and the University of Toronto in Canada. There are also agreements with institutions in France, Spain, Denmark, the UK, Germany, Australia and Switzerland.

The University is also a member of the International Student Exchange Programme and has consortial agreements with the Associated Colleges of the Midwest and the Associated Colleges of the South both of the US. It also maintains close relations with the Association of Commonwealth Universities. the Association of Southeast Asian Institutions of Higher Learning, the International Association of Universities, the European Association for International Education and the Institute of International Education in the USA.

The international character of the University has been significantly enhanced by foreign government contributions to a number of instructional programmes. In addition, staff exchanges and development programmes are maintained through agreements with respective governments and exchange organizations. Visiting lectureships have been provided by the governments of France, Germany, Italy, Spain, and Japan; and many graduates of the University have obtained fellowships for advanced studies in these and other countries.

The University has also benefited from the support by various foundations for staff development, research, scholarships, and exchange programmes with an international dimension. These foundations include the Lingnan Foundation, the Asia Foundation, the Yale-China Association, the Harvard-Yenching Institute, the Henry Luce Foundation, the United Board for Christian Higher Education in Asia, the World Health Organization, the Fulbright Program, the Korea Foundation, the Japan Foundation, and The Swedish Foundation for International Cooperation in Research and Higher Education (STINT).

The University's constituent colleges as well as other academic units have individually established links with universities abroad.

International Links

China Links

The University and its staff have developed academic links and research collaboration with many educational and research institutions on the mainland and in Taiwan. Over the years, the scope of such exchange activities have expanded considerably to include all academic and research areas. Each year the University receives some 1,000 academic visitors from the mainland, who participate in research work and give lectures and seminars. Formal exchange agreements have been concluded by the University or its academic departments with over 30 institutions, including Peking University, Tsinghua University, the Chinese Academy of Sciences, Beijing Medical University, Beijing Normal University, Central Music Conservatory, Beijing University of Posts and Telecommunications, University of International Business and Economics, Fudan University, Shanghai Jiaotong University, Wuhan University, Soochow University, Zhejiang University, Zhongshan University, South China Normal University, and Lanzhou University. The University also offers management training courses for administrators of universities and major business enterprises on the mainland. Teachers of the University serve as honorary professors, advisers and consultants to various mainland institutions.

The University's Beijing Liaison Office, located in Nange of Peking University, has been in operation since the beginning of 1998. It provides logistics support to exchange activities conducted by University members and helps to enhance cooperation with mainland institutions.

As regards academic exchange and collaborative programmes with universities in Taiwan, regular exchange programmes for staff and students have been maintained with Taiwan University during the last few years. The University also plays an active role in promoting trilateral exchange with Peking University and Taiwan University, including organizing academic conferences and inter-university student ball games.

Through the Office of Academic Links (China), the University has helped found the Association of University Presidents of China (AUPC) and serves as its Secretariat in Hong Kong. Other members of the AUPC are Fudan University, Hong Kong University of Science and Technology, Nanjing University, Peking University, Shanghai Jiaotong University, Tsinghua University, The University of Hong Kong, Xi'an Jiaotong University, and Zhejiang University. President of Peking University Prof. Chen Jiaer serves as the first AUPC president, while Prof. Wang Da-zhong, president of Tsinghua University and Prof. Arthur K.C. Li, vice-chancellor of The Chinese University, are the vice-presidents.

HE CONSTITUENT Colleges

With the reorganization of the University following the enactment of The Chinese University of Hong Kong Ordinance 1976, the boards of trustees of the three original colleges, viz. Chung Chi College, New Asia College and The United College of Hong Kong, were reconstituted. Each college board is mainly concerned with the management of the movable property and of certain college buildings entrusted to it, as well as the promotion of scholastic and cultural activities of the college.

Each college is governed by an assembly of fellows chaired by the college head, and this assembly is responsible for making and implementing decisions on various matters relating to the college.

In January 1986 the University received a generous donation of HK\$100 million, and subsequently an additional gift of HK\$10 million, from the Shaw Foundation (Hong Kong) Ltd. for the establishment of a fourth college in the University. The University Council subsequently decided that the new college be named 'Shaw College' and invited Sir Run Run Shaw to be its patron. To give legal effect to such a development, 'The Chinese University of Hong Kong (Declaration of Shaw College) Ordinance 1986' was enacted in July 1986. The new college admitted its first students in 1988.

CHUNG CHI COLLEGE



Chung Chi College was founded in October 1951 by the representatives of Protestant churches in Hong Kong to meet the need for a local institution of higher learning that would be both Chinese and Christian. In 1955, it was formally incorporated under an ordinance of the government.



The college had a very modest beginning with borrowed and rented premises, first in the Cathedral Hall and St. Paul's Coeducational College, then in Caine Road and Lower Albert Road. Expansion was made possible by financial help from church organizations in North America and Britain. Local churches, firms, and private individuals also gave considerable support. In 1956 the college moved to its permanent site in the Ma Liu Shui valley. Between

1959 and 1963 the college received the bulk of its funds from the government. In 1963 the college was incorporated as one of the three colleges of The Chinese University of Hong Kong.

Chung Chi College started its religious education and theological training programme in 1957. After the establishment of The Chinese University of Hong Kong in 1963, the college set up a Theology Division for the training of Christian ministers, and later established its own Chaplaincy Office to promote religious activities which include college assemblies, Sunday worship services, and Christian fellowship programmes.

Academic and cultural activities are regularly organized for both staff and students of the college. They include seminars, college life luncheon talks, annual education conferences, the Siu Lien Ling Wong Visiting Fellows Programme, and various exchange and visitor programmes. Students are also encouraged to take part in extracurricular activities organized by the college student union, departmental societies, class societies, and various interest groups and student hostel associations.

In 1997–98 Chung Chi College had a student population of 2,361, of whom 1,016 were male and 1,345 were female. While most of the students were born in Hong Kong, a few of them were overseas Chinese. About two-fifths of the students were Christians.

NEW ASIA COLLEGE



New Asia College was founded in 1949 by its former president, the late Dr. Ch'ien Mu, and a small group of scholars from mainland China. Their aim was to preserve traditional Chinese culture and to balance it with Western learning so that students might understand their cultural heritage and at the same time be capable of coping with the challenges of the modern world.

The college had a humble beginning but soon attracted support both locally and from overseas. Since 1954, it has had the cooperation and support of the Yale-China Association which has been active in educational development in China for many years. It has also received support from other educational institutions and foundations, notably the Harvard-Yenching Institute, the Asia Foundation, the Rockefeller Foundation, the British Council,

the Mencius Foundation, the Ford Foundation, and the Ming Yu Cultural Foundation. As a grant college from 1959 to 1963, and a constituent college of the University thereafter, it has received generous financial support from the government.

Scholarly visits and other cultural activities are arranged throughout the year under different programmes such as the Ch'ien Mu Lecture in History and Culture Programme, the New Asia Ming Yu Foundation



Visiting Scholars Programme, the New Asia S.Y. Chung Visiting Fellows Programme, the New Asia David Lam Economist Exchange Programme, and the Y.S. Hui Exchange Programme in Fine Arts. Extracurricular activities form an important part of student life in the college and are organized by the college student union and a host of student clubs and societies.

In 1997-98, New Asia College had a student population of 2,254, of whom 1,011 were male and 1,243 were female. Approximately 50 per cent of the student population received scholarships, bursaries or other forms of financial assistance.

UNITED COLLEGE



United College was founded in 1956 with the amalgamation of five postsecondary colleges: Canton Overseas College, Kwang Hsia College, Wah Kiu College, Wen Hua College, and Ping Jing College of Accountancy. The five colleges decided to pool their resources to provide better higher education for local students. The United College of Hong Kong was subsequently incorporated under an ordinance of the government in 1957 with a board of trustees as its governing body.

In 1962, the membership of the board of trustees was broadened to include representation from the local community, and Dr. the Hon. Kenneth



Ping-fan Fung was elected chairman of the board. In July 1962, the board appointed Mr. T.C. Cheng, then Chief Assistant Secretary for Chinese Affairs in the government, as president of the college. Dr. Cheng assumed office in January 1963. In October 1963, United College became a constituent college of The Chinese University of Hong Kong.

In March 1971, foundation stones were laid for the five new buildings of the college on the

University campus in Sha Tin. In December, the college moved from Bonham Road on Hong Kong Island to its present site on the University campus.

Dr. the Hon. P.C. Woo succeeded Sir Kenneth as the chairman of the college board in May 1972, a position he had to resign from in November 1983 when he was appointed a member of the University Council. He was succeeded by Sir Run Run Shaw as chairman. In December 1988, Dr. Woo was made a permanent member of the board. Sir Run Run was elected honorary chairman and permanent member of the board in December 1991. and was succeeded by Dr. Ho Tim as chairman. Dr. Ho Tim retired from this position in June 1995, and is now a permanent member of the board. The current elected chairman is Mr. Shum Choi-sang.

An endowment fund was established in 1973 under the direction of the board of trustees. It provides essential financial support to many projects and schemes organized by the college, benefiting both students and staff members.

The student union of the college was first inaugurated in 1963 as a statutory body to represent the interests of the students of the college and provide them with various services. With financial support from the University and the endowment fund of the college, a wide range of extracurricular activities and intellectual exchange projects are organized every year.

In 1997-98, a total of 2,278 students were assigned to United College, of whom 959 were male and 1,319 were female.

SHAW COLLEGE



Named after its patron, Shaw College was made possible by the generosity of Sir Run Run Shaw, chairman of the Shaw Foundation (Hong Kong) Ltd., which donated HK\$110 million to the University for the founding of its fourth constituent college.

An ordinance which gave legal effect to this new development in the University was passed by the Legislative Council in July 1986, and became

law on 1st August of the same year. A Board of Trustees of Shaw College then came into being and helped chart the course of the college's development in collaboration with a planning committee appointed by the University Council. Chaired by the former vice-chancellor, Prof. Ma Lin, the planning committee was in turn advised by Dr. Lee Quo-wei, Dr. T.K. Ann, Mr. H.J. Shen and Mr. Louis Page.

The foundation stones for the first four buildings of the


college were laid on 12th January 1987 by Sir David Akers-Jones, then Acting Governor of Hong Kong, and Sir Run Run Shaw, patron of the college. In June 1987 the college set up its temporary offices in the Chung Chi Teaching Block near the University KCR Station. In September 1989 the first student hostel (which can accommodate 584 students) was completed. In October 1989, the administration building, Wen Lan Tang, and the visiting scholars units-cum-staff quarters, Ya Qun Lodge, were also opened for administrative staff, teachers and students of the college. A lecture theatre with a seating capacity of 537 was completed towards the end of 1991. A second student hostel, with 289 places, was completed in the summer of 1992.

On 2nd March 1990, Shaw College was officially opened by Sir David Wilson, Governor of Hong Kong and Chancellor of the University, and the patron of Shaw College, Sir Run Run Shaw.

Since the formal establishment of the assembly of fellows in June 1987, numerous academic and cultural activities have been planned and organized. They include monthly dinner lectures and visits by Sir Run Run Shaw Distinguished Visiting Scholars.

Extracurricular activities form an important part of student life in Shaw College. The first student union was formed in April 1990, and various activities have been organized by different clubs and societies.

In 1997-98, Shaw College had a student population of 2,260, of whom 1,057 were male and 1,203 were female. The first batch of students graduated in mid-June 1990, and an alumni association was formed soon afterwards.



PART 3 RESEARCH UNITS AND UNIVERSITY EXTENSIONS





The University has established nine institutes to provide faculty members with financial support and other facilities for research. They include the Institute of Chinese Studies, the Research Institute for the Humanities, the Asia-Pacific Institute of Business, the Hong Kong Institute of Educational Research, the Hong Kong Cancer Institute, the Institute of Science and Technology, the Institute of Mathematical Sciences, the Hong Kong Institute of Asia-Pacific Studies, and the Hong Kong Institute of Biotechnology Limited.

The Institute of Chinese Studies was established in 1967 on the basis of a broad conception of Chinese studies. Its activities include what is traditionally identified as Sinology, but emphasize the application of scientific methodology, characterized by quantitative and comparative approaches, and the use of experimental methods where appropriate. Areas of studies related to contemporary Chinese culture and society have also been included amongst its activities.

The objectives of the institute are to promote Chinese studies by serving as an international centre for maintaining communication and cooperation with other academic and research institutions and scholars in this field; to provide local and visiting academic members of the University with funding and research facilities; to promote the exchange of knowledge and experience in Chinese studies through publications, conferences, and research seminars; and to foster the growth of modern Chinese culture.

Under the Institute of Chinese Studies are the Art Museum, the Centre for Chinese Archaeology and Art, The Ng Tor-tai Chinese Language Research Centre, the Research Centre for Translation, and the Research Centre for Contemporary Chinese Culture, each of which maintains its own academic programme and publication activities. The institute publishes four periodicals — Journal of Chinese Studies, Renditions, Chinese Language Newsletter, and Twenty-First Century, and maintains a long-term project on constructing a comprehensive database of ancient Chinese texts. The reference reading room of the institute contains 33,150 volumes of books and 320 periodicals.

The Art Museum, established in 1971 as the Art Gallery, serves as a university museum and a research centre for Chinese art and archaeology. Along with semi-permanent displays of its collection, the museum mounts special exhibitions and organizes lectures and symposia to promote the appreciation and understanding of Chinese art.

The museum collection consists of over 7,000 pieces of Chinese art from the Neolithic to modern periods, including painting and calligraphy. rubbings of ancient calligraphy, seals, ceramics, jades, bronzes, lacquerwares and objects for the scholar's studio. Notable among them are archaic seals, calligraphic rubbings, painting and calligraphy by Guangdong artists, and ceramics from kilns of southern China.

The Art Museum publishes fully illustrated catalogues of special exhibitions and monographs of its collection.

The Annex provides technical support for the museum. This includes the conservation of works of art, the mounting of Chinese painting, woodwork, photographic and graphic design services. The Yeung Shui Sang Laboratory for Thermoluminescence of Ancient Ceramics, established jointly with the Department of Physics, conducts research on the dating of ancient Chinese ceramics and offers TL dating service to the public.

The Friends of the Art Museum was founded in 1981 to support the Art Museum and to promote its activities. Membership is open to the public.

The centre was established in 1978 to undertake research in Chinese archaeology and art. The purpose was to pool the resources of the Art Museum and the departments of history, fine arts and anthropology to promote research cooperation with museums and universities in mainland China and abroad. Recently the centre has shifted the emphasis to field archaeology, and its field work team has become active in local excavations as well as collaborative projects with research institutes on the mainland and in southeast Asia. The centre has published several series of monographs and books on specialized subjects.

The Ng Tortai Chinese Language Research Centre

The centre has its origin in the Chinese Linguistics Research Centre which was first established in 1966. In early 1979, it was expanded into the Chinese Language Research Centre, and in 1980 it was further renamed The Ng Tortai Chinese Language Research Centre.

The main objective of the centre is to engage in comprehensive research on the Chinese language including areas such as the Chinese script, pronunciation, grammar, and vocabulary, and to make available to the public as well as teachers of Chinese the results of its research, in the hope of raising the standard of Chinese language teaching in Hong Kong.

Research Centre for Contemporary Chinese Culture

In 1971, a Centre for Translation Projects was established with a grant from the Asia Foundation. It was renamed Research Centre for Translation in 1983. The centre has concerned itself with research in translation studies and the publication of Chinese literature in English translation.

Centre publications include the English-language journal, Renditions, published semiannually since 1973, as well as the Renditions Books and Renditions Paperbacks series.

The centre has strong links with major centres of translation studies on the mainland, in Europe and the US. The Chinese Medicinal Material Research Centre (CMMRC), a centre of excellence in the University, was established in 1979 to facilitate and promote multi- and inter-disciplinary research on traditional Chinese medicine (TCM). Its aim is to document and evaluate the true efficacy of TCM, to explore its better application, and to upgrade its scientific contents. Research is focused on the authentication, quality control, safety, and efficacy of TCM.

The centre has a museum with over 2,500 herb specimens, and employs morphological, anatomical, chemical, and genomic-fingerprinting approaches to check the authenticity of materials used in TCM. The centre's Laboratory for the Quality Control of Chinese Medicines and Health Foods Based on Chemical Components helps the herbal manufacturing industry develop protocols and chemical markers to determine and standardize the quality of proprietary TCM products. CMMRC also provides assistance to local and overseas agencies in dealing with suspected cases of herbal poisoning. Its current research on the efficacy and application of TCM centres around herbs for treating cough, gastrointestinal disorder, viral and cardiovascular diseases,

Chinese Medicinal Material Research Centre and immune disorders, and the integration of Chinese and Western medicine.

Since 1996, CMMRC has been collaborating with related institutions on the mainland to develop TCM databases in both Chinese and English. It also coordinates a project to develop a standard set of medical subject headings for TCM, and works with Beijing University of Traditional Chinese Medicine to develop a multi-media CD-ROM for teaching use.

Established in 1992, the centre provides a base for interdisciplinary and collaborative research on materials. Activities include the analysis of the structure and properties of advanced materials, the development of applications for new materials, and the synthesis and processing of new materials to serve the needs of local industries.

To accomplish such tasks, a tandem accelerator worth HK\$8 million was installed in March 1997 for ion beam analysis - Rutherford backscattering spectroscopy, ion channelling, nuclear reaction analysis, particle induced X-ray emission, elastic recoil detection, MeV ion implantation, and ion beam mixing for the modification of materials. This facility is the only one of its type available in Hong Kong and southern China. The research centre is staffed by faculty members of the departments of physics, chemistry, mechanical and automation engineering, and electronic engineering, whose research interests cover elemental and compound semiconductors, exotic ceramics, and metal alloys. Particular emphasis is placed on studies of the properties of many materials and their processing in various forms — single crystal, heteroepitaxial, microcrystalline, amorphous, and porous.

The mathematical sciences are in a period of unprecedented growth. Sophisticated mathematical and computational tools are rapidly bridging the gap between abstract theory and applications in science, engineering and other disciplines. The University thus set up the Institute of Mathematical Sciences in 1993 to promote research in relevant fields — pure mathematics, scientific computation, image processing, mathematical and theoretical physics, and statistics. Emphasis is on their interaction and linkage with the physical sciences, engineering, industry, and commerce. The institute's major research projects are led by senior academics in the departments of mathematics, physics, and statistics.

The institute also organizes international mathematical conferences to promote academic exchange. The institute's objectives are to promote and stimulate research in new frontiers, train and nurture young scientists, bring in grants and contracts from governmental organizations and the private sector, and develop into a centre of excellence.

Activities in the pipeline include yearly programmes in geometrical analysis; mirror symmetry and string theory; harmonic functions, fractals and wavelets; concentration phenomena in nonlinear elliptic equations; scientific and parallel computation; and numerical relativity and astrophysics. The institute also plans to strengthen collaboration with institutions on the mainland and abroad, and to lead research in the region.

Established in 1990, the Hong Kong Institute of Asia-Pacific Studies replaces the former Institute of Social Studies and its two research centres - the Centre for Hong Kong Studies and the Centre for Contemporary Asian Studies, and aspires to become a research and academic centre of excellence in the interrelated study of Hong Kong, mainland China, and the Asia-Pacific region.

With its focus on social science research, the institute plans strategic research programmes on the Hong Kong and Asia-Pacific economies as they develop in the 1990s. Topics include economic competitiveness and cooperation, reform and development of China in the 1990s, cultural relations and identities in East Asia, urban and regional development in the Asia-Pacific, gender in a changing world, the political development of Hong Kong, social indicators and the social development of Hong Kong. A collaborative research programme on southern China, Hong Kong and Taiwan has also been established with Yale University's Council of East Asian Studies. There is a strong policy orientation in all the research programmes being undertaken.

To support its research activities, the institute has been building up a data bank on Hong Kong, mainland China and the Asia-Pacific countries. Significant contribution in this respect has come from the Universities Service Centre, which is an important support centre for scholars in China studies. The affiliation of the acclaimed Universities Service Centre with the institute has greatly strengthened the documentation resources of the latter.

Another important task of the institute is to promote academic exchange, host conferences, receive visiting researchers, and publish research findings.

Hong Kong Institute of Biotechnology Ltd. (HKIB), a subsidiary of the Council of The Chinese University of Hong Kong, is a non-profit private company founded in 1989 with a donation from The Hong Kong Jockey Club Charities Trust. Its mission is to provide the catalyst and essential infrastructure for the emergence of a biotechnology industry in Hong Kong. It adopts a three-pronged corporate development strategy: (i) pilot production of human therapeutics for clinical trials; (ii) development of bioreactor-based plant micro-propagation technologies; and (iii) launching an incubator programme.

With grants from the Industrial Support Fund, HKIB established a GMP Manufacturing Technology Centre for Human Vaccines and Pharmaceuticals (GMP-MTC), a Pharmaceutical Technology Centre (PTC), a Plant Biotechnology Laboratory (PBL), and an Incubator Facility (IF). The GMP-MTC has a pilot plant that produces clinical grade bio-pharmaceuticals under Good Manufacturing Practice (GMP) guidelines for phase I and phase II human trials of innovative products. The PTC offers consultation service on GMP implementation to pharmaceutical companies. The PBL has developed cost-effective cell culture systems to mass produce high-quality Korean ginseng and value-added ornament plants. The IF now houses a number of companies that commercialize entrepreneurial R&D fruition.

With a grant from the United Nations Development Programme, the World Bank, and the World Health Organization, and under a collaborative research and development agreement with the National Institute of Allergy and Infectious Diseases of the National Institute of Health (NIH) in the US, the GMP-MTC is producing TBV25H for phase I human safety trials that will be carried out concurrently at NIH in the US and the Prince of Wales Hospital in Hong Kong.

The Biotechnology Laboratory was established in 1986 with a special grant from The Croucher Foundation and Dr. Ho Tim. Established in 1991 under the Department of Biology, the Research Laboratory for Food Science aims to serve the food industries in Hong Kong and mainland China through the development of new food products and new technology in food processing. The activities of the laboratory are focused on the modernization of procedures in the processing of traditional Chinese food items, and the use of integrative biotechnology in developing health food products.

Research projects under way include the evaluation of the medicinal and nutritional value of mushrooms; development of mushroom-based health food items; quality control in the canning of mushrooms; cloning of DNA associated with shrimp-derived allergens; application of molecular biology to mushroom breeding; evaluation of mushrooms as a source for commercial flavourants; development of microbial products for use in the food industries; upgrading of food industry wastes into added-value products; genetically engineering plants for improved food quality; and the use of plants as bioreactors to produce specialty products.

The University's School of Continuing Studies (SCS) was established in 1965 under the former name of the Department of Extramural Studies. It has been providing quality continuing education programmes and services to meet the changing needs of society. In 1997-98, more than 1,150 courses were offered with a total enrolment of around 23,000.

The SCS offers both general short courses and certificate, diploma, degree, and postgraduate programmes.

General short courses normally last for three to four months and are usually self-enrichment programmes with no specific admission requirements except age. They are offered three times a year in spring, summer, and autumn and cover various subjects such as art, culture, business administration, health care, computer, languages, social science, home care, and women studies.

Sub-degree diploma and certificate programmes have been offered since 1979. These are designed in accordance with guidelines and standards set by the University and provide opportunities for professionals to upgrade their knowledge and expertise. To optimize resource use and cost-effectiveness, the SCS collaborates with the academic departments at the University as well as other institutions and professional organizations to organize or administer these professional programmes.

Since 1988, the SCS has diversified its services to include the running of postgraduate degree programmes in Hong Kong jointly with overseas universities. These programmes include a Master of Arts Programme in Business and Economics with the University of Oklahoma (USA); a Graduate Diploma Programme in Business Administration (first year MBA Programme) with Monash University; a Master Degree Programme and Graduate Diploma Programme in Health Management, and a Master Degree Programme as well as a Graduate Diploma Programme in Health Science (Gerontology) with the University of New England (Australia); a Bachelor Degree Programme in Nursing with La Trobe University (Australia); and a Bachelor Degree of Business Systems Support (Computing) with the Victoria University of Technology (Australia). Collaboration with mainland universities is also increasing: a Certificate Programme in Traditional Chinese Medicine is jointly offered with the Chengdu University of Traditional Chinese Medicine of Szechuan Province, and a Graduate Diploma Programme in China Law is jointly offered with the Adult Education Institute of the China University of Political Science and Law.

A number of professional training programmes were developed last year. They include a Diploma Programme in Telecommunications Technology and Management, a Graduate Diploma and a Diploma Programme in Nutrition Education for Early Childhood Personnel, a Diploma in Police Studies, a Diploma in Policing/Security Technology, and a Diploma Programme in Teaching English as a Second Language.

To enable working adults to further their studies at their desired pace, distance education programmes are delivered via correspondence courses, self-learning packages and special training programmes. Distance education courses include certificate programmes in business English and introductory Japanese.

For development and academic affairs relating to sub-degree programmes, the SCS is under the supervision of the Senate Committee on Continuing Studies while administrative affairs is supervised by the SCS Management Board. An Advisory Board of Continuing Studies comprising renowned persons from the business sector and veteran staff of the University gives advice on directions of development.

The office of the SCS is located on the 13th floor of the Oriental Centre, 67 Chatham Road South, Tsimshatsui, Kowloon, and classrooms are found on the 8th, 14th and 17th floors of the same building, as well as rented school premises in Wanchai, Tai Koo Shing, Yaumatei, Jordan and Mei Foo. The classrooms at the Oriental Centre have recently been renovated to improve the learning and teaching environment. SCS prospectus, programme brochures and leaflets are obtainable upon request.

The New Asia Yale-in-China Chinese Language Centre offers courses in Putonghua and Cantonese designed primarily for non-native speakers of Chinese. Founded in 1963 under the joint auspices of New Asia College and the Yale-China Association, the centre became a part of the University in 1974.

Every year over 1,100 students from different parts of the world are admitted to the language centre, ranging from absolute beginners to trained sinologists who wish to polish their spoken Chinese or learn a new Chinese dialect. Courses are offered at all levels so that students can find training suited to their needs and ability. The language centre also teaches Putonghua regularly to thousands of Cantonese-speaking students of the University. In addition, it cooperates with University units in a range of language activities, such as with the Faculty of Education in a special Putonghua course for secondary school teachers. Teachers of the language centre prepare a significant portion of their teaching material and audio-visual aids.

The centre operates on a three-term system, with the first and second terms lasting approximately 15 weeks each, and the summer term 10 weeks. Students may register for admission to any term. Beginners' courses are offered every term. The full-time programme of 15 sessions of classroom instruction per week constitutes the maximum course load. The maximum class size is eight students. In exceptional cases, private tutorials and part-time classes are available.


The centre has a full complement of tapes for teaching purposes. Language laboratory facilities are also available.

The centre gives credits according to the American system and issues grades and transcripts. Courses taken at the centre have been recognized by major universities for degree credit. For students from institutions not using the credit system, transcripts are prepared in sufficient detail to present a clear picture of the work accomplished by each student.

THE LIBRARY SYSTEM

The University Library System coordinates the collections and services of the University Library and the branch libraries — the Elisabeth Luce Moore Library of Chung Chi College, the Ch'ien Mu Library of New Asia College, the Wu Chung Library of United College, the Li Ping Medical Library at the teaching hospital complex in Sha Tin, and the Architecture Library. Excluding the Medical Library, they can accommodate a total of more than 2,200 readers. The holdings of the Library System as of 31st December 1997 exceed 1,380,000 items. The entire collection of the Library System comprises approximately 555,000 volumes of books and bound journals in East Asian languages, 825,000 volumes in Western languages, 2,698 current journals in East Asian languages and 7,129 in Western languages. Students can borrow books and journals from any library and search items in the Online Public Catalogue of the University Library System.

The University Library houses extensive collections in science, social science and business administration, and each of the branch libraries at the colleges has some unique features. The Elisabeth Luce Moore Library holds strong collections in education, music, and religious studies. The Ch'ien Mu Library houses good collections in Chinese literature, fine arts, and philosophy. The Wu Chung Library has a Hong Kong Collection, a notable Modern Drama Collection, and an Electronic Resources Centre. Also located in the Wu Chung Library is the American Studies Resource Library whose nucleus collection comprises an interdisciplinary resource donated by the USIS American Library and a recently donated William Faulkner Collection. Medical collections are housed in two different locations — pre-clinical materials in the University Library and clinical materials in the Li Ping Medical Library. The Architecture Library collection covers subjects in the buildings industry and environmental sciences.

In addition, there are facilities for the use of microforms, audio-visual materials and electronic resources. The University Library System subscribes to hundreds of online databases, of which most are accessible via the Campus Network. Internet access to World Wide Web is also available. The University

Library System has a specially designed library homepage with a variety of information on the system's operation, services, and resources and includes linkage to local and internet resource centres. Services offered include circulation, reserve books, interlibrary loan and reference service.

Universities Service Centre

The Universities Service Centre provides a comprehensive, user-friendly collection of original source materials on contemporary China for scholars all over the world. The centre's library on post-1949 China is incomparable in its coverage: complete runs from the early 1950s up to the present of most of China's provincial and national newspapers; a collection of provincial yearbooks; many hundreds of county gazetteers; and a judiciously chosen collection of the most valuable books available on the mainland, many of which are unavailable elsewhere in the world. Currently the centre subscribes to 2,000 magazines in Chinese and over 80 in English, and to more than 400 Chinese newspapers. The centre also regularly organizes luncheon seminars on China studies.

The Universities Service Centre is committed to serving scholars in contemporary China studies everywhere. Overseas researchers at or above the graduate level are eligible to use the centre free of charge. Faculty of local tertiary institutions as well as local students enrolled in China-related courses can also have access to its collection.

THE CHINESE UNIVERSITY PRESS

The University started its publishing activities in 1967. After a decade of experience in this field the University established The Chinese University Press in 1977. Its book list now totals over 800 titles in English or Chinese covering various subjects, but mostly on Chinese culture or China studies. These publications are widely distributed in Asia, North America, Europe, and Australia.

Since 1988 the Press has also published general books in addition to its academic publications. Last year the Press published 41 academic and general titles, including books in special series such as the Hong Kong Studies Series, the paperback series of the Hong Kong Centre for Economic Research, and the Institute of Chinese Studies Series.

In April 1991, the Press began producing audio and video tapes on educational and commercial subjects, including language skills, management for business executives, and clinical education in various medical disciplines. To date, 61 audio-visual programmes have been published.

The Press has good connections with many university presses and academic institutions and societies in Hong Kong and overseas. It has copublished books with other publishers and institutions, such as St. Martins, the SOAS of the University of London, and the university presses of Columbia, Harvard, Oxford, Princeton, and Washington. It has also entered into joint publication arrangements with commercial publishers in the US, the UK, mainland China, Taiwan, South Korea, Australia, Japan, and Sweden.

The Chinese University Press is a member of the Association for Asian Studies, the International Association of Scholarly Publishers, and the Society for Scholarly Publishing. It is also an international member of the Association of American University Presses.

COMPUTER SERVICES CENTRE/ INFORMATION TECHNOLOGY SERVICE UNIT

The Computer Services Centre/Information Technology Service Unit (CSC/ITSU) at Pi Ch'iu Building offers a variety of services to support academic development, research, and administration. Its service arm does not stop at technical support and application or project development, but stretches to areas like system recommendation, acquisition, installation and subsequent maintenance.

Functional Services

CSC/ITSU provides seven key functional services to users:

- · basic computer resources;
- · programming consultation;
- training seminars and user documentation on the use of computer systems and application packages;
- microcomputer application support, technology transfer, office automation and research:
- workstation support including advice on hardware selection and subsequent installation, user training, on-going consultation and system administration;
- evaluation, selection and installation of network equipment; the monitoring
 of networking activities between the University and the rest of the world;
 and
- development and production of management information systems for University administration.

Computer Systems

To provide efficient services, CSC/ITSU has multiplexed its computer facilities. This full range of computer equipment includes:

- an SGI Origin 2000 supercomputer with 24 CPUs for computation intensive research;
- · a multi-processor UNIX server which provides data library services;
- a cluster of Hewlett Packard UNIX servers and workstations for services like campus-wide electronic mail (CWEM), research and instructional computing system (ASC), campus-wide information systems (CWIS) and World-Wide-Web (WWW);

- a DEC AXP server which provides genetic software package;
- several IBM AS/400 machines and UNIX machines that support the development and production of management information of the University administration; and
- a large pool of IBM compatible PCs and Macintoshes netted in a Novell Local Area Network. They facilitate PC software application development and furnish access points to other mainframes, minis as well as campus network applications. These personal computers are located at the User Area on 1/F, Pi Ch'iu Building, and Room 103 of Wong Foo Yuan Building.

All the computer systems are connected by an advanced campus backbone network for the sharing of databases and applications. Except the Novell Local Area Network, all are accessible to users in various departments, colleges, and student dormitories. They are also accessible to the personal computers of University staff and students at home via the public telephone switched network.

The special-purpose laboratories are furnished with high-tech facilities for multi-media development, optical mark scanning, colour printing, image scanning, data visualization, and user self-paced learning.

Networking

The campus-wide backbone network has been upgraded gradually from an FDDI (Fibre Distributed Data Interface) backbone to an ATM (Asynchronous Transfer Mode) since early 1997. Connections between switches can now be made at the speed of 155Mbps and 622Mbps. The network is also a member of the Hong Kong Academic and Research Network (HARNET), a wide area ATM network linking the campus networks of eight tertiary institutions in Hong Kong.

In January 1997, CSC/ITSU set up a Residence Network (ResNet) to provide access points to the Internet and campus network applications for students boarding on campus.

CSS/ITSU also plays an important role in the Internet in Hong Kong by

- · operating the Hong Kong Internet eXchange (HKIX), which acts as a neutral interconnection point for the routing of intra-Hong Kong and intra-Asia-Pacific Internet traffic, to eliminate the necessity for local information to be sent overseas before being routed back to Hong Kong and to provide faster and less expensive paths to local sites;
- operating the registration of name(s) under the .hk domain;
- · maintaining a list of WWW servers in Hong Kong;
- · exchanging thousands of USENET newsgroups with many ISPs; and
- supporting the 'Radio Television Hong Kong (RTHK) on Internet' project.

SERVICES FOR STUDENTS AND STUDENT ACTIVITIES

The Office of Student Affairs attends to student welfare and helps students take full advantage of their university education. The activities of the office are administered through the following six units.

The University Appointments Service is a centre for career guidance and employment information. It is responsible for initiating and developing job opportunities for graduates of the University, helping employers with their recruitment of the University's graduates, and organizing career guidance programmes. It also administers guidance services to students who intend to further their studies after graduation.

The Student Activities Section coordinates university-wide student activities, liaises with the student unions and their affiliated societies. and provides assistance and advice for various student functions and activities.

The Scholarships and Financial Aid Section administers scholarships, bursaries, general loans, student bridging loans, summer subsistence loans, student travel loans, student campus work schemes and financial assistance schemes for disabled students, and assists in the administration of the Government Financial Aid Schemes.

The Psychological Counselling Unit provides individual counselling and crisis intervention to help students cope with developmental, emotional, interpersonal, study, and other adjustment problems. It organizes workshops and group activities which focus on personal growth and self-understanding, interpersonal skills, and stress management. It also runs programmes aimed at promoting mental health, conducts surveys on students' mental health and psychological needs, and provides consultation to colleagues, allied professionals, and student bodies on matters pertaining to psychological service and mental health.

The Student Amenities/Staff/Student Centres Management Section is responsible for managing student amenity facilities in the Benjamin Franklin Centre and the John Fulton Centre. It also coordinates policies on catering services and student hostels.

The Statistics, Research and Publication Unit undertakes research and statistical work related to the career development of graduates and the general characteristics and need assessments of students. It also coordinates the editing and production of all official publications of the Office of Student Affairs, such as University Marketplace, Appointments Service News Bulletin, Student Activities Handbook, A Handbook of Scholarships and Financial Aid to Students, Pamphlets on Study Skills.

Counselling on social, interpersonal, financial as well as academic problems is also provided by the dean of students' office at each college. These offices administer college scholarship and bursary awards and also play a vital role in the enrichment of college life. In close cooperation and collaboration with the college student unions and their affiliated societies, the dean of students' offices also oversee the running of college-wide student activities.

At present, there are five student unions in the University — one each for Chung Chi College, New Asia College, United College, and Shaw College, and one for the University as a whole. The latter maintains close links with the college unions and coordinates university-wide activities. All year round a wide range of academic, athletic, cultural, as well as social activities are organized by the student unions. These include the freshmen orientation camp, the swimming gala, and the University track and field meet.

HEALTH SERVICE

The University Health Service is charged with the responsibility of meeting the health needs of students, staff, and their dependents. A comprehensive primary care service has been developed to handle the medical and dental problems of users.

The Health Centre is open from 9.00 a.m. to 5.00 p.m. Monday through Friday and from 9.00 a.m. to 12.30 p.m. on Saturday. Services include

- · diagnosis, counselling, preventive and curative treatment, diagnostic laboratory tests, and physiotherapy;
- · health education programmes and other related activities;
- dental consultation and examination, preventive treatment, prosthodontics and minor surgeries, urgent dental treatment (for emergencies only);
- · physical examinations for certification purposes;
- coordination of access to special laboratory and x-ray services, referrals to appropriate specialists, treatment centres, or hospitals.

No charges are levied on any of the clinical services provided directly by the University Health Service, with the exception of dental services.

SPORTS FACILITIES

Sports facilities on campus include two sports fields, three gymnasiums, a swimming pool, 14 tennis courts, nine squash courts, four weight training rooms, several multi-purpose courts, and a water sports centre.

The sports fields are built with covered spectator stands on the lowlands facing the sea. The Haddon-Cave Sports Field (with a seating capacity of 2,800 and flood-light facilities) comprises a 400-metre all-weather track, a soccer pitch and a handball court. The Chung Chi Sports Field provides a 400-metre track, a soccer pitch, a basketball court and a volleyball court. Each of the three indoor gymnasiums (New Asia, United, and University) houses badminton courts, basketball/volleyball courts, dance studios and tabletennis tables. There are six squash courts in the Kwok Sports Building beside the University Sports Centre. The multi-purpose hall on the Chung Chi campus provides similar facilities on a slightly smaller scale. On the Shaw College campus, there are three indoor squash courts and a games hall. Adjacent to the Benjamin Franklin Centre, which is a staff-student amenities building, is an outdoor Olympic-sized swimming pool. The Water Sports Centre is located on the Tolo Harbour shoreline.

THE SIR RUN RUN SHAW HALL

The Sir Run Run Shaw Hall is a well-equipped auditorium with a seating capacity of 1,439, designed for holding ceremonies, assemblies, meetings, lectures and exhibitions, and for staging concerts, plays and film shows. The hall also utilizes its own Cultural Activities Fund to present and sponsor high-quality stage performances and film shows, as well as to organize activities such as talks and workshops related to the performing arts.

NEORMATION AND PUBLIC RELATIONS SERVICES

The Information and Public Relations Office of the University Secretariat is mainly responsible for providing information and public relations services both internally and externally.

It maintains close liaison with the media. This includes answering press enquiries, organizing press conferences, press interviews and media gatherings, and issuing press releases regularly on University news and developments.

The office handles both internal and external enquiries, informs the University community about campus activities through the publication of Campus Events, compiles the University's telephone directory, and helps update information about the University for local and overseas publications.

It is also responsible for organizing official functions such as degree congregations, public lectures, seminars, agreement signing and presentation ceremonies.

It plays host to local and overseas visitors and produces brochures, CD-ROMs and videos introducing the University to visitors.

University Publications

The Publication Office of the University Secretariat produces five major publications that provide different types of information about the University.

The Chinese University of Hong Kong Calendar, published in Chinese and English in autumn each year, is a university catalogue that contains essential information about the history, organization, facilities, regulations, and academic programmes of the University. Copies are on sale at the University Bookshop.

The Chinese University of Hong Kong Annual Report is published

around December each year to review the major developments of the University in the previous academic year.

Chinese University Bulletin (website http://www.cuhk.edu.hk/puo/ bulletin/index.htm) is published twice a year to give information about University activities, developments and recent achievements. A Professorial Inaugural Lecture Series, a Wei Lun Lecture Series, and other special issues are published as supplements of the Chinese University Bulletin. The bulletin and its supplements are distributed free to members and friends of the University.

CUHK Newsletter (website http://www.cuhk.edu.hk/puo/newslter/ news.htm) is published on a fortnightly basis and carries University news, announcements, personalia, as well as interviews and feature articles. It is primarily intended for staff members of the University.

The Chinese University of Hong Kong Student Handbook contains detailed descriptions of undergraduate programmes offered by the University. Produced by the Publication Office based on information supplied by the University Registry, it is published around July each year.

Information about research activities and staff publications is contained in an annual publication entitled Research Projects and Publications compiled by the University's Research and Technology Administration Office.

STAFE ASSOCIATION OF THE CHINESE UNIVERSITY OF HONG KONG

The Staff Association of The Chinese University of Hong Kong (CUSA) is a trade union registered with the government. Its membership is open to all full-time non-teaching staff employed by the University under Terms of Services (A), (B) and (C), irrespective of race, sex, religion and rank. Founded in 1981, the association has the following objectives:

- · to obtain and maintain just conditions of employment;
- · to protect the interest of its members;
- · to strengthen relations with the University authorities on the basis of mutual respect and understanding;
- · to promote the cultural, social, educational, and recreational well-being of its members.

CUSA aims to keep its members informed of the welfare and benefits offered in institutions funded by the University Grants Committee, and negotiate or consult on behalf of its members with the University authorities on all matters of common interest.

The executive body which governs the association is its executive committee, whose members are elected biennially by secret ballot during every alternate annual general meeting.

There are also eight standing sub-committees and other ad hoc subcommittees or working groups that are appointed from time to time to advise the executive committee on matters relating to members' general benefits.

Each year social activities are organized to provide opportunities for members working in different departments and units in the University to acquaint themselves with one another.

TEACHERS' ASSOCIATION OF THE CHINESE UNIVERSITY OF HONG KONG


The Teachers' Association of The Chinese University of Hong Kong (CUTA) was established in 1974 and was registered with the Hong Kong Government in 1988 as a trade union. Its membership is open to all full-time teaching staff employed by the University. The main objectives of the association are

- to safeguard and promote the professional rights and interests as well as the welfare of CUTA members;
- to represent and express members' views on University affairs, and to work for the development and betterment of the University;
- to adopt an amicable, collaborative, and negotiative approach to resolving disputes between members themselves, between members and other University employees, and between members and the University authorities.

Major decisions are made at the association's general meetings. The council of the association (hereafter referred to as 'the council') becomes the highest decision-making and supervising body during intervals between general meetings. Its 24 members are elected from among and by the voting members through secret ballot on a faculty basis. The president of the council, elected from among and by the council members, represents the association in all its external relations and affairs, and is the *ex officio* chairman of both the general meeting and the council. The executive committee, whose members are elected from among and by the council members through secret ballot, is responsible to the council and implements the council's policies.

Since its inception, CUTA has been working towards improving communication between the University authorities and CUTA members, and helping to establish effective mechanisms in the areas of staff recruitment, substantiation, promotion, and retirement. Through the Joint Consultative Committee — which consists of representatives from CUTA and CUSA (The Staff Association of The Chinese University of Hong Kong), a University pro-vice-chancellor, the University Secretary, the University Bursar, and the heads of the four colleges — many problems of concern and interest to the University and its employees have been resolved satisfactorily.





PART 5
PROGRAMMES OF STUDIES

ull-time Undergraduate Studies

GENERAL INFORMATION

Eligibility for admission is conditional upon fulfilment of the entrance requirements of the University set out in the Regulations Governing Admission to Full-time Undergraduate Studies in Part 7 of this Calendar.

The University's seven faculties of arts, business administration, education, engineering, medicine, science, and social science offer a wide range of undergraduate programmes leading to the BA, BBA, BEd, BEng, BMedSc, MB ChB, BNurs, BPharm, BSc, and BSSc degrees. Programmes of studies leading to these degrees are printed in Part 5 of this Calendar while regulations governing these programmes can be found in Part 7.

Major and minor programmes offered by the faculties are as follows:

Faculty of Arts

Chinese Language and Literature, English, European Studies, Fine Arts, French Studies, German Studies, History, Italian Studies, Japanese Studies, Music, Philosophy, Religious Studies, Theology, and Translation.

Faculty of Business Administration

Integrated Business Administration, Professional Accountancy, and Quantitative Finance

Faculty of Education

Language Education, Physical Education and Sports Science, and Primary Education.

Faculty of Engineering

Computer Science, Computer Engineering, Electronic Engineering, Information Engineering, Mechanical and Automation Engineering, and Systems Engineering and Engineering Management.

Faculty of Medicine

MB ChB Programme, Intercalated Degree Programme in Medical Sciences, Pharmacy, Post-registration Nursing, and Pre-registration Nursing.

Faculty of Science

Biochemistry, Biology, Chemistry, Environmental Science, Food and

Nutritional Sciences, Materials Science, Mathematics, Molecular Biotechnolgy, Physics, and Statistics.

Faculty of Social Science

Anthropology, Architectural Studies, Economics, Gender Studies, Geography, Government and Public Administration, Journalism and Communication, Law, Psychology, Social Work, and Sociology.

A student who satisfies the conditions for graduation shall be awarded a bachelor's degree with one of the following classifications: First Class Honours, Second Class Honours Upper Division, Second Class Honours Lower Division, Third Class Honours, and Pass. Degree classification is based on the grade point averages of major and other courses, and the results of the comprehensive examination or its equivalent. However, the degrees of MB ChB are awarded on the basis of professional examinations taken at the end of the second to the fifth medical years.

CURRICULUM STRUCTURE

The normal length of study for a full-time programme is three to four years with the exception of medical studies and some professional programmes which have prescribed otherwise. The curriculum (excluding the MB ChB Programme, the Intercalated Degree Programme in Medical Sciences, the Post-registration Nursing Programme, and the Pre-registration Nursing Programme) is based on a credit unit system.

For graduation, a Secondary 6 and a Secondary 7 entrant* shall successfully complete at least 123 and 99 units of courses respectively which include:

- (a) General Education (15 units);
- (b) Physical Education (two units);
- (c) normally up to 72 required units of major courses;
- (d) remaining units in minor and/or elective courses of the student's choice.

Students of the Primary Education Programme are required to complete prior to graduation 60 units of courses, including six units of General Education courses. If a comprehensive examination or graduation thesis/ project is prescribed by their major programmes, students need to take and pass it.

Starting from 1997-98, all students in their first year of attendance are required to complete an Intensive Programme in Putonghua, Cantonesé and English which is non-credit-bearing, but the examination results of which will be recorded on academic reports and transcripts.

A student who wishes to take a minor programme should formally register for his/her minor subject, preferably in the second year of attendance. A minor programme normally requires 15–30 units of courses.

Programmes in the Faculty of Medicine

The Faculty of Medicine offers a non-unit-based professional programme

^{*} A Secondary 6 (or 7) entrant means a student who has been admitted to the University after completion of Secondary 6 (or 7) in a school or on equivalent qualifications.

leading to the degrees of MB ChB. The programme requires two pre-clinical years and three clinical years of study. Besides taking the professional courses required by the faculty, students have to complete in compliance with University requirements the General Education Programme and the Physical Education courses. Students who have completed their pre-clinical studies with satisfactory results may apply for admission to the Intercalated Degree Programme in Medical Sciences.

Medical students shall sit for both the professional examinations and periodic assessments of individual subjects. The first and second professional examinations will be held respectively at the end of medical years two and three. The third professional examination consists of two parts, to be taken at the end of medical years four and five respectively. The three clinical years of study will be conducted at the teaching hospital in Sha Tin in the various clinical departments. Students are also required to serve one year's internship at a recognized hospital after graduation.

Two nursing programmes leading to the degree of BNurs are offered in the faculty. The four-year full-time Pre-registration Nursing Programme is designed for students with no prior knowledge in nursing. It aims at preparing graduates for registration as general nurses in accordance with the requirement of the Nursing Board of Hong Kong. The Post-registration Nursing Programme is designed for registered nurses with at least two years of postregistration experience. The normal length of study shall be two years for full-time studies and three to four years for part-time.

The faculty also offers a Bachelor of Pharmacy Programme which follows the credit unit system.

DEPARTMENT PROFILES AND PROGRAMMES

The courses under the various programmes and the profiles of departments offering them are listed on pp.122 to 206.

Explanatory notes on codes and signs used

A course code comprises three alphabets, three numerals, and one numeral/ alphabet. The first three alphabets stand for the subject (e.g. CHI, ENG, BIO, stand for Chinese, English, and Biology respectively). The first numeral stands for the level of study. Undergraduate courses are coded 1 to 4 while postgraduate courses are coded 5 to 6 (where 5 denotes first year in Graduate School and 6 denotes second year in Graduate School). The numeric code starting with 0 stands for a course by Student-orientated Teaching (STOT).

Normally, lower level courses should be taken before upper level courses. However, for the sake of flexibility, most courses are open to students of all years of attendance subject to satisfactory fulfilment of pre-requisite and corequisite requirements. In fulfilling the total unit requirements of a major or minor programme, students should follow a prescribed study scheme and complete the required and elective courses. Please refer to The Chinese University of Hong Kong Student Handbook for details of unit requirements and study schemes.

This is a two-year full-time pre-service degree programme offered by the faculty for teacher certificate holders from the Hong Kong Institute of Education. To qualify for a BEd degree, students have to complete 60 credit units of course work. Courses cover pedagogical content, foundational studies, teaching models and learning theories, functional studies, and practical work. The programme stresses the integration of theory and practice, and aims at producing competent teachers to serve basic education in Hong Kong. Jointly offered by the departments of curriculum and instruction, educational administration and policy, and educational psychology, the programme is coordinated by the Primary Education Programme Committee.

This Medical Year 5 module introduces students to anaesthesia and critical care medicine, with the objective of teaching resuscitation, perioperative medicine, and the management of pathophysiological derangements in acute illness. A pass in the module's OSCE examination is mandatory to pass the final MBChB examination (Part II, Third Professional Examination). The department is recognized internationally as a premier anaesthesia department in Asia-Australasia with its achievements in teaching, research, quality assurance, and intensive care practice. Renowned areas of research include pharmacokinetics of anaesthetic agents, pain management, critical incidents monitoring, and ICU outcome. There is an excellent structured specialist training programme, with trainees having won numerous prizes from the Hong Kong and Australasian colleges of anaesthesia.

The department contributes to the training of medical students and the Intercalated BMedSc programme. It also supervises MPhil and PhD students, organizes specialist training for the Hong Kong Academy of Medicine, and

Intercalated Degree Programme in Medical Sciences runs a training programme for pathologists from the mainland. Diagnostic services offered include surgical pathology, autopsy, cytology, hematology, blood transfusion, and molecular pathology. Research is focused on nasopharyngeal carcinoma, immunohistochemistry, neuropathology, renal pathology, liver cancers, and gastrointestinal lymphomas. Within the department, there are three research laboratories: the Nasopharyngeal Carcinoma Research Laboratory which works closely with overseas cancer centres; the Brain Disease Laboratory; and the Eye Pathology Laboratory. All students in their first year of study are required to complete an Intensive Programme in Putonghua, Cantonese and English offered respectively by the New Asia Yale-in-China Chinese Language Centre, the Department of Chinese Language and Literature, and the English Language Teaching Unit. The programme consists of three 3-hour sessions for each of the three languages. The purpose of the programme is to provide an opportunity for students to strengthen their ability to consult dictionaries for the correct pronunciation of individual characters or words, and, in the case of Putonghua and English, the ability to handle the basic rules of grammar. The programme will provide a key for students to open the door to more advanced language courses offered by various units of the University and to promote among themselves an awareness of the importance of language ability.

Required Courses

Two units of Physical Education courses are required of all full-time students in their first year of attendance, except for Post-registration Nursing, Physical Education and Sports Science, and Primary Education majors. The required programme emphasizes the development of personality and health through team work and fair play as well as the acquisition of basic motor skills and attitude towards physical activities. A course may be taken only once. The number of units earned in required Physical Education shall not exceed 2. The basis of assessment for each course will be students' achievement in basic skills, attendance and learning attitude. Courses with two different course codes are being offered with men's and women's classes. All courses with one course code are co-ed classes, unless otherwise specified (e.g. men's soccer).

GENERAL INFORMATION

The University offers eight part-time degree programmes: Biology and Chemistry, Business Administration, Chinese and English, Mathematics and Statistics, Music, Physical Education and Sports Science, Post-registration Nursing, and Primary Education. Regulations governing these programmes as well as admission to part-time undergraduate studies are given in Part 7 of this Calendar. Degrees are awarded on the same basis as the full-time programmes described on p.120.

CURRICULUM STRUCTURE

The normal length of study for a part-time programme is five to six years, with three terms in each year (with the exception of the Post-registration Nursing Programme). Apart from completing requirements of the major subject, students are also required to take general education courses and/or elective courses in other disciplines.

The University adopted with effect from 1991-92 a full-fledged credit unit system in the undergraduate curriculum (with the exception of the Postregistration Nursing Programme). Secondary 6 and Secondary 7 students are required to complete before graduation at least 123 and 99 units of courses respectively. Students who have satisfied special entrance requirements of the Music, Physical Education and Sports Science, and Primary Education programmes are granted unit exemption and are required to complete at least 80 or 60 units of courses before graduation, depending on the specific category under which they are admitted.

Exemption from major requirements in specific programmes shall also be given to students as prescribed in the study scheme concerned. (Please see also Curriculum Structure of the full-time programmes on pp.120–121.)

The University first introduced programmes at the postgraduate level with 1 the establishment of the School of Education in 1965. In the following year, the Graduate School was formally founded to offer postgraduate programmes leading to the award of master's degrees. In 1980, the University advanced into the realm of doctoral education.

The University currently offers 135 postgraduate degree programmes leading to six research degrees and 12 taught degrees. The six research degrees are Doctor of Music (DMus), Doctor of Education (EdD), Doctor of Philosophy (PhD), Master of Fine Arts (MFA), Master of Music (MMus), and Master of Philosophy (MPhil). The 12 taught degrees are Master of Accountancy (MAcc), Master of Architecture (MArch), Master of Arts (MA), Master of Business Administration (MBA), Master of Clinical Pharmacy (MClinPharm), Master of Divinity (MDiv), Master of Education (MEd), Master of Nursing (MNurs), Master of Public Health (MPH), Master of Science (MSc), Master of Social Science (MSSc), and Master of Social Work (MSW).

In addition there are five diploma programmes: Postgraduate Diploma in Applied Geoinformatics (PgDipGeo), Postgraduate Diploma in Education (PGDE), Postgraduate Diploma in Education (Primary) (PGDE), Postgraduate Diploma in Psychology (PgDipPsy) and Postgraduate Diploma in Nursing (PgDipNurs).

For doctoral programmes, a full-time student normally spends a minimum of 36 months and a maximum of 84 months; a part-time student normally spends a minimum of 48 months and a maximum of 96 months. The normative period of study for master's programmes ranges from one to two years for full-time study and two to three years for part-time. The diploma programmes last one year for full-time students and one to two years for part-time students.

All programmes in the Graduate School are provided through 38 graduate divisions (viz. Chinese Language and Literature, English, Fine Arts, History, Music, Philosophy, Religion and Theology, Translation, Business Administration, Education, Computer Science and Engineering, Electronic Engineering, Information Engineering, Mechanical and Automation Engineering, Systems Engineering and Engineering Management, Anatomical and Cellular Pathology, Basic Medical Sciences*, Chemical Pathology, Medical Sciences, Microbiology, Nursing, Pharmacy, Surgical Sciences, Biochemistry, Biology, Chemistry, Mathematics, Physics, Statistics, Anthropology, Architecture, Communication, Economics, Geography, Government and Public Administration, Psychology, Social Work, and Sociology) and four graduate boards/programme (viz. Comparative Studies in Linguistics, Literature and Culture; Environmental Science; Food and Nutritional Sciences; Gender Studies).

Persons who have graduated with good honours degrees from recognized universities and who have the capacity for research may apply for admission to the above postgraduate programmes. nternational Asian Studies **Programme**

In keeping with the University's distinctive educational mission of promoting cultural exchange between East and West, an International Asian Studies Programme was introduced in the University in 1977 with the support of the Yale-China Association. This programme is open to a selected number of students, research scholars and academic staff from overseas who wish to take advantage of the University's academic resources and research facilities in the broad area of Chinese and Asian studies, including the Chinese language training programme offered by the New Asia Yale-in-China Chinese Language Centre.

The International Asian Studies Programme (IASP) is coordinated by the Office of International Studies Programmes and is fully integrated into the regular academic structure of the University. Programme participants from overseas and local students live in the same hostels. All courses offered at the University, except those by the Faculty of Medicine and the Faculty of Education, General Education courses offered by the four colleges, courses of the Intensive Programme in Putonghua, Cantonese and English, and Putonghua courses offered for CUHK degree candidates, are open to IASP participants, subject to quota limitation, participants' language proficiency, and availability of University resources. The programme itself also offers elective courses in Asian and Chinese studies which are taught in English.

There are three categories of participants: (1) associate students: undergraduate and postgraduate students taking a full load (12–18 units per term) of University courses; (2) associate research students: graduate students primarily undertaking research or writing their master's theses or doctoral dissertations; and (3) special scholars: academic staff members or other learned scholars, normally of postdoctoral status, pursuing research, refresher or advanced courses.

The programme spans one academic year (September to May). Application for single-term participation is subject to availability of places. Previous course work on Chinese language or Asian studies is not required for admission, but undergraduate applicants must normally have completed at least two terms of university study and graduate applicants must hold a bachelor's degree. Associate research students and special scholars with research or scholarly interest in

China or Asian studies are especially welcome.



Cost of University Education

In addition to the prescribed fees listed above, all full-time students are advised to set aside funds for other items including meals, books, transport, personal and other expenses.

The cost of meals on campus is about HK\$15 for breakfast and \$30 each for lunch and dinner. It is estimated that expenses on books and stationery and other incidental expenses would be in the region of \$6,000 a year. In addition, a commuting student may have to spend between \$5,800 and \$6,800 a year on transport. Personal and other extra expenses are entirely at the discretion of the individual student concerned.

Taking into consideration all fees and expenditure set out above, a fulltime student will probably need between \$90,000 and \$96,000 a year to support his/her education at the University.

Cholarships and Financial Aid TO STUDENTS

To help needy students meet part of the cost of their university education, I the government has made provisions for grants and loans through the Joint Committee on Student Finance. The University and its constituent colleges also administer their own scholarships, bursaries, loans and campus work schemes.



PART 7 UNIVERSITY ORDINANCE AND REGULATIONS



He Chinese University of Hong Kong Ordinance

(interpreted in accordance with the provisions of the Hong Kong Reunification Ordinance No. 110 of 1997)

n Ordinance to repeal and replace The Chinese University of Hong Kong Ordinance, to repeal the Chung Chi College Incorporation Ordinance, the Board of Trustees of The United College of Hong Kong Incorporation Ordinance and the New Asia College Incorporation Ordinance and to make new provision concerning the Chung Chi College, The United College of Hong Kong and the New Asia College, to make provision for Shaw College, and for purposes connected therewith.

WHEREAS —

Preamble.

The Chinese University of Hong Kong was established and (a) incorporated in 1963 by The Chinese University of Hong Kong Ordinance as a University with a federal constitution;

(Cap. 1109.)

- the original Colleges of the University are Chung Chi College, (b) New Asia College and The United College of Hong Kong;
- it is considered desirable that some of the powers and functions (c) conferred on the said Colleges under their respective constitutions and Ordinances should be vested in The Chinese University of Hong Kong and that the principal role of the said Colleges be the provision of student-orientated teaching under the direction of The Chinese University of Hong Kong;
- it is also considered desirable to make certain alterations in the (d) constitution of The Chinese University of Hong Kong;
- (da) the Council of the University has, by special resolution, resolved that Shaw College shall be a constituent College of the University;
- it is declared that The Chinese University of Hong Kong, in which the principal language of instruction shall be Chinese, shall continue to
 - assist in the preservation, dissemination, communication and increase in knowledge;
 - provide regular courses of instruction in the humanities, the sciences and other branches of learning of a standard required and expected of a University of the highest standing;

(iii) stimulate the intellectual and cultural development of Hong Kong and thereby to assist in promoting its economic and social welfare:

[24th December, 1976]

- Short title. 1. This Ordinance may be cited as The Chinese University of Hong Kong Ordinance
- Definitions. 2. (1)In this Ordinance, unless the context otherwise requires — "approved course of study" means a course of study approved by the Senate:
 - "Assembly of Fellows" means the Assembly of Fellows of a constituent College;
 - "Board of Trustees" means the Board of Trustees of a constituent College;
 - "Chancellor", "Pro-Chancellor", "Vice-Chancellor", "Pro-Vice-Chancellors" and "Treasurer" respectively mean the Chancellor, Pro-Chancellor, Vice-Chancellor, Pro-Vice-Chancellors and the Treasurer of the University;
 - "constituent College" means a constituent College of the University as provided by section 3 and "constituent Colleges" shall be construed accordingly;
 - "Council", "Senate", "Convocation", "Faculties", "Schools of Studies" and "Boards of Studies" respectively mean the Council, Senate, Convocation, Faculties, Schools of Studies and Boards of Studies of the University:
 - "Fellow" means a Fellow of a constituent College;
 - "graduates" and "students" respectively mean the graduates and students of the University;
 - "Head" means the Head of a constituent College;
 - "members" means such persons as are prescribed by the Statutes to be members of the University;
 - "officers" means the officers of the University as provided by section 5:
 - "original College" means any of the following -
 - (a) Chung Chi College;
 - (b) The United College of Hong Kong;
 - (c) New Asia College;
 - "precincts" means, in relation to the University, the boundaries of Lot No. 725 in Demarcation District 42;
 - "repealed Ordinance" means The Chinese University of Hong Kong Ordinance repealed by section 21;

(Cap. 1109.)

"Statutes" means the Statutes of the University contained in Schedule 1 as the same may from time to time be amended or replaced under section 13(1);

Schedule 1.

"teacher" means a member of the full-time teaching staff of the University of the rank of Assistant Lecturer and above;

- "University" means The Chinese University of Hong Kong (香港中文大學) continued under section 4.
- A special resolution is a resolution passed at one meeting of the (2) Council and confirmed at a subsequent meeting held not less than 1 month nor more than 6 months thereafter and which is approved at each such meeting by
 - not less than three-fourths of those present and voting; and
 - (b) not less than half the whole membership of the Council.
- 3. (1) The constituent Colleges of the University are the original Colleges, Shaw College and such other institutions as may from time to time by Ordinance, in accordance with a special resolution of the Council, be declared to be constituent Colleges of the University.

University to have constituent Colleges.

- No provision in the constitution of any constituent College shall (2) be of effect if it is in conflict with or inconsistent with this Ordinance.
- No person shall be excluded from being a member of the University by reason of sex, race or religion.
- 4. (1) The constituent Colleges and members of the University shall be or continue to be a body corporate called The Chinese University of Hong Kong (香港中文大學) which shall be the same University as that established by The Chinese University of Hong Kong Ordinance 1963.

Continuation of incorporation of the University. (28 of 1963.)

- (2)The University shall have perpetual succession and may sue and be sued in that name and shall have and may use a common seal and may take by gift or otherwise purchase and hold, grant, demise or otherwise dispose of real or personal estate.
- No dividend or bonus shall be paid and no gift or division of money shall be made by or on behalf of the University to any of its members except by way of prize, reward or special grant.
- The officers of the University shall be the Chancellor, the Pro-**5.** (1) Chancellor, the Vice-Chancellor, the Pro-Vice-Chancellors, the Treasurer, the Head of each constituent College, the Dean of each Faculty and of the Graduate School, the Secretary, the Registrar, the Librarian, the Bursar and such other persons as may by special resolution be designated as officers.

Officers.

- (2) The Chancellor shall be the head of the University and may confer degrees in the name of the University.
- (3) The Chief Executive of the Hong Kong Special Administrative Region shall be the Chancellor.
- The Chancellor may appoint a person to be the Pro-Chancellor of (4) the University; and the Pro-Chancellor shall exercise such powers and perform such duties as may be prescribed in the Statutes.
- (5) The Vice-Chancellor shall be the chief academic and administrative officer of the University and shall be a member of the Council and the Chairman of the Senate, and may confer degrees in the name of the University.
- (6) The Council shall appoint, after consultation with the Vice-Chancellor, one or more Pro-Vice-Chancellors from among the regular staff of the University to exercise such powers and perform such duties as the Council may direct.
- A Pro-Vice-Chancellor shall carry out all the functions and duties of the Vice-Chancellor in the absence of the Vice-Chancellor, except that he may not confer degrees.
- (8) The manner and period of appointment of the Treasurer shall be prescribed by the Statutes, and his duties shall be such as the Council may determine.

Provision for 6. Council. Senate and Convocation.

There shall be a Council, a Senate and a Convocation whose respective constitutions, powers and duties shall be as prescribed by this Ordinance and the Statutes.

Powers and duties of the Council.

- 7. Subject to this Ordinance and the Statutes, the Council shall
 - be the governing and executive body of the University; (a)
 - (b) have the management and control of the affairs, purposes and functions of the University;
 - have the control and management of the property and financial (c) affairs of the University including the property of the constituent Colleges, but in the exercise of such power of control and management in respect of any immovable property of any constituent College the Council shall not alter the use of any such property without the prior consent of the Board of Trustees of the constituent College concerned;
 - make such University appointments as it thinks proper; (*d*)
 - (e) have power to approve the fees charged by the University in respect of approved courses of study;
 - provide for the custody and use of the University's seal. (f)

Powers and duties of Senate.

- Subject to this Ordinance and the Statutes and subject also to review by the Council, the Senate shall have the control and regulation of —
 - (a) instruction, education and research;

the conducting of examinations for students; (b)

case may be.

- the award of degrees other than degrees honoris causa; (c)
- (d) the award of diplomas, certificates and other academic distinctions of the University.
- Subject to this Ordinance and the Statutes, the Convocation shall consist 9. of the graduates and such other persons as may be prescribed by the Statutes and may make representations to the Council and the Senate upon any matters affecting or concerning the interests of the University.

Composition and function of the Convocation.

Committees.

- The Council and the Senate may establish such committees as **10.** (1) they think fit.
 - Unless otherwise provided, any committee may consist partly of (2) persons who are not members of the Council or the Senate, as the
 - Subject to this Ordinance and the Statutes, the Council and the (3)Senate may, subject to such conditions as they may impose, delegate any of their powers and duties to any Board or committee or to any officer.
 - Any committee established under this section may make such (4) Standing Orders, including provision allowing a casting vote to the chairman thereof, for the conduct of meetings as it thinks fit.
- 11. Subject to this Ordinance and the Statutes, the Council shall appoint, on such terms and conditions as it thinks fit, the staff of the University.

Appointment of staff.

The Council may establish such Faculties, Schools of Studies and Faculties, etc. **12.** (1) other institutions as it thinks fit.

- The Council, on the recommendation of the Senate, may form (2)such institutions for the promotion of study and learning as the Council may from time to time determine.
- The Senate may establish such Boards of Studies as it may from (3) time to time determine.
- The Council may by special resolution make Statutes, subject to **13.** (1) the approval thereof by the Chancellor, prescribing or providing for -

Statutes.

- the administration of the University; (a)
- the membership of the University; (b)
- appointments, elections, resignation and retirement and (c) removal of officers and teachers of the University;
- (d)examinations:
- the conferring of degrees and the award of other academic (e)
- the composition, powers and duties of the Council and the (f) Senate:

- (g) the Faculties and Schools of Studies, their membership and
- (h) the Boards of Studies, their membership and functions;
- the Convocation; (*i*)
- (*i*) the exercise of any function by the University, the Council, the Senate, the Chancellor, the Pro-Chancellor, the Vice-Chancellor, the Pro-Vice-Chancellors, other officers, teachers and other members;
- (k) financial procedure;
- (l) fees payable to the University as a condition of admission to any examinations held by the University or for the conferring of any of the degrees of the University or for the award of any diploma or certificate or other academic distinction or for attendance at a University Extension Course or any similar purpose;
- the admission, welfare and discipline of students; and
- generally, the carrying into effect of this Ordinance.

Schedule 1.

(2) The Statutes contained in Schedule 1 shall have effect as if made and approved under subsection (1).

Decrees and regulations.

14. Subject to this Ordinance and the Statutes, the Council and the Senate may from time to time make decrees and regulations respectively to direct and regulate the affairs of the University.

Degrees and other awards.

- 15. The University may
 - (a) confer such degrees as may be specified in the Statutes;
 - (b) award diplomas and certificates and such other academic distinctions as may be specified in the Statutes;
 - provide such lectures and instruction for persons not being (c) members of the University as the University may determine;
 - (d) confer degrees honoris causa of Master or Doctor in accordance with the Statutes: and
 - subject to the Statutes, deprive any person of any degree (e) conferred or diploma, certificate or other academic distinction awarded by the University.

Honorary Degrees Committee.

16. There shall be an Honorary Degrees Committee which shall be constituted as provided by the Statutes for the purpose of advising the Council with regard to the award of degrees honoris causa.

Execution and authentication of documents.

17. Any instrument purporting to be executed under the seal of the University and signed by the Chancellor, Pro-Chancellor, Vice-Chancellor, a Pro-Vice-Chancellor or Treasurer and countersigned by the Secretary shall be received in evidence upon its production without further proof and shall, unless the contrary is proved, be deemed to be an instrument so executed.

18. Rent payable to the Government of the Hong Kong Special Administrative Region in respect of all land granted to the University by the Government of the Hong Kong Special Administrative Region shall be limited in total to \$10 a year.

Government rent.

- 19. (Omitted as spent)
- **20.** (1) The Chung Chi College Incorporation Ordinance, the Board of Trustees of The United College of Hong Kong Incorporation Ordinance and the New Asia College Incorporation Ordinance are repealed.

Repeals. (Cap. 1081.) (Cap. 1092.) (Cap. 1118.) Schedule 3.

- Schedule 3 shall have effect with respect to the constitution and (2)powers of the Board of Trustees of the original Colleges.
- Schedule 4 shall have effect with respect to the constitution and (3) powers of the Board of Trustees of Shaw College.

Schedule 4.

21. The Chinese University of Hong Kong Ordinance and the Statutes of The Chinese University of Hong Kong are repealed.

Repeal of The Chinese University of Hong Kong Ordinance and the Statutes. (Cap. 1109.)

22. (1) The Council and Senate appointed under the repealed Ordinance shall continue to be the Council and the Senate of the University until a new Council and Senate are constituted under the Statutes. Savings and transitional.

- No other appointment made under the repealed Ordinance shall (2) be affected by the repeal but shall, unless otherwise varied, continue on the same terms and conditions as if this Ordinance had not been enacted.
- (3) All property, whether movable or immovable, rights and privileges vested in the University immediately prior to the commencement of this Ordinance shall continue to be vested in the University on the terms and conditions, if any, on which the same were then vested at that date, and the University shall continue to be subject to the obligations and liabilities to which it was subject immediately prior to the commencement of this Ordinance.
- (4) Nothing in this Ordinance shall affect or be deemed to affect the rights of the Central People's Government of the People's Republic of China and the rights of the Government of the Hong Kong Special Administrative Region under the Basic Law or other laws or the rights of any body politic or corporate or of any other persons except such as are mentioned in this Ordinance and those claiming by, from or under them.

STATUTES OF THE CHINESE University of Hong Kong

STATUTE 1 Interpretation

In these Statutes, unless the context otherwise requires —

"College" means a constituent College of the University as provided by section 3 and "Colleges" shall be construed accordingly;

"Dean" means the Dean of a Faculty or of the Graduate School, as the case

"Department" means a Department of a Faculty established by the Council on the recommendation of the Senate and "Departments" shall be construed accordingly:

"Graduate School" means the Graduate School of the University;

"Ordinance" means The Chinese University of Hong Kong Ordinance 1976.

STATUTE 2 Congregations

- 1. The time, place and procedure of the Congregations of the whole University shall be determined by the Chancellor.
- 2. The Chancellor, or in his absence, the Pro-Chancellor or, in the absence of both of them, the Vice-Chancellor, shall preside at Congregations.
- 3. At least one Congregation shall be held in each academic year.

STATUTE 3 Members of the University

The members of the University shall be -

- (a) the Chancellor:
- (b) the Pro-Chancellor;
- (c) the Vice-Chancellor;
- (d) the Pro-Vice-Chancellors;
- (e) the Treasurer:
- (f) the members of the Council;
- the Heads of the Colleges; (g)
- the members of the Senate: (h)
- (i) Emeriti, Honorary and Research Professors;
- (*i*) the teachers;
- (k) the Secretary, Registrar, Librarian and Bursar;
- (ka) the University Dean of Students;
- such other persons holding such other offices or appointments at (l)or made by the University as the Council may from time to time determine;
- the graduates and such other persons as are entitled in accordance with Statute 18 to have their names placed upon the Convocation
- the students. (n)

The Chancellor, when present, shall preside at Congregations of the 1. University.

STATUTE 4 The Chancellor

- The Chancellor shall be entitled -2.
 - to call for information in regard to any matter relating to the welfare of the University from the Vice-Chancellor and the Chairman of the Council, whose duty it shall be to provide such information; and
 - on the receipt of such information to recommend to the Council (b) such action as he deems proper.
- The Pro-Chancellor may, on the authorization of the Chancellor and on his behalf, exercise any of the powers or perform any of the duties conferred or imposed on the Chancellor by the Statutes.

STATUTE 5 The Pro-Chancellor

The Pro-Chancellor may resign by written notice addressed to the 2. Chancellor.

> STATUTE 6 The Vice-Chancellor

- The Vice-Chancellor shall be appointed by the Council after receiving the advice of a committee established by the Council and composed of the Chairman of the Council, 3 members nominated by the Council from among its number and 3 members nominated by the Senate from among its number.
- The Vice-Chancellor shall hold office for such period and on such terms as may be determined by the Council.
- 3. The Vice-Chancellor shall
 - have the right and duty to advise the Council on any matter affecting the policy, finance and administration of the University;
 - be generally responsible to the Council for the maintenance of the (b) efficiency and good order of the University and for ensuring the proper enforcement of the Statutes, decrees and regulations;
 - report to the Senate at its next meeting if he has suspended or (c) expelled any student;
 - have power to appoint a person to discharge the functions and (d) duties of the Pro-Vice-Chancellors, a Dean of a Faculty, the Chairman of a Department, the Secretary, Registrar, the Librarian or the Bursar during a temporary vacancy in any such appointment or during the temporary absence or inability of the holder of any such appointment;
 - have power in case of emergency to appoint external examiners.

A Pro-Vice-Chancellor shall hold office for 2 years and may be re-appointed for further periods not exceeding 2 years.

STATUTE 7 The Pro-Vice-Chancellor

STATUTE 8 The Treasurer

The Treasurer shall be appointed by the Council and shall hold office for 3 years, and may be re-appointed and when he is re-appointed he shall hold office for a further period or periods of 3 years.

STATUTE 9 The Head of Colleges

- 1. The Head of each College, other than the first Head, shall be appointed or re-appointed by the Council on the recommendation of a committee consisting of -
 - (a) the Vice-Chancellor, who shall be Chairman;
 - (b) one member of the Board of Trustees of the College for which the Head is to be appointed or re-appointed, elected by the Board; and
 - (c) 6 Fellows of that College elected under paragraph 6(b) of Statute 16 for the purpose by the Assembly of Fellows of that College.
- The first Head of each College shall be appointed by the Council on the 2. recommendation of the Vice-Chancellor in consultation with the Chairman of the Board of Trustees of the College concerned for such term as the Council shall determine.
- 3. The Head of a College, other than the first Head, shall be appointed for a period of 4 years and shall be eligible for re-appointment for a maximum of 2 further periods, each of 3 years.
- 4. The Head of a College shall be responsible for the welfare of the College and the students assigned to it and shall collaborate closely with the Vice-Chancellor in the conduct of the College and its work.
- 5. The Head of a College shall be the Chairman of the Assembly of Fellows of that College.
- A Head of a College shall be an academic, but need not be on the 6. academic staff of the University at the time of his appointment.

STATUTE 10 1. The Secretary and Other Officers

The Secretary —

- shall be appointed by the Council on the recommendation of a Board of Advisers;
- (b) shall be the custodian of the common seal of the University;
- (c) shall be with the Registrar, the joint custodian of the records of the University;
- (d) shall be the Secretary of the Council;
- shall discharge such duties as are specified in the Ordinance and Statutes and such other duties as may be determined by the Council.
- 2. The Registrar
 - shall be appointed by the Council on the recommendation of a Board of Advisers:
 - shall keep a register of all members of the University under their (b) respective qualifications as specified in Statute 3;

- (c) shall be, with the Secretary of the Council, the joint custodian of the records of the University;
- (d) shall be the Secretary of the Senate;
- shall discharge such duties as are specified in the Ordinance and (e) Statutes and such other duties as may be determined by the Council and Senate;
- (f) may exercise his functions as Secretary of the Boards of the Faculties by deputy.

The Librarian -3.

- shall be appointed by the Council on the recommendation of a Board of Advisers;
- shall be responsible for administering the library services of the University;
- shall discharge such duties as may be determined by the Council (c) after consultation with the Senate.

The Bursar ---

- (a) shall be appointed by the Council on the recommendation of a Board of Advisers:
- shall be responsible for the keeping of all University accounts and (b) such inventories as the Council may determine;
- shall discharge such other duties in connection with University (c) finance and otherwise as may be determined by the Council;
- (d) shall be Secretary of the Finance Committee.

5. The University Dean of Students —

- shall be appointed by the Council on the recommendation of the Vice-Chancellor:
- (b) shall hold office for such period as may be determined by the Council:
- shall be responsible to the Vice-Chancellor for such duties in (c) connection with student affairs as may be determined by the Council:
- (d) may be designated as an officer.

The Council shall consist of — 1.

STATUTE 11 The Council

- the Chairman, who shall be appointed by the Chancellor on the nomination of the Council from persons under sub-paragraphs (k), (l), (m) and (n);
- (b) the Vice-Chancellor:
- the Pro-Vice-Chancellors: (c)
- (d) the Treasurer:
- (da) life members appointed by the Council;
- 2 members elected by the Board of Trustees of each College from among its own members:
- the Head of each College; (f)
- the Dean of each Faculty and of the Graduate School; (g)

- one Fellow of each College elected by the College's Assembly of (h)
- (i) 3 members elected by the Senate from among the academic members of the Senate;
- (Repealed L.N. 481 of 1997) (*j*)
- 6 persons nominated by the Chancellor; (k)
- 3 persons elected by the Members of the Legislative Council, other (*l*) than Official Members, from among their own number;
- not more than 6 other persons, normally resident in Hong Kong, (m) who shall be elected by the Council;
- after a date to be appointed by the Council, such number of (n) members of the Convocation not exceeding 3 as shall be determined by the Council from time to time, to be elected by the Convocation in the manner determined by the Council.
- 2. (1) Persons who hold appointments in the University shall not be eligible for nomination or election under paragraph 1(k), (l), (m)
 - (2) (Repealed L.N. 481 of 1997)
- The Chairman of the Council shall hold office for 3 years and may be re-appointed for further periods of 3 years.
- The nominated and elected members of the Council shall hold 4. office for 3 years from the date of their nominaton or election and shall be eligible for re-nomination or re-election:

Provided that a member elected under subparagraphs (e), (h), (i), (l) or (n) of paragraph 1 shall cease to be a member of the Council if he ceases to be a member of the body from among whose members he was elected.

- (1A) If an elected member of the Council ceases to be a member under the proviso to subparagraph (1), the body which elected him shall duly elect a successor whose membership of the Council shall be for a period not exceeding 3 years. The successor shall be eligible for re-election to which subparagraph (2) shall apply.
- A body re-nominating or re-electing a member may re-nominate (2) or re-elect, as the case may be, such member for a period of 3 years or for a period of less than 3 years.
- 5. Should a nominated or elected member of the Council die or resign during his period of membership, the body which nominated or elected him shall duly nominate or elect, as the case may be, a successor whose membership of the Council shall be for the unexpired period of membership of his predecessor. Such successor shall be eligible for renomination or re-election, and paragraph 4(2) shall apply thereto.
- Members of the Council whose membership derives from paragraph 1(b), (c), (d), (f) and (g) shall remain members of the Council for so long as they hold the office or appointment by reason of which they became members of the Council.

- The Council shall elect from among its members a Vice-Chairman who shall hold office for a period of 2 years and who may be re-elected.
- 8. Subject to the Ordinance and the Statutes and without derogating from the generality of its power, it is specifically prescribed –
 - that the Council shall have the power
 - to make Statutes, provided that no Statute shall be made until the Senate shall have had an opportunity of reporting thereon to the Council;
 - (b) to make decrees for any purpose for which decrees are or may be authorized to be made, provided that no decree shall be made until the Senate shall have had an opportunity of reporting thereon to the Council;
 - (c) to invest any money belonging to the University;
 - (d) to borrow money on behalf of the University;
 - to sell, buy, exchange, lease or accept leases of any real or (e) personal property on behalf of the University;
 - (f) to enter into, vary, perform and cancel contracts on behalf of the University;
 - (g) to require the Board of Trustees of each College annually to produce its audited accounts in such form and at such time as the Council may determine:
 - (h) to receive from public sources grants for capital and recurrent expenditure;
 - to receive annually and for such longer periods as the Council (*i*) may determine from time to time from the Vice-Chancellor. after he has consulted the Senate, and to approve, estimates of expenditure;
 - (*i*) to receive gifts and to approve, subject to such conditions as the Council thinks fit, the receipt of gifts by the Colleges;
 - (k) to provide for the welfare of persons employed by the University and the wives, widows and dependants of such persons, including the payment of money, pensions, or other payments and to subscribe to benevolent and other funds for the benefit of such persons;
 - (l)to provide for the discipline and welfare of students:
 - (m) to recommend the award of degrees honoris causa;
 - after report from the Senate to establish additional Faculties (n) or Departments or to abolish, combine or subdivide any Faculty or Department;
 - (na) on the recommendation of the Senate, to determine the organization or structure of each Faculty and its Departments and to make such alterations to such organization or structure as deemed fit by the Council;
 - to prescribe fees of the University; (o)

- that it shall be the duty of the Council -(2)
 - to appoint bankers, auditors and any other agents whom it deems expedient to appoint;
 - to appoint an Administrative and Planning Committee; (b)
 - to cause proper books of account to be kept for all sums of (c) money received and expended by the University and for the assets and liabilities of the University so that such books give a true and fair statement of financial transactions and position of the University;
 - (d) to cause the accounts of the University to be audited within 6 months after the termination of each financial year as the Council may determine:
 - to provide the buildings, libraries, laboratories, premises, (e) furniture, apparatus and other equipment needed for the University;
 - (*f*) in consultation with the Senate to encourage and provide for research by members of the University;
 - to review the instruction and teaching in courses of study (g) leading to degrees, diplomas, certificates and other awards of the University;
 - after consultation with the Senate, to institute all teaching (h)
 - to administer or cause to be administered a Superannnuation (*i*) Fund or Funds for the benefit of persons employed by the University:
 - to establish Boards of Advisers and to appoint external (*i*) experts thereto on the recommendation of the Senate;
 - to appoint on such terms and conditions as the Council may (k) determine each Professor, Reader and Senior Lecturer and the Secretary, the Registrar, the Librarian and the Bursar on the recommendation of duly constituted Boards of Advisers;
 - to make, on such terms and conditions as the Council may (l)determine, such other University appointments as the Council deems necessary;
 - on the recommendation of the Senate, to appoint a Chairman for each Department and a Director of Studies for each academic subject not subsumed under a Department;
 - (n) to appoint external examiners on the recommendation of the Senate;
 - to provide for the printing and publication of works which (o) may be issued by the University; and
 - to consider reports from the Senate, and if the Council deems it proper to do so, to take action thereon.
- The Council shall meet at least 3 times in each academic year and 9. additionally on the written request of the Chairman of the Council or the Vice-Chancellor or any 5 members of the Council.

- 9A. The Council may transact any of its business by circulation of papers, and unless the Vice-Chancellor or 5 members of the Council in writing request the Chairman of the Council to refer any particular item of the business being so transacted to the next meeting of the Council, a resolution in writing which is approved in writing by a majority of the members shall be as valid and effectual as if it had been passed at a meeting of the Council.
- 10. 7 days' notice in writing of any meeting of the Council shall be sent by the Secretary to each person entitled to receive notice of the meeting with the agenda thereof, and no business not included in the agenda shall be transacted if the Chairman or any two members present object.
- 11. The Council may make for the proper conduct of its business Standing Orders which it may amend or rescind by simple majority at any of its meetings provided that not less than 7 days' notice has been given in writing by the Secretary to members of the Council of the proposal so to amend or rescind.
- 12. The quorum at any meeting of the Council shall be 12.
- 1. The Council shall fix the financial year.
- 2. There shall be a Committee of the Council known as the Finance Committee, which shall consist of -
 - (a) The Treasurer, who shall be Chairman:
 - the Vice-Chancellor or his representative; (b)
 - (c) the Head of each College; and
 - (d) 3 other persons, including persons who are not members of the Council, as the Council shall appoint.

There shall be referred to the Finance Committee all matters within the jurisdiction of the Council which have important financial implications.

- The Finance Committee shall submit to the Council, before the beginning of the financial year, draft estimates of income and expenditure of the University and such estimates, amended as the Council may think fit, shall be approved by the Council before the beginning of the financial vear.
- 4. The estimates shall show the income and expenditure of the University and the estimated surplus or deficit for the year. The estimated expenditure shall be shown under votes, heads and (where applicable) sub-heads. Any transfer between votes or heads shall require the sanction of the Finance Committee. Any transfer between sub-heads shall require the sanction of the Vice-Chancellor and the Treasurer, with the exception of transfers between sub-heads solely concerning a College, which shall require the sanction of the Head of that College, subject to any rules and directions that the Finance Committee may issue.
- The Finance Committee shall report to the Council, at such times as the Council may determine, any transfer between votes or heads. The Council may revise the estimates during the course of the financial year.

STATUTE 12 Financial **Procedure**

- As soon as practicable after the end of the financial year, a balance 6. sheet and income and expenditure account with supporting schedules shall be submitted to the auditors.
- The audited accounts, with any comments thereon made by the auditors, shall be submitted to the Council.
- 8. Nothing in this Statute shall deprive the Council of power to invest surpluses or prospective surpluses at any time.

STATUTE 13 1 The Administrative and Planning Committee

- There shall be a Committee of the Council known as the Administrative and Planning Committee, which shall consist of
 - the Vice-Chancellor, who shall be the Chairman; (a)
 - (b) the Pro-Vice-Chancellors;
 - (c) the Head of each College;
 - (d) the Dean of each Faculty and of the Graduate School;
 - (e) the Secretary;
 - the Registrar; and (f)
 - the Bursar. (g)

The Secretary or his deputy shall serve as secretary of the Committee.

- Subject to the Ordinance and the Statutes, it shall be the duty of the Administrative and Planning Committee
 - to assist the Vice-Chancellor in the performance of his duties;
 - to initiate plans of University development; (b)
 - to assist the Vice-Chancellor in reviewing and co-ordinating the (c) annual and supplementary estimates of recurrent and capital expenditures of the University, before transmitting them to the Finance Committee of the Council;
 - to review or propose academic and administrative appointments that are at and above the level of Tutors and Demonstrators or their equivalent before these appointments are made;
 - to deal with other matters referred to it by the Council.
- The Administrative and Planning Committee shall report to the Council 3. through the Vice-Chancellor.

STATUTE 14

The Senate

- 1 The Senate shall consist of ---
 - (a) the Vice-Chancellor who shall be Chairman;
 - (b) the Pro-Vice-Chancellors;
 - (c) the Head of each College;
 - (d) the Dean of each Faculty and of the Graduate School;
 - the Professors, or the Readers in each Department in which there (e) is no professor;
 - the Chairman of each Department and the Directors of Studies if (*f*) not a member under subparagraph (e);
 - 2 Fellows of each College elected by the College's Assembly of (g) Fellows;
 - the Registrar; (h)

- (*i*) the Librarian;
- (j) the University Dean of Students;
- (k) the President of the University Students Union;
- 1 student of each Faculty of the University elected by, and from (l)among, full-time students in that Faculty pursuing approved courses of study for a degree of the Univeristy.
- 2. Members of the Senate (other than Fellows and student members elected under paragraph 1(l) shall remain members of the Senate for so long as they hold the office or appointment by reason of which they became members of the Senate.
- 3 Fellows elected under paragraph 1 (g) shall hold office for 2 years from the date of their election and shall be eligible for re-election provided that they shall cease to be members of the Senate if they cease to be assigned to the College by whose Assembly of Fellows they were elected. Should an elected member die or resign from the Senate or cease to be a Fellow within the College by whose members he was elected a successor shall be duly elected who shall be a member of the Senate for the unexpired period of membership of his predecessor.
 - Student members under paragraph 1(l) shall be elected in such (b) manner as may be determined by the Senate.
 - Student members elected under paragraph 1(l) shall hold office (c) for a period of one year and shall be eligible for re-election provided that no student shall be a member of the Senate for more than two consecutive terms of office. If a student member resigns or ceases to be a member of the Senate and his unexpired period of membership is 6 months or longer, then a successor shall be elected in accordance with subparagraph (b) for that unexpired period of membership, but if his unexpired period of membership is shorter than 6 months, then no successor shall be elected for that unexpired period of membership.
 - (d) A student member shall cease to be a member of the Senate if he ceases to be a registered student of the University or if he is suspended from pursuing full-time study at the University.
- Subject to the Ordinance and Statutes, the Senate shall have the following 4. powers and duties —
 - (a) to promote research by members of the University;
 - to regulate the admission of persons to approved courses of study (b) and their attendance at such courses; and to assign students to Colleges with due regard to the preferences of both the students and the Colleges;
 - (c) to direct and regulate the instruction and teaching in approved courses of study and to conduct the examinations leading to degrees, diplomas, certificates and other awards of the University;
 - (d) to consider, upon the advice of the Assembly of Fellows of each College, measures necessary for the conduct of student-orientated

- teaching, and to consider also measures necessary for the conduct of subject-orientated teaching;
- to make, after report from the Faculties concerned, all regulations (e) for giving effect to the Statutes and decrees relating to approved courses of study and examinations;
- (f) to appoint internal examiners after report from the Boards of the Departments concerned;
- to recommend after report from the Boards of the Departments (g) concerned external examiners for appointment by the Council;
- to recommend the conferment of degrees (other than degrees (h) honoris causa) and to award diplomas, certificates and other distinctions:
- to fix, subject to any conditions made by the donors and accepted (i) by the Council, the times, the mode and the conditions of competition for University scholarships, bursaries and prizes, and to award the same;
- to recommend to the Council the institution, abolition or holding (j) in abeyance of all teaching posts and the assignment of teachers to a College after consultation with the Assembly of Fellows (where one has been established) of the College concerned;
- to recommend to the Council external experts to serve as members (k) of Boards of Advisers;
- to report to the Council on all Statutes and Decrees and proposed (l) changes thereof;
- (m) to report to the Council on any academic matter;
- (n) to discuss any matter relating to the University and to report its views to the Council;
- to report to the Council on any matters referred to the Senate by (o) the Council;
- to consider estimates of expenditure prepared in respect of the (p) University, and to report thereon to the Council;
- to formulate, modify or revise schemes for the organization of (q) Faculties and to assign to such Faculties their respective subjects; also to report to the Council on the expediency of establishing at any time other Faculties or as to the expediency of abolishing, combining or sub-dividing any Faculties;
- (*r*) (Repealed L.N. 452 of 1994)
- (s) to supervise the libraries and laboratories;
- to require any undergraduate or student on academic grounds to (t)terminate his studies at the University;
- (u)to determine --
 - the academic year which shall be a period not exceeding 12 (i) consecutive months, and
 - the academic terms which shall be part of an academic year;
- to exercise such other powers and perform such other duties as (v) the Council may authorize or require.

- The Senate shall hold at least 3 meetings in each academic year and additionally at any time at the direction of the Chairman or on the written request of any 10 members of the Senate.
- 5A. (a) Student members of the Senate and of such committees and other bodies as the Senate may establish shall not be entitled to participate in that part of meetings considering reserved areas of business or have access to or read papers or any other documents relating
 - (b) The reserved areas of business are the following
 - matters affecting the appointment, promotion and other affairs relating to teachers and members of the University staff as individuals;
 - (ii) matters affecting the admission and academic assessment of students as individuals;
 - (iii) expenditure estimates and other matters concerning the finances of the University.

The Chairman of the Senate, or the Chairman of the committee or other body established by the Senate, as the case may be, may decide in any case of doubt whether or not a matter falls within one of the reserved areas of business referred to above and his decision shall be final.

- 7 days' notice in writing of any meeting of the Senate shall be sent by the Registrar to each person entitled to receive notice of the meeting with the agenda therefor and no business not on such agenda shall be transacted if the Chairman or any 4 members present object.
- The Senate may make for the proper conduct of its business Standing Orders which it may amend or rescind by simple majority at any of its meetings provided that not less than 7 days' notice has been given in writing by the Registrar to members of the Senate of the proposal so to amend or rescind.
- 8. The quorum at any meeting of the Senate shall be 24.
- 1. The Vice-Chancellor shall be a member of each Faculty.
- 2. Each teacher shall be assigned by the Senate to a Faculty or Faculties and shall be a member of such Faculty or Faculties during the tenure of his appointment.
- The members of each Faculty shall elect, in such form and manner as 3. may be determined by the Senate, a Dean of their Faculty from among the members of their Board of Faculty who hold the rank of Senior Lecturer or above: and a Dean so elected shall hold office for a term of 3 years.
- Subject to paragraph 3
 - the Dean of any Faculty shall be eligible for re-election for a second and a third consecutive term of office but if he does not seek reelection or is not re-elected he shall not be eligible for another term of office until 2 years after he ceases to be Dean;

STATUTE 15 The Faculties and the Graduate School

(b) any person who is Dean of any Faculty for 3 consecutive terms of office shall not be eligible for another term of office until 2 years after he ceases to be Dean.

Subparagraphs (a) and (b) shall also apply to any person who is elected to a further term of office as Dean of any Faculty 2 or more years after he has ceased to be Dean.

- 5. Each Faculty shall meet at least once a year, and shall have the power to discuss any matters relating to the Faculty and to express its opinion thereon to the Senate.
- 6. A Board of Faculty shall be established for each Faculty and shall consist of —
 - (a) the Vice-Chancellor:
 - (Repealed L.N. 452 of 1994) (b) - (c)
 - (d) the Dean, who shall be Chairman;
 - the Chairman of each Department within the Faculty; (e)
 - other Professors, Readers and Directors of Studies within the (f) Faculty:
 - (g) one representative of each Assembly of Fellows who shall be a member of the Faculty;
 - (h) 2 Senior Lecturers elected by the Senior Lecturers within the Faculty:
 - 4 Lecturers or Assistant Lecturers elected by the Lecturers and (*i*) Assistant Lecturers within the Faculty.
- 7. The Board of Faculty shall co-ordinate the activities of the Departments within the Faculty and it shall be its function to consider and deal with the recommendations of the Departments
 - on the content of courses for the degree or degrees; and
 - on the details of syllabuses.
- The Dean of the Graduate School shall be appointed by the Council on the recommendation of the Vice-Chancellor for a period to be determined by the Council.
- 9 The Council of the Graduate School shall consist of —
 - (a) the Dean of the Graduate School, who shall be Chairman;
 - (b) the Deans of the Faculties:
 - (c) the Heads of the Divisions in the Graduate School:
 - (d) the Librarian:
 - (e) the Master of the Postgraduate Hall Complex.
- 10. Subject to the Ordinance and the Statutes, the Council of the Graduate School shall have the following powers and duties —
 - (a) to advise the Senate on all graduate programmes of studies;
 - (b) to co-ordinate the activities of the Divisions within the Graduate School:
 - to consider and deal with the recommendations of the various (c) Divisions on the content of courses and on the details of syllabuses.

1. The Council shall initially appoint 6 Fellows for each College on the recommendation of a Committee consisting of -

STATUTE 16 **Fellows**

- the Vice-Chancellor, who shall be Chairman:
- 3 Professors, Readers or Senior Lecturers nominated by staff in those grades, who are on the existing staff of that College; and
- 3 Lecturers or Assistant Lecturers nominated by staff in those grades, who are on the existing staff of that College.

At least 3 of the 6 Fellows so appointed shall be drawn from the existing staff of that College.

- The Fellows of each College appointed under paragraph 1, together with the Head of the College, shall form an Assembly of Fellows for that College.
- 3. The Head of a College shall be the Chairman of the Assembly of Fellows of that College.
- 4. Subject to paragraph 6, the Assembly of Fellows of each College may elect additional Fellows to that Assembly from the academic staff of the University who have been assigned to the College concerned.
- A Fellow shall hold office for 5 years and shall be eligible to hold office 5. again as a Fellow.
- The Assembly of Fellows of each College shall 6.
 - elect one of their number to be a member of the Council;
 - (b) when necessary, elect 6 Fellows of varying academic seniority for the purposes of serving on the Committee constituted under paragraph 1 of Statute 9;
 - be responsible for -(c)
 - arranging the tutorial instruction, pastoral counselling and student-orientated teaching of the students assigned to the College;
 - (ii) the supervision of residential accommodation for certain students at the College; and
 - (iii) the maintenance of discipline within the College.
- An Assembly of Fellows may make Standing Orders for the proper conduct of its business.
- Each Department shall consist of the Vice-Chancellor and all the teachers assigned to the Department.

STATUTE 17 The **Departments**

- The Chairman of each Department shall be appointed by the Council on the recommendation of the Senate for such period as may be determined by the Council.
- A Board shall be established for each Department and shall consist 3. (1) of -
 - (a) the Vice-Chancellor;
 - (aa) the Dean of any Faculty to which the Department is affiliated;

- the Chairman of the Department, who shall be Chairman of the Board: and
- (c) all of the teachers assigned to the Department.
- (2)On the approval of the Senate, teachers of other Departments who contribute substantially to the teaching of students pursuing courses of study within the purview of a Department and are nominated by the Board of the Department become members of the Board.
- At the discretion of the Board of the Department, the Board may (3) nominate such students as the Board deems fit as student members for such period as the Board may in its absolute discretion determine, provided that such student members shall not be entitled to participate in that part of meetings considering reserved areas of business or have access to or read papers or any other documents relating thereto. For the purpose of this Statute, reserved areas of business are the same as those referred to in paragraph 5A(b) of Statute 14. The Chairman of the Board may decide in any case of doubt whether or not a matter falls within one of the reserved areas of business referred to above and his decisions shall be final.
- It is the duty of the Board of a Department to advise the Senate on the courses of study within the purview of the Department, on the appointment of internal and external examiners and on other matters that the Senate may request.
- 5. A Department shall perform such other functions and duties as may be determined from time to time by the Council on the recommendation of the Senate.

STATUTE 18 The

- 1. There shall be a Convocation of the University which shall consist of all persons whose names appear on the Convocation roll. Convocation
 - All persons who are graduates of the University shall be entitled to have their names entered on the Convocation roll:
 - Provided that persons on whom a degree honoris causa has been conferred shall not solely by reason thereof be members of Convocation, but may be elected by Convocation to be members thereof.
 - Any person who obtains a diploma issued by the Post-Secondary Colleges Joint Diploma Board in the academic year of establishment of the University shall be entitled to have his name entered on the Convocation roll.
 - 3A. Any person who had been admitted as a registered student of an original College before the date of establishment of the University, pursued a course of study of not less than 4 years' duration in that original College, and obtained a diploma issued by that original College or by the Post-Secondary Colleges Joint Diploma Board on satisfactory fulfilment of all the requirements prescribed therefor may register with the Registrar of the University to have his name entered on the Convocation roll.

- 3B. Any person who has attended an approved course of study for not less than 1 academic year after admission as a registered postgraduate student to a Faculty or a School and has been awarded a postgraduate diploma by the Senate on satisfactory fulfilment of all the requirements prescribed therefor may register with the Registrar of the University to have his name entered on the Convocation roll.
- The Convocation shall from its own members elect a Chairman and 4. may elect a Vice-Chairman who shall respectively hold office for such periods as the Convocation may determine. No member shall be eligible for election as Chairman or Vice-Chairman unless he is normally resident in Hong Kong. Any retiring Chairman or Vice-Chairman shall be eligible for re-election.
- 5. In case of any casual vacancy in the office of Chairman or Vice-Chairman, the Convocation shall elect one of its members to fill the vacancy and the person so elected shall hold office for the remainder of the term for which his predecessor was appointed.
- (Repealed L.N. 243 of 1994) 6.
- Subject to subparagraph (2), the Convocation shall from a date to 7. be appointed by the Council elect such number of members of the Convocation not exceeding 3 as the Council shall from time to time determine to be members of the Council.
 - No member of the Convocation shall be eligible for election under (2)subparagraph (1) to serve, or continue to serve, as a member of the Council if he is or becomes a member of the University by virtue of Statute 3, unless he is such a member by virtue of paragraph (m) only, and not at the same time such a member by virtue of any other paragraph, of that Statute, but, save as aforesaid, a member of the Convocation elected under subparagraph (1) shall continue to be a member of the Council, and shall be eligible for re-election, notwithstanding his being a member of the University by virtue of paragraphs (f) and (m) of Statute 3 at the same time so long as he is such a member of the Council by virtue of paragraph 1(n) of Statute 11 only, and not at the same time a member of the Council by virtue of any other paragraph of that Statute.
- 8. The Convocation shall, after a date to be determined by the Council, meet at least once in each calendar year and notice of such meeting shall be given 4 weeks before the date of meeting. Any member desiring to bring forward any business thereat shall forward a statement in writing to reach the Secretary of the Convocation at least 2 weeks before the date of meeting, setting forth in the form of motions the subject or subjects proposed for consideration.
- The quorum at any meeting of the Convocation shall be as prescribed by the Council after report from the Convocation.
- 10. The constitution, functions, privileges and other matters relating to the Convocation shall be subject to the approval of the Council.

STATUTE 19

The academic staff of the University shall consist of —

- **Academic Staff**
- (a) the Vice-Chancellor:
- the Pro-Vice-Chancellors: (b)
- the Head of each of the Colleges; (c)
- (d) the teachers:
- the Librarian; and (e)
- such other persons as the Council on the recommendation of the (f) Senate may prescribe.

STATUTE 20 Appointment of Academic and Senior Administrative 2. Staff

- 1. There shall be Boards of Advisers which shall make recommendations to the Council concerning the appointment of academic and senior administrative staff. Recommendations concerning the appointment of academic staff shall be conveyed through the Senate.
 - The Board of Advisers for each appointment of Professor, Reader and Senior Lecturer shall consist of
 - the Vice-Chancellor, or a deputy appointed by him, who shall be Chairman;
 - one member of the Council appointed by the Council, who is not (b) a member of the College to which the appointee will be assigned;
 - 2 members of the Senate, appointed by the Senate, who are not (c) members of the College to which the appointee will be assigned;
 - (d) the Head of the College to which the appointee will be assigned;
 - the Chairman of the Department in which the appointment is to be made, except that no such Chairman shall serve on a Board that is concerned with a post senior to his own post; and
 - 2 external experts.
- 3. The Board of Advisers for each appointment of Lecturer shall consist
 - (a) the Vice-Chancellor, or a deputy appointed by him, who shall be Chairman:
 - (b) one member of the Council appointed by the Council, who is not a member of the College to which the appointee will be assigned;
 - 2 members of the Senate appointed by the Senate, who are not (c) members of the College to which the appointee will be assigned;
 - the Head of the College to which the appointee will be assigned; (d)
 - (e) the Chairman of the Department in which the appointment is to be made; and
 - (f) if considered necessary or desirable by the Council, one external
- The Board of Advisers for each appointment of Assistant Lecturer shall consist of
 - the Vice-Chancellor, or a deputy appointed by him, who shall be Chairman;

- (b) one member of the Council appointed by the Council, who is not a member of the College to which the appointee will be assigned;
- one member of the Senate appointed by the Senate, who is not a (c) member of the College to which the appointee will be assigned;
- the Head of College to which the appointee will be assigned; (d)
- the Chairman of the Department in which the appointment is to be
- The Board of Advisers for the appointment of the Librarian shall consist
 - the Vice-Chancellor, or a deputy appointed by him, who shall be (a) Chairman:
 - (b) one member of the Council appointed by the Council;
 - 2 members of the Senate appointed by the Senate; and
 - 2 external experts. (d)
- 6. The Board of Advisers for the appointment of the Secretary and the Registrar shall consist of
 - the Vice-Chancellor, or a deputy appointed by him, who shall be Chairman;
 - the Chairman of the Council or in his absence a person appointed (b) by the Council;
 - one other member of the Council appointed by the Council; and (c)
 - 2 members of the Senate appointed by the Senate.
- The Board of Advisers for the appointment of the Bursar shall consist 7. of -
 - (a) the Vice-Chancellor, or a deputy appointed by him, who shall be Chairman;
 - the Treasurer: (b)
 - one member of the Council appointed by the Council; and (c)
 - 2 members of the Senate appointed by the Senate.
- The Boards of Advisers constituted under paragraphs 4 and 6 may, for 8. the purposes of making any recommendation, consult an external expert.
- For the purposes of this Statute an external expert shall be appointed by 9. the Council and shall not be a member of the staff of the University.
- 10. No person shall be recommended for appointment to any post in respect of which the relevant Board of Advisers includes an external expert or experts unless that expert, or if there are two, those experts certify in writing that the person to be recommended is of the required academic or professional standing.
- 11. Where, in relation to any recommendation for appointment to any post, the Board of Advisers has 2 external experts and those experts are unable to agree over the recommendation, the matter shall be referred to the Administrative and Planning Committee, who may determine the dispute.

STATUTE 21 Honorary and **Emeritus** Professors

- 1. The Council may appoint Honorary Professors and may award the title of Emeritus Professor to any Professor who has retired from office provided that such appointment or award is recommended by the Senate.
- 2. An Honorary or Emeritus Professor shall not ex officio be a member of the Senate or of any Faculty or of any Department.

STATUTE 22 Retirement of Certain Officers and Academic Staff

The Vice-Chancellor, the Pro-Vice-Chancellors and all other salaried officers and teachers -

- shall vacate their offices or appointments by 31 July following the (a) date on which they attain the age of 60 years unless the Council by a vote of at least two-thirds of the number of members present shall request any such person to continue in his office or appointment for such period thereafter as it shall from time to time determine, or
- may retire, or upon the direction of the Council shall retire, at any time after attaining the age of 55 and before attaining the age of

STATUTE 23 Resignations

Any person wishing to resign from any office or membership of any body shall do so by notice in writing.

Removal from Office, Membership

STATUTE 24

Appointment

- 1. The Council may for good cause as defined in paragraph 2 remove the Treasurer from his office and any member of the Council other than the Chairman and any person appointed under paragraph 1 (k) and (l) of Statute 11 from his membership of the Council.
- 2. "Good cause" in paragraph 1 means
 - conviction of any crime which shall be judged by the Council to be of an immoral, scandalous or disgraceful nature;
 - (b) actual physical or mental incapacity which shall be judged by the Council to prevent the proper execution of the duties of the officer or membership; or
 - any conduct which shall be judged by the Council to be of an (c) immoral, scandalous or disgraceful nature.
- 3. The Council may for good cause as defined in paragraph 5 remove from their appointments the Vice-Chancellor, the Pro-Vice-Chancellors, the Head of each of the Colleges, any of the Professors or Readers or Senior Lecturers, the Secretary, the Registrar, the Librarian, the Bursar and any other person holding an academic or administrative appointment made by the Council.
- The Council may and shall if requested by the person concerned or by any 3 members of the Council before such removal appoint a committee consisting of the Chairman of the Council, 2 other members of the Council and 3 members of the Senate to examine the complaint and to report to the Council thereof.

- 5. "Good cause" in paragraph 3 means
 - conviction of any crime which the Council after consideration if necessary of a report of the committee referred to in paragraph 4 shall consider to be of an immoral, scandalous or disgraceful nature:
 - (b) actual physical or mental incapacity which the Council after consideration if necessary of a report of the committee referred to in paragraph 4 shall consider to be such as to render the person concerned unfit for the execution of the duties of his office or appointment;
 - conduct of an immoral, scandalous or disgraceful nature which the Council after consideration if necessary of a report of the committee referred to in paragraph 4 shall consider to be such as to render the person concerned unfit to continue to hold his office or appointment;
 - conduct which the Council after consideration if necessary of a (d) report of the committee referred to in paragraph 4 shall consider to be such as to constitute failure or inability to perform the duties of his office or appointment or to comply with the conditions of the tenure of his office or appointment.
- Subject to the terms of his appointment no person referred to in paragraph 3 shall be removed from his appointment save for good cause as defined in paragraph 5 and in pursuance of the procedure specified in paragraph 4.
- No student shall be permitted to pursue an approved course of study for a Bachelor's degree of the University unless he shall have
 - been admitted by and to the University;
 - been registered as a matriculated student of the University; and (b)
 - (c) satisfied such other requirements for admission to the course as shall have been prescribed by regulation.
- No student shall be permitted to pursue an approved course of advanced study or research leading to a certificate, diploma or higher degree of the University unless he shall have
 - been admitted by and to the University;
 - been registered as an advanced student of the University; and (b)
 - (c) satisfied such other requirements for admission to the course as shall have been prescribed by regulation.
- No student shall be permitted to pursue an approved course of study or research not leading to a degree or diploma of the University unless he shall have ---
 - (a) been registered as an associate student of the University; and
 - satisfied such other requirements for admission to the course as shall have been prescribed by regulation.

STATUTE 25 The Students and Associate Students

- Each student shall be subject to the disciplinary control of the University. 4.
- The University may demand and receive from any student such fees as 5. the Council may from time to time determine.
- The Senate shall from time to time determine the requirements which 6. an applicant must fulfil for matriculation as a student of the University.
- 7. There may be a University Students Union. The constitution shall be subject to the approval of the Council.
- 8. There may be a Students Union for each College. The constitution shall be subject to the approval of the Council, on the recommendation of the Assembly of Fellows of the College concerned.

STATUTE 26 Degree and Other Awards

- (1)The University may confer the degrees of Bachelor, Master and Doctor with the designations prescribed in paragraph 2(1) to students who
 - have attended an approved course of study;
 - have passed the appropriate examination or examinations; (b) and
 - have complied in all other respects with the requirements (c) prescribed therefor.
 - (2)The University may confer any of the degrees with the designations prescribed in paragraph 2(2) on any person who has rendered distinguished service in the advancement of any branch of learning or who has otherwise rendered himself worthy of such a degree.
- 2. The degrees which may be conferred by the University shall have the following designations —
 - (1) (a) Bachelor's Degrees

- The degree of Bachelor shall not be conferred upon a student unless he shall have attended approved courses of study as a matriculated student of the University.
- The Senate may accept as part of the attendance of a student qualifying him for the conferment of the degree of Bachelor periods of attendance as a registered student at another university or institution of higher learning recognized by the Senate for this purpose:

Provided that the degree of Bachelor shall not be conferred upon such student unless ---

- he shall have attended an approved course of study as a matriculated student of the University for at least 2 academic years;
- his total period of attendance as a matriculated student of the (b) University and as a registered student of another university or institution of higher learning shall not be less than 3 academic vears; and
- he shall have attended his final term of study at the University (c) immediately preceding his completion of all requirements for the conferment of the degree of Bachelor.

- The Senate may accept a certificate of proficiency in any subject issued by another university or institution of higher learning recognized for this purpose by the Senate as exempting from any examination of the University in such subject for the degree of Bachelor.
- 6. Save as provided in paragraphs 10 and 11, the degree of Master shall not be conferred upon any person in any Faculty unless he has pursued an approved course of study or research for a period of at least 12 months after satisfying the requirements for the conferment of the degree of Bachelor in the Faculty concerned or after admission as a postgraduate student in terms of paragraph 9.
- Save as provided in paragraphs 10 and 11, the degree of Doctor of Philosophy in any Faculty shall not be conferred upon any person unless he has —
 - (a) followed an approved course of research as a student of the University for a period of at least 24 months after satisfying the requirements for the conferment of the degree of Bachelor in the Faculty concerned or after admission as a postgraduate student in terms of paragraph 9; and
 - submitted a thesis which is certified by examiners to make a distinct (b) contribution to the knowlege or understanding of the subject and to afford evidence of originality shown either by the discovery of new facts or by the exercise of independent critical power.
- 8. Save as provided in paragraphs 10 and 11, the degree of Doctor of Literature, Doctor of Science, Doctor of Social Science, Doctor of Business Administration or Doctor of Medicine shall not be conferred upon any person unless --
 - he shall be a graduate of the University of not less than 7 years standing; and
 - (b) he shall have made in the opinion of the examiners a sustained contribution of distinction to the advancement of his subject.
- 9. A person who has graduated in another university or who as a registered student of Chung Chi College, The United College of Hong Kong or New Asia College has obtained before the date of establishment of the University a diploma or certificate issued by or on behalf of such Colleges may be exempted from the matriculation requirement of the University and may be admitted as a postgraduate student and may proceed to the degree of Master or Doctor under such conditions as may be prescribed by the Statutes and by decrees and regulations made thereunder.
 - (2) A person who
 - has completed a course of study in a tertiary educational institution and holds professional or similar qualifications equivalent to a degree; and
 - has satisfied such other requirements as may be prescribed (b) by the Statutes and by decrees and regulations made thereunder.

- may be exempted from the matriculation requirements of the University and may be admitted to be a postgraduate student with the approval of the Senate.
- 10. The Senate may recommend the award of the degree of Master or Doctor in any Faculty to any member of the academic staff of the University and for this purpose may exempt any such person from any of the requirements prescribed for the conferment of the degree other than the examination therefor.
- 11. The Council may recommend the award without requiring attendance or examination of a degree of Master or Doctor honoris causa:

Provided that the holder of a degree which has been conferred honoris causa shall not, by the fact that he has been admitted thereto, be entitled to practise any profession.

- 12. The Council shall not recommend the award of any degree of Master or Doctor honoris causa except after consideration of recommendations submitted by an Honorary Degrees Committee consisting of —
 - (a) the Chancellor:
 - the Vice-Chancellor; (b)
 - (c) the Heads of the Colleges;
 - (d) the Chairman of the Council;
 - (e) 2 members of the Council nominated by the Council; and
 - members of the Senate, equal in number to the number of the (f) Colleges, elected by the Senate.
- 13. The University may award diplomas and certificates
 - to students who ---(a)
 - have attended an approved course of study; (i)
 - (ii) have passed the appropriate examination or examinations; and
 - (iii) have complied in all other respects with the requirements prescribed therefor; and
 - to persons other than those provided for in subparagraph (a) above (b) who are deemed by the Senate to possess the qualification appropriate for the award of such diplomas and certificates provided that such persons
 - have pursued a course of study therefor at one or more educational institutions in Hong Kong recognized for this purpose by the Senate; and
 - have passed the appropriate examination or examinations of the University.
- 14. Subject to the right of appeal from the decision of the Senate to the Council and from the decision of the Council to the Chancellor, the Senate may deprive any person who has been convicted of an arrestable offence or who in their opinion has been guilty of dishonourable or scandalous conduct of any degree, diploma, certificate or other award of the University.

STATUTE 27 **Examinations**

- Examinations of the University qualifying in any subject of study for a Bachelor's degree or a higher degree of the University shall be conducted by a board of examiners which shall consist of -
 - 2 or more internal examiners who shall be teachers in the subject of the examination; and
 - save as provided by paragraph 3, one or more external examiners who shall not be members of the academic staff of the University and who shall not have taken part in the teaching of the candidates.
- 2. The board of examiners shall have the duty to ensure that examinations are properly conducted and the assessment is fair and consistent.
- 3. Upon the approval of the Senate the requirement in paragraph 1 (b) shall not apply for examinations qualifying in a subject of study for a Bachelor's degree, and one or more visiting examiners who shall not be members of the academic staff of the University and who shall not have taken part in the teaching of the candidates shall be appointed for the subject by the Council upon the recommendation of the Senate or in the case of emergency by the Vice-Chancellor.
- The visiting examiner or examiners shall
 - call for at his or their discretion the examination scripts of all or any, but not less than one-third, of the examinations qualifying for the degree in the subject for which he is or they are appointed;
 - submit to the Vice-Chancellor an annual written report; and (b)
 - (c) visit the University not less than once every 3 years to review in depth the examinations on site.

STATUTE 28 Citation

The Statutes may be cited as the Statutes of The Chinese University of Hong Kong.

CONSTITUTION OF THE **ORIGINAL COLLEGES**

Interpretation.

In this Schedule, unless the context otherwise requires —

"Boards of Trustees" means the Boards of Trustees of the Colleges incorporated under paragraph 2;

"Chairman" means the Chairman of each Board of Trustees;

"College" means an original College and "Colleges" shall be construed accordingly;

"Council" means the Council of The Chinese University of Hong Kong.

2. (1)There shall be a Board of Trustees of Chung Chi College which shall be a body corporate and shall have the name of "The Trustees of Chung Chi College" and in that name shall have perpetual succession, and may sue and be sued, and shall have and use a common seal.

Incorporation of Board of Trustees.

- There shall be a Board of Trustees of The United College of Hong (2)Kong which shall be a body corporate and shall have the name of "The Trustees of The United College of Hong Kong" and in that name shall have perpetual succession, and may sue and be sued, and shall have and use a common seal.
- There shall be a Board of Trustees of New Asia College which (3) shall be a body corporate and shall have the name of "The Trustees of New Asia College" and in that name shall have perpetual succession, and may sue and be sued, and shall have and use a common seal.
- 3. Each Board of Trustees shall hold in trust, and administer for the (1) benefit of its College the movable property which is vested in the Board under paragraph 7; and shall hold in trust for the benefit of the University the buildings the subject of the agreements to be made under paragraph 2 of Schedule 2*.

Powers and duties of Boards of Trustees.

Subject to sub-paragraph (3), each Board of Trustees may, for the (2)purpose of the trusts under sub-paragraph (1), exercise the powers conferred on trustees by the Trustee Ordinance.

(Cap. 29.)

- A Board of Trustees shall not, without the prior approval of the (3) Council, which may be subject to such conditions as the Council thinks fit, accept any gift for the benefit of the College.
- Each Board shall make written provision for its procedure in the (4) transaction of business, the discharge of its aims and duties and the maintenance of good order at its meetings.
- The Board of Trustees of Chung Chi College shall (5)
 - recommend to the Council, through the Administrative and Planning Committee, all appointments to the Theology Division, or whatever part of the University shall succeed the Division as being responsible for theological education, including the appointment of the Head of the Theology Division (or equivalent post) and of the warden of the Theology Hostel;
 - allocate for the promotion of theological education, including (b) the upkeep of the Theology Building, the resources made available from private funds;
 - provide for and appoint the Chaplain of the Chapel; and (c)
 - advise the Senate on all major policy matters relating to (d) theological education,

and the Board of Trustees may delegate to a Theological Council appointed by it the power to discharge the functions and duties imposed on the Board by this sub-paragraph.

Composition of Boards of Trustees

- (1) The persons who, immmediately before the commencement of this Ordinance, were members of the Board of Governors of Chung Chi College shall, on the commencement of this Ordinance. become the members of the Board of Trustees of that College incorporated under paragraph 2(1).
 - (2) The persons who, immmediately before the commencement of this Ordinance, were members of the Board of Trustees of The United College of Hong Kong shall, on the commencement of this Ordinance, become members of the Board of Trustees of that College incorporated under paragraph 2(2).
 - The persons who, immmediately before the commencement of (3) this Ordinance, were members of the Board of Governors of New Asia College shall, on the commencement of this Ordinance, become members of the Board of Trustees of that College incorporated under paragraph 2(3).
 - (4) Any person who is at the commencement of this Ordinance, or who becomes, a member of a Board of Trustees may retire as a member of that Board of Trustees, but no person shall retire so as to reduce the number of members of the Board of Trustees below 4.
 - Vacancies in the number of members of a Board of Trustees shall (5) from time to time be filled by such legal means as would have been available for the appointment of new trustees if the Board of Trustees had not been incorporated, and, without prejudice to the generality of the foregoing, section 42 of the Trustee Ordinance shall apply in relation to the appointment of new Trustees.

Registration with Registrar of Companies.

(1)Each Board of Trustees shall forward to the Registrar of Companies

- (a) notice of the address of the principal office of the Board of Trustees and any change thereof;
- (b) a list of the names and addresses of the members of the Board of Trustees, and any change therein, certified as correct by the Chairman; and
 - a copy of the written provision made under paragraph 3(4), and any change therein, certified as correct by the Chairman.
- (2)Notification in accordance with sub-paragraph (1)(a)and (b) shall be made --
 - within 3 months of the commencement of this Ordinance; (a) and
 - thereafter within 28 days of any change.
- (3) Notification under sub-paragraph (1)(c) shall be made within 28 days after the making of any written provision under paragraph 3(4) or the making of any change therein.
- (4) Any person may inspect at the office of the Registrar of Companies any of the documents registered under this paragaph.
- (5) A fee of \$5 shall be payable for registering or inspecting any document referred to in this paragraph.

Each Board of Trustees shall in each year, prepare and produce to the Council its audited accounts in such form and at such times as the Council may determine.

Transitional provisions.

- all movable property held on trust by or for each College and all immovable property held by or on behalf of the Colleges outside the precincts of the University shall vest in the Board of Trustees of the College concerned without further assurance and on the same trusts and subject to the same terms and conditions, if any, on which the same was then held;
- the Board of Trustees of each College shall succeed to all rights, (b) privileges, obligations and liabilities of the Colleges relating to the property vested in the Board of Trustees under sub-paragraph (a).

CONSTITUTION OF SHAW COLLEGE

In this Schedule, unless the context otherwise requires —

Interpretation.

- "Board of Trustees" means the Board of Trustees of Shaw College incorporated under paragraph 2;
- "Chairman" means the Chairman of the Board of Trustees:
- "Council" means the Council of The Chinese University of Hong Kong; "Planning Committee" means the Planning Committee for Shaw College established by the Council under section 10(1).
- 2. There shall be a Board of Trustees of Shaw College which shall be a body corporate and shall have the name of "The Trustees of Shaw College" and in that name shall have perpetual succession, and may sue and be sued, and shall have and use a common seal.

I. General

- A. Applicants seeking admission to a course of study leading to a bachelor's degree of the University shall have satisfied the minimum entrance requirements of the University and the programme concerned as stipulated in these regulations.
- B. Applicants seeking admission on the strength of Hong Kong Advanced Level Examination results shall apply for admission in accordance with the stipulations in Section II.
- C. Applicants seeking admission on the strength of qualifications other than Hong Kong Advanced Level Examination results shall apply for admission in accordance with the stipulations in Section III.

II. Admission on the Strength of Hong Kong Advanced Level **Examination Results**

- A. Minimum University requirements for application Applicants shall
 - 1. have obtained in one sitting of the Hong Kong Certificate of Education Examination (HKCEE) grade E or above in at least seven subjects including two language subjects (Chinese Language, English Language, French or German); and
 - 2. have obtained in one sitting of the Hong Kong Advanced Level Examination (HKALE) grade E or above in:
 - Advanced Supplementary Level Chinese Language & Culture*; and

^{*} Applicants who do not possess the required results in Advanced Supplementary Chinese Language & Culture but who have obtained outstanding results in other subjects may, at the discretion of individual faculties, be exempted from this language requirement and be admitted to the programme concerned after passing a language test arranged by the University.

- b. Advanced Supplementary Level Use of English; and
- c. at least two Advanced Level subjects, or one Advanced Level and two Advanced Supplementary Level subjects.

B. Requirements of the programmes

In addition to satisfying the University requirements, applicants shall satisfy the additional requirements of the programme concerned as listed in the table on pp. 338 to 347.

C. Criteria for selection

Applicants will be considered on the basis of the results they obtained in the Hong Kong Certificate of Education Examination and the Hong Kong Advanced Level Examination, and their academic and extracurricular achievements in school. If they are invited to attend an interview, their performance at the interview will also be taken into consideration.

III. Admission on the Strength of Qualifications Other Than Hong Kong Advanced Level Examination Results

A. Minimum University requirements for application

Applicants shall be eligible to apply for admission if they

- 1. have obtained in one sitting of the GCE Advanced Level Examination pass grades in no less than three subjects; or
- 2. have acquired an International Baccalaureate Diploma; or
- 3. possess a qualification obtained outside Hong Kong which qualifies them for university admission in the country/region where such qualification is obtained; or
- 4. possess a Matriculation Certificate of The Chinese University of Hong Kong issued in 1978 or before; or
- 5. have obtained in one sitting of the Hong Kong Higher Level Examination grade E or above in no less than five subjects including Chinese Language & Literature and English Language;
- 6. have completed at least one year of undergraduate study at a recognized university; or
- 7. are pursuing medical studies in an institution recognized for full registration by the General Medical Council of the United Kingdom (for transfer to Clinical Studies in the Faculty of Medicine): or
- 8. are mature persons aged 23 or over on 1st September in the year when admission is sought, provided:
 - they are able to show either by publication or by other acceptable evidence that they have achieved sufficient competence in their chosen field of study to justify admission; or have shown exceptional ability in appropriate academic or professional fields; and

- b. they can produce evidence of continuous residence in Hong Kong for at least three years; or
- 9. have other exceptional abilities which merit admission. They shall also have attained an acceptable level of proficiency in both the Chinese and English languages.

B. Criteria for selection

Applicants shall be considered on the basis of their educational background and academic achievements. If they are invited to attend an interview, their performance at the interview will also be taken into consideration.



 - have obtained in one sitting of the Advanced Level Examination of the University of Hong Kong or the Hong Kong Examinations Authority in 1993 or before Grade E or above in at least three subjects, and
 - b. have obtained in addition Grade E or above in Use of English in the same sitting of the Advanced Level Examination; or
 - 3. have obtained in one sitting of the Hong Kong Higher Level Examination in 1979 or thereafter Grade E or above in Chinese Language and Literature, English Language and three other subjects; or
 - 4. possess a Matriculation Certificate of The Chinese University of Hong Kong issued in 1978 or before; or
 - 5. have obtained in one sitting of the Hong Kong Certificate of

Education Examination or equivalent examination Grade C or above in five subjects including Chinese Language and English Language (if Grade C or above is obtained in both Additional Mathematics and Mathematics, only the subject with the higher grade will be counted), and have had at least four years of fulltime working experience; or

 - b. they can produce evidence of continuous residence in Hong Kong for at least three years; and
- B. sit for an entrance test and obtain satisfactory results therein.

III. Admission to the Part-time Degree Programmes in Music, Physical Education and Sports Science, and Primary **Education with Unit Exemptions**

Applicants may apply for admission and be granted an exemption of a specified number of units if they have achieved an acceptable standard* in Chinese language and English language and meet the special entrance requirements of the programme concerned as prescribed below.

A. Admission to the Part-time Degree Programme in Music with exemption of 63 units upon admission

Applicants shall

- 1. a. have obtained a diploma with a major in music at a recognized post-secondary institution; or
 - b. have obtained a diploma in music awarded by a recognized music institution; or
 - c. have obtained a degree at a recognized university; and
- 2. have had working experience in music; and
- 3. sit for an entrance test and obtain satisfactory results therein.

^{*} Applicants who have obtained grade E or above in Chinese Language & Literature and English Language in the Hong Kong Higher Level Examination or equivalent shall be regarded as fulfilling this language requirement. Those who have not shall be required to take a test in these subjects in the Entrance Test of the Part-time Degree Programmes,

- B. Admission to the Part-time Degree Programme in Physical Education and Sports Science
 - 1. With exemption of 43 units upon admission

Applicants shall

- have successfully completed a Part-time In-service Course of Training for Teachers (ICTT) at a recognized College of Education and have been granted the status of qualified teacher, and have had appropriate full-time teaching/ administrative experience thereafter; and
- b. sit and pass an entrance test.

2. With exemption of 63 units upon admission

Applicants shall

- a. have successfully completed teacher's training at a recognized College of Education and have been awarded a teacher's certificate, and have had appropriate full-time teaching/administrative experience thereafter; and
- b. sit and pass an entrance test.
- C. Admission to the Part-time Degree Programme in Primary Education
 - 1. With exemption of 43 units upon admission

Applicants shall

- have successfully completed a Part-time In-service Course of Training for Teachers (ICTT) at a recognized College of Education and have been granted the status of qualified teacher, and have had appropriate full-time teaching/ administrative experience thereafter;
- b. be working in the field of primary education; and
- c. sit and pass an entrance test.

2. With exemption of 63 units upon admission

Applicants shall

- a. have successfully completed teacher's training at a recognized College of Education and have been awarded a teacher's certificate, and have had appropriate full-time teaching/administrative experience thereafter;
- b. be working in the field of primary education; and
- c. sit and pass an entrance test.

IV. Admission to the Part-time Degree Programme in Nursing

Applicants shall

- A. be registered as a nurse with the Nursing Board of Hong Kong or has recognized equivalent qualifications, and
- B. have completed a minimum of two years' experience as a registered nurse.



(For programmes jointly offered by different departments, the term 'department' in the regulations refers to the committee concerned.)

1.0 Rules and Regulations

1.1 Students shall observe all rules and regulations prescribed by the University authorities.

2.0 Admission

- An applicant seeking admission to an approved full-time course of study leading to a bachelor's degree shall have fulfilled the entrance requirements of the University as prescribed in the Regulations Governing Admission to Full-time Undergraduate Studies.
- 2.2 A successful applicant shall be admitted to a major programme.

3.0 Fees

- 3.1 The fees payable by students shall be prescribed by the University Council and may be varied from time to time at the University Council's absolute discretion.
- 3.2 All fees shall be payable on date/s specified by the University unless prior permission for deferment is obtained.
- A student who has not paid his fees by the specified date/s shall pay a fine until the fees are paid. He shall be considered to have withdrawn from studies at the University if he fails to pay fees after a lapse of two weeks.
- 3.4 Caution money shall be payable on first registration as a deposit to make good any outstanding debts to the University incurred in, for example, damages to University and/or college property. This sum less any deductions made for outstanding debts shall be refunded on discontinuation of studies at the University. For graduating students, subject to no claim being outstanding, caution money shall be converted into graduation fee.
- 3.5 Apart from caution money, fees once paid shall not be refunded.

4.0 Registration

- An applicant who has been offered admission to an approved course of study shall pay the fees and register in person with the Registry on the respective specified date/s and shall be considered to have enrolled in the approved course of study from the date of his first registration.
- 4.2 A student shall register for courses on the specified date/s in each academic year. Anyone who fails to register for courses after a lapse of two weeks from the specified date/s shall be considered to have withdrawn from studies at the University.
- 4.3 A student who is unable to register for courses on the specified date/s must apply for deferment in writing to the Registrar beforehand.
- 4.4 A student shall not be registered simultaneously in another course of study or research leading to the award of a degree, diploma or certificate at this university or any other tertiary institution except by prior permission of the board of the faculty to which he belongs. A student in breach of this regulation shall be required to discontinue his studies at the University.
- 4.5 A student registered for a full-time course of study shall not take up any full-time employment, paid or unpaid, during term time.
- 4.6 A student shall register in the name which appears on his Hong Kong Identity Card or passport.
- 4.7 A student shall inform the Registrar immediately of any change of name, address or other particulars entered in the student's registration record.
- 4.8 No application for changing a student's registered particulars shall be accepted after graduation or withdrawal from the University.

5.0 Period of Study

- 5.1 Except for students in courses of study which prescribe otherwise, a Secondary 6 and a Secondary 7 entrant* shall be expected to graduate after 4 and 3 years of attendance respectively save as provided for in Regulation 5.2.
- 5.2 A student may apply on a prescribed form to the Registrar for an alteration of his period of study. No such application, however, shall be accepted after selection of courses for his expected year of graduation.
- 5.3 Notwithstanding Regulation 5.2, no student shall graduate without having completed at least three years of attendance.
- 5.4 Notwithstanding Regulation 5.3, a transfer student or any other student who has been granted course and unit exemptions on the basis of postsecondary qualifications may graduate in less than three years, provided that:
 - (a) he shall have attended this university for at least two years; and
 - (b) his total period of attendance at this university and another university

A Secondary 6 (or 7) entrant means a student who has been admitted to the University after completion of Secondary 6 (or 7) in a school or on equivalent qualifications.

or institution of higher learning recognized by the Senate shall have been not less than three years.

- A student shall take courses at this university in his final term.
- A Secondary 6 and a Secondary 7 entrant shall complete all requirements for graduation within six and five years respectively from his first registration including any periods of leave of absence and suspension of studies.

6.0 Course Requirements and Exemptions

- A Secondary 6 and a Secondary 7 entrant shall complete at least 123 6.1 and 99 units of courses respectively before graduation.
- 6.2 A student shall be required to complete before graduation up to 72 units of courses in his major programme, and meet the minimum grade required for specific courses (if any), as prescribed in the study scheme concerned. However, a student pursuing a major programme which leads to professional qualifications may be required to complete more than 72 units.
- A student may register for one or two minor programmes as approved 6.3 by the department concerned. A minor programme shall require 18** to 30 units of courses.
- A student shall also complete before graduation the following 6.4 requirements:
 - (a) six units of General Chinese and six units of General English, to be taken in his first year of attendance#;
 - (b) two units of Physical Education courses, to be taken in his first year of attendance; and
 - (c) 14 to 15 units of General Education courses## as prescribed by the University and the college to which he is assigned. However, the requirement may be reduced by three units for students in certain major programmes as approved by the Senate.
- A student who has failed in any required course shall retake that course 6.5 or take a substitute course prescribed by the department concerned.
- A student with recognized qualifications may be exempted from some 6.6 courses and/or units required for graduation according to the procedure prescribed. Subject to the requirements given in Regulations 5.4 and 5.5, no student with such exemptions shall be allowed to graduate unless he shall have:
 - (a) completed at least 60 units of courses at this university;
 - (b) completed at least two-thirds of his major requirements at this university; and

^{**} Effective from the 1994-95 intake, a minor programme shall require 15 to 30 units of courses.

[#] Students admitted in 1994-95 and thereafter are not required to complete General Chinese and General English.

^{##} Students admitted in 1998-99 and thereafter should complete 15 units of General Education courses.

(c) completed at least two-thirds of his minor requirements at this university, if he wishes to graduate with a minor.

7.0 Course Load

- 7.1 A student shall take no less than 12 units of courses in any term.
- 7.2 A student shall take no more than 18 units of courses in a term except with prior permission of his major department. However, no student shall be allowed to take more than 21 units in any term.

8.0 Selection of Courses

- 8.1 A student shall, after consulting the teacher/s designated by the department concerned and making sure that there is no timetable clash among the courses he wishes to select, complete the prescribed procedure for course registration.
- A student shall select his courses according to the study scheme/s of 8.2 his major and/or minor programme/s. He shall be responsible for ensuring the timely completion of all requirements for graduation.
- 8.3 A student shall not repeat any course which he has taken and passed or from which he has been exempted except as required by regulations which prescribe otherwise.

9.0 Course Withdrawals and Additions

- 9.1 A student who wishes to apply for withdrawal or addition of course/s shall complete the prescribed procedure within two weeks after the beginning of the teaching term.
- Only under very special circumstances may a student apply for 9.2 permission to withdraw from a course or enrol in a new course after the second week of the teaching term. Such applications shall be made on a prescribed form and submitted to the Registrar for consideration by the department concerned.
- A student who withdraws from a course without going through the 9.3 prescribed procedure shall be given a grade of 'F' for the course.

10.0 Change of Major and Minor Programmes

10.1 A student who wishes to transfer from one major or minor programme to another shall apply on a prescribed form to the department concerned before a specified date.

11.0 Class Attendance and Leave of Absence

- 11.1 A student shall attend classes, tests and examinations as required by the teachers of the courses in which he has enrolled.
- 11.2 A student who has been absent for any period shall be responsible for applying to the teacher/s concerned for permission to make up for any required work missed.
- 11.3 In case of illness necessitating absence exceeding one week, a student shall obtain permission from the Registrar through written application. Such applications shall be accompanied by a certificate signed or

- countersigned by the Director of the University Health Service and shall require the endorsement of his major department.
- 11.4 A student who wishes to obtain a leave of absence exceeding one week for non-medical reasons shall obtain prior permission from the Registrar through written application. Such applications shall state the reasons for which leave of absence is sought and shall require the endorsement of his major department.
- 11.5 Under no circumstance shall a student be granted leave of absence for more than one year in the first instance. In case he is still unable to attend classes after one year's leave, he may apply for extension for another year, beyond which no further extension shall be granted.
- 11.6 A student who, without permission to take leave, has been absent for a continuous period exceeding one month shall be considered to have withdrawn from studies at the University.
- 11.7 A student shall be required to take leave of absence if the condition of his health is considered by the Director of the University Health Service as constituting a definite hazard to the University community. At the end of the prescribed period of absence, the student shall obtain a certificate of good health signed by the Director of the University Health Service before he can apply to resume studies.

12.0 Reduced Course Load for Certain Students Union Officers

- 12.1 A student after election to the presidency of the students union of the University or a college or the vice-presidency of the University Students Union may, if he feels that his academic work will suffer through the pressure of his union duties, apply in writing to the Registrar for permission to take a reduced course load for not more than two terms. The board of the faculty to which he belongs may after considering his application make a recommendation to the Senate thereon. No student shall be granted this privilege more than once, and such an application shall be made within two weeks after the election results are announced.
- 12.2 Such permission for reduced course load shall not prejudice the student's eligibility for any academic awards or financial assistance in his academic career.
- 12.3 Such a student shall take a minimum of six units of courses in each teaching term during his term of office as University or college students union president or University Students Union vice-president and shall be required to pay all prescribed fees.

13.0 Course Assessment and Grades

13.1 A student shall be assessed for every course which he has registered for on the basis of his performance in the course. Criteria for assessment may include any one or any combination of the following: attendance, class work, written work, laboratory work, field work, research papers, tests, examinations, and any other criteria.

13.2 Course grades, their standards and converted points used in reporting shall be as follows:

The grade point average of a student's course work shall be computed by dividing the total weighted converted points for courses taken by the total number of units attempted inclusive of courses failed, where the weighted converted points are converted points multiplied by the number of units of the course concerned.

13.3 A student who has gained a grade of 'D' or above in a course shall earn the unit/s of that course. However, the unit/s of a course which a student has passed but is required to repeat shall count only once towards the fulfilment of course units for graduation.

14.0 Examinations

- 14.1 A student shall take course examinations, if prescribed by the teacher/s concerned, in the form of written, practical or oral assessment, or any combination thereof.
- 14.2 If a comprehensive examination is prescribed by his major programme, a student shall sit for the examination if he is certified by his major department as having met the entry requirements, if any. Instead of a comprehensive examination, a graduation thesis or graduation project may be prescribed by his major programme, to which regulations governing comprehensive examination shall also apply, where applicable. The grades, standards and converted points used in reporting results of comprehensive examination or graduation thesis/project shall be the same as those prescribed in Regulation 13.2.
- 14.3 Absence from examinations
 - (a) A student who for medical or other compelling reasons is unable to sit for any course examination or the comprehensive examination, shall apply in writing with documentary evidence at the earliest possible moment but not later than 10 days after the examination

concerned to the Registrar for permission for absence. In the case of illness/injury, the application shall be accompanied by a certificate signed or countersigned by the Director of the University Health Service.

- (b) If his application for absence is successful, a student:
 - (i) in the case of absence from an examination of any course, may be otherwise assessed at the discretion of the department concerned: and
 - (ii) in the case of absence from a comprehensive examination:
 - (1) shall be permitted to sit for the next examination without taking any course in the following term or year provided that he can meet the entry requirements, if any, and in such case he shall be considered for a degree with classification;
 - (2) may request consideration for the award of an aegrotat degree under Regulation 16.3. If it is decided not to award him an aegrotat degree, he will retain the right to sit for the comprehensive examination as provided for in Regulation 14.3(b)(ii)(1).
- (c) A student who is absent from any examination without permission shall be given a grade of 'F' in that examination.
- 14.4 A student who fails in the comprehensive examination shall register for courses, if any, as directed by the department concerned in the following term or year, which may require him to retake some courses he has already passed. He shall sit for the comprehensive examination for the second time. A student who fails twice in the examination shall be required to discontinue his studies at the University.

15.0 Academic Probation and Discontinuation of Studies

- 15.1 Academic probation
 - (a) A student shall be put on academic probation if he has obtained a grade point average of below 1.5 in the preceding term unless Regulation 15.2 applies.
 - (b) A student on academic probation may be required to take a reduced load and his performance shall be reviewed at the end of the term in which he is put on probation, at which time if he has obtained a grade point average of 1.5 or above, probation shall be lifted, otherwise probation shall continue to apply in his next term of attendance unless he is required to discontinue his studies as prescribed by Regulation 15.2 or he has completed all graduation requirements as set out in Regulation 16.1.

15.2 Discontinuation of studies

A student shall be required to discontinue his studies at the University:

- (a) if his grade point average in a term is below 1.0 for two consecutive terms of attendance; or
- (b) if he fails in more than half of the units of courses taken in a term for two consecutive terms of attendance; or

- (c) if he still fails to have his probation lifted after he has been put on academic probation for two consecutive terms of attendance; or
- (d) if, after two attempts, he still fails to meet the minimum grade required for specified courses (if any) as prescribed by his major programme, unless otherwise decided by the board of the faculty to which he belongs or he is successful in obtaining transfer to another major programme in the next term; or
- (e) if he fails twice in the comprehensive examination/graduation thesis/ graduation project; or
- (f) if he fails to complete all requirements for graduation after five or six years as prescribed in Regulation 5.6.

16.0 Graduation

- 16.1 To be considered for the award of a bachelor's degree, a student shall:
 - (a) have satisfied all requirements prescribed in Sections 5.0 and 6.0;
 - (b) have obtained a grade point average of not lower than 1.5 in all major courses taken which are coded 2000 and above (for STOT courses, coded 0200 and above):
 - (c) have passed the comprehensive examination or graduation thesis/ project, if any, as prescribed by the major programme; and
 - (d) have obtained a grade point average of not less than 1.0 in his final term.
 - A student who has satisfied the above requirements shall graduate, unless, in accordance with Regulation 19.0, he is required to terminate his studies at the University or be suspended from the University.
- 16.2 Notwithstanding Regulation 16.1(b), a student who has obtained a grade point average of below 1.5 but not less than 1.3 in all major courses taken which are coded 2000 and above (for STOT courses, coded 0200 and above) may be recommended by the Undergraduate Examinations Board for the award of a pass degree, subject to his satisfying all other requirements for graduation.
- 16.3 A student who is granted permission for absence from the comprehensive examination may be recommended by the Undergraduate Examinations Board for the award of an aegrotat degree, provided that he has met all other requirements for graduation. If an aegrotat degree is awarded, its acceptance by a student shall render him ineligible to present himself for any subsequent examination/s for the same bachelor's degree.
- 16.4 Provided that he is not required to discontinue his studies, a student shall register for a further term or year or specific course/s as the case may be, if he fails to meet any of the requirements prescribed in Regulation 16.1.
- 16.5 A student who has fulfilled the requirements of a minor programme for which he has registered in addition to satisfying all other conditions for graduation shall graduate with a minor. If he fails to fulfil any minor requirement, he shall graduate without a minor.
- 16.6 A student who has fulfilled the requirements of two minor programmes

for which he has registered in addition to satisfying all other conditions for graduation shall graduate with double minors. If he fails to fulfil the requirements of one or both of his two minor programmes, he shall either graduate without a minor provided that he has not taken a reduced major programme or graduate with a single minor provided that he has fulfilled all requirements prescribed therefor and has not taken a reduced major programme; otherwise he shall be required to register for a further term or year or specific course/s to make up the major and/or minor requirements.

17.0 Degree Classification

- 17.1 A student who satisfies the conditions for graduation shall be awarded a bachelor's degree with one of the following classifications:
 - (a) First Class Honours
 - (b) Second Class Honours Upper Division
 - (c) Second Class Honours Lower Division
 - (d) Third Class Honours
 - (e) Pass
- 17.2 The classification of a student's degree shall be based on the grade point average of major courses coded 2000 and above or 3000 and above (for STOT courses, coded 0200 and above or 0300 and above respectively) as decided by the board of the faculty to which he belongs, grade point average of other courses and result of the comprehensive examination or graduation thesis/project, if any, in accordance with the standards specified by the Senate.
- 17.3 A bachelor's degree (aegrotat) shall not be classified.

18.0 Transcripts

- 18.1 A student who wishes to apply for transfer or admission to another educational institution or for employment may apply for an official transcript giving details of all courses taken and grades obtained.
- 18.2 The official transcript shall not be issued to a student or any private individual. It shall be sent direct to the institution or prospective employer upon payment of the prescribed fees and postage.

19.0 Disciplinary Action

- 19.1 A student who violates any rule or regulation and/or commits any misconduct such as:
 - (a) defamation of or assault on or battery against the person of any member of the University;
 - (b) wilful damage to or defacement of any property of the University;
 - (c) theft, fraud, misapplication of University funds or property of any
 - (d) plagiarism in written assignments or cheating in tests or examinations:
 - (e) an offence in connection with examinations or violation of any of the regulations of the Senate governing conduct at examinations;

- (f) falsification or serious misuse of University documents or records;
- (g) refusal to comply with any regulations or orders by authorized persons and bodies prohibiting any conduct which disrupts teaching, study, research or administration of the University;
- (h) any conduct which is detrimental to the reputation and well-being of the University;
- (i) an offence of an immoral, scandalous or disgraceful nature of which the student has been convicted in any court of law; or
- (j) misrepresentations or false statements made in any application or document submitted to the University;
- shall be disciplined by the Senate, boards of faculties and/or college assemblies of fellows in accordance with the nature and gravity of the
- 19.2 Disciplinary action may take the form of any of the following penalties which may be entered into the transcript of the student's academic record:
 - (a) reprimand;
 - (b) suspension from part or all of the rights, privileges and/or the use of part or all of the facilities of the University for a specified period of time:
 - (c) demerit (a total of three demerits may result in termination of studies at the University);
 - (d) suspension from the University for a specified period of time; or
 - (e) termination of studies at the University.
 - Penalty (d) or (e) may be imposed only with the approval of the Senate.
- 19.3 A student, on being informed of a decision to take disciplinary action against him, may within seven days write to request the Senate to review the decision.



1.0 Rules and Regulations

- Students pursuing undergraduate medical studies shall observe rules and regulations stipulated by the University and college authorities which are applicable and the Regulations Governing Undergraduate Medical Studies stipulated by the Faculty of Medicine.
- The General Regulations Governing Full-time Undergraduate Studies (hereinafter referred to as Undergraduate Regulations) shall be applicable to medical students with the exception of the following regulations:
 - 5.1 5.6 concerning Period of Study;
 - 6.1 6.3, 6.6 concerning Course Requirements and Exemptions;
 - 7.1 7.2 concerning Course Load;
 - 13.1 13.3 concerning Course Assessments and Grades;
 - 14.1 14.4 concerning Examinations;
 - 15.1 15.2 concerning Academic Probation and Discontinuation of Studies:
 - 16.1 16.6 concerning Graduation;
 - 17.1 17.3 concerning Degree Classification.

2.0 Admission

- Application for admission to the University as medical students shall comply with the Regulations Governing Admission to Full-time Undergraduate Studies (hereinafter referred to as Admission Regulations).
- 2.2 Direct Admission into Medical Year 1 Applicants may apply for direct admission into Medical Year 1 if they can meet the entrance requirements for medical studies spelt out in the Admission Regulations.
- Transfer Admission to Medical Year 3 Applicants may apply for admission to Medical Year 3 as transfer students in accordance with Section IIIA(7) of the Admission Regulations.

3.0 University Requirements

Besides the medical programme, medical students shall complete the following before graduation, unless exempted therefrom:

- (a) 11 to 12 units of General Education courses* as prescribed by the University and the college to which he is assigned; and
- (b) two units of Physical Education.

Physical Education courses shall normally be completed in Medical Year 1 (except for the transfer students admitted according to Reg. 2.3).

4.0 Length of Study

- 4.1 A student shall complete the Pre-clinical Programme (Medical Years 1 and 2) within a period not exceeding three academic years unless determined otherwise by the Faculty Board of Medicine.
- 4.2 A student shall complete the Clinical Programme (Medical Years 3 to 5) within a period not exceeding four academic years. Under exceptional circumstances, a student may be granted an additional year at the end of the programme by the faculty board.
- 4.3 A student who fails to complete the programmes and pass the relevant examinations within the prescribed periods as stipulated above shall be required to discontinue his studies at the University.
- 4.4 An Intercalated student shall complete the Intercalated Degree Programme in Medical Sciences within a period of one academic year taken outside the above-mentioned prescribed periods of studies.

5.0 Assessment and Examination

Medical Year 1

- 5.1 Medical Year 1 students shall be assessed by the following:
 - (a) departmental assessment;
 - (b) Faculty Examination in the subjects of Anatomy, Physiology, Biochemistry and the Behavioural and Social Sciences at the end of the year; and
 - (c) continuous assessment in any format throughout the Pre-clinical Programme as and if considered appropriate by the departments involved in pre-clinical teaching.
- 5.2 Students are required to pass each individual subject in the Faculty Examination. The pass mark is 50%. Students who fail in one subject with a mark of 40% or above and pass the remainder of the subjects shall be allowed a supplementary examination in the failed subject to be held in August of the same year. Students who fail in one subject with a mark of below 40% will be required to resit the Faculty Examination to be held in August of the same year. Students who fail in more than one subject will be required to resit the Faculty Examination

^{*} Students admitted in 1998–99 and thereafter shall complete 12 units of General Education courses.

- to be held in August of the same year. Faculty Examination results may also count towards the First Professional Examination to be held in Medical Year 2 at the discretion of the departments concerned.
- 5.3 Students who fail the examination in one or more subjects after two attempts will be required to discontinue his studies at the University unless decided otherwise by the panel of examiners.

Medical Year 2

- Medical Year 2 students shall be assessed by the following:
 - (a) the First Professional Examination in the subjects of Anatomy, Physiology, Pharmacology and Biochemistry; and
 - (b) continuous assessment in any format throughout the Pre-clinical Programme as and if considered appropriate by the pre-clinical departments.
- 5.5 Students are required to pass each individual subject in the First Professional Examination. The pass mark is 50%. Students who fail in one subject with a mark of 40% or above shall be allowed a supplementary examination. Students who fail in one subject with a mark of below 40% will be required to repeat Medical Year 2, unless allowed a supplementary examination at the discretion of the panel of examiners. Students who fail in more than one subject or who are not allowed a supplementary examination will be required to repeat Medical Year 2.
- 5.6 The supplementary examination will be held in June of the same year. Students who fail the supplementary examination will be required to repeat Medical Year 2.

Medical Year 3

- 5.7 Medical Year 3 students shall be assessed by the following:
 - (a) departmental assessment in the subjects of General Pathology, Junior Medical Clerkship and Junior Surgical Dressership; and
 - (b) the Second Professional Examination in the subjects of Anatomical and Cellular Pathology, Microbiology and Chemical Pathology held at the end of Medical Year 3.
- 5.8 The pass mark for the above assessments is 50%. Students who fail either in Junior Medical Clerkship or Junior Surgical Dressership, or in the Second Professional Examination will be required to repeat Medical Year 3. Students who fail in the Second Professional Examination marginally shall be given an opportunity for re-assessment and those who fail in the re-assessment will be required to repeat Medical Year 3.

Medical Year 4

- Medical Year 4 students shall be assessed by the following:
 - (a) departmental assessment in the subjects of Community and Family Medicine, Obstetrics and Gynaecology, Paediatrics, and Psychiatry;
 - (b) Part I of the Third Professional Examination encompassing the contents of the four departmental courses in Community and Family

Medicine, Obstetrics and Gynaecology, Paediatrics, and Psychiatry held at the end of Medical Year 4.

5.10 The pass mark for the above assessments is 50%. Students who fail either in any of the departmental assessments or in Part I of the Third Professional Examination will be required to repeat Medical Year 4. Students who fail in Part I of the Third Professional Examination marginally shall be given an opportunity for re-assessment and those who fail in the re-assessment will be required to repeat Medical Year 4.

Medical Year 5

- 5.11 Medical Year 5 students shall be assessed by Part II of the Third Professional Examination in the subjects of Medicine and Surgery and their associated specialities held at the end of Medical Year 5.
- 5.12 The pass mark for the above examination is 50%. Internal departmental assessments from the senior clerkships and dresserships will be taken into account. Students who fail in both Medicine and Surgery will be required to repeat the whole year. Students who fail in one subject only shall be allowed a supplementary examination in that subject to be held within six months from the date of the main examination.
- 5.13 Students who fail in the supplementary examination shall be required to resit Part II of the Third Professional Examination. They shall be ineligible to take any further examination should they fail again in either or both subjects of Medicine and Surgery, and shall be required to discontinue studies at the University.

6.0 Intercalated Degree Programme in Medical Sciences

- Students may, after completion of the Pre-clinical Programme, apply 6.1 for admission to the one-year Intercalated Degree Programme in Medical Sciences.
- 6.2 The Programme shall be taken only once. Any student failing the overall assessment or any of the component courses shall continue his studies in the Clinical Programme.

7.0 Graduation

- 7.1 A student shall be eligible for the award of the degrees of MB ChB if,
 - (a) he has passed all professional examinations as stipulated in the foregoing regulations within the prescribed period of study; and
 - (b) he has fulfilled other University requirements on General Education and Physical Education.
- 7.2 A student may be considered for the award of the degrees of MB ChB with honours if.
 - (a) he has obtained a minimum of three subject distinctions in the professional examinations, at least one of which is in Part II of the Third Professional Examination: and
 - (b) he has passed each and every professional examination at the first attempt.

- 7.3 A student who has successfully completed the course requirements of the Intercalated Programme in Medical Sciences shall be awarded the BMedSc degree with one of the following classifications:
 - (a) First Class Honours
 - (b) Second Class Honours Upper Division
 - (c) Second Class Honours Lower Division
 - (d) Third Class Honours
 - (e) Pass

The classification of the BMedSc degree shall be based on the grade point average of the relevant major courses as decided by the faculty board in accordance with the standards specified by the Senate.



1.0 Rules and Regulations

- 1.1 Full-time and part-time students pursuing undergraduate postregistration nursing studies shall observe rules and regulations stipulated by the University authorities which are applicable and the Regulations Governing Undergraduate Post-registration Nursing Studies.
- 1.2 The General Regulations Governing Full-time Undergraduate Studies shall be applicable to full-time post-registration nursing students with the exception of the following regulations:
 - 5.1 5.6 concerning Period of Study;
 - 6.1 6.4, 6.6 concerning Course Requirements and Exemptions;
 - 7.1 7.2 concerning Course Load;
 - 10.1 concerning Change of Major and Minor Programmes;
 - 13.2 13.3 concerning Course Assessment and Grades;
 - 14.2, 14.3(b), 14.4 concerning Examinations;
 - 15.1 15.2 concerning Academic Probation and Discontinuation of Studies:
 - 16.1 16.6 concerning Graduation;
 - 17.1 17.3 concerning Degree Classification.
- The General Regulations Governing Part-time Undergraduate Studies shall be applicable to part-time post-registration nursing students with the exception of:
 - 5.1 5.7 concerning Period of Study;
 - 6.1 6.2, 6.7 concerning Course Requirements and Exemptions;
 - 7.1 7.2 concerning Course Load;
 - 11.2 11.3 concerning Course Assessment and Grades;
 - 12.2, 12.3(b), 12.4 concerning Examinations;
 - 13.1 13.2 concerning Academic Probation and Discontinuation of Studies:
 - 14.1 14.4 concerning Graduation;
 - 15.1 15.3 concerning Degree Classification.

2.0 Admission

Application requirements for admission to the Post-registration Bachelor

- of Nursing Programme are the same for part-time and full-time modes of study.
- 2.2 Applicants for admission to the Post-registration Bachelor of Nursing Programme shall:
 - (a) have been registered as a nurse with the Nursing Board of Hong Kong or have recognized equivalent qualifications, and
 - (b) have completed a minimum of two year's experience as a registered nurse.
- 2.3 Applicants may be required to take and obtain satisfactory results from a screening test for language ability and nursing knowledge.

3.0 Course Requirements and Exemptions

- 3.1 A student shall complete before graduation the required Nursing courses (or alternative courses for those with exemptions) and at least one elective Nursing course.
- 3.2 General education
 - A student shall also complete before graduation six units of General Education courses as prescribed by the University and, where applicable, the college to which he is assigned.
- 3.3 Exemptions for those holding a Diploma in Nursing
 Students who have completed requirements for a post-registration
 Diploma in Nursing or equivalent qualification at a recognized tertiary
 institution may be exempted from some of the courses required.
 However, alternative courses may be required following examination
 of the content of the completed diploma programme or equivalent
 qualification.

4.0 Course Load

- 4.1 A full-time student shall take no less than three courses in any teaching term. He shall take no more than five courses in any teaching term except with prior permission of the chairman of the Department of Nursing.
- 4.2 A part-time student shall take no less than three courses in any academic year. He shall take no more than seven courses in any academic year except with prior permission of the chairman of the Department of Nursing.
- 4.3 In special circumstances a student who has completed one year of study may be allowed to change his mode of study. Students wishing to change their mode of study shall be required to obtain permission from the Faculty Board of Medicine on recommendation of the Department of Nursing.

5.0 Period of Study

5.1 A student's period of training recognized for registration purposes by the Nursing Board of Hong Kong shall be considered as equivalent to one year of attendance as a matriculated student at an institution of higher education. 5.2 With due regard to Regulation 5.1, a full-time student shall register for and attend classes for at least two years before graduation. He shall complete all requirements for graduation within three years from his first registration including any periods of leave of absence, suspension of studies and extension of studies.

A full-time student who for non-academic reasons has to extend his period of study beyond the prescribed two years, shall be required to obtain prior permission from the Faculty Board of Medicine on recommendation of the Department of Nursing.

5.3 With due regard to Regulation 5.1, a part-time student shall register for and attend classes for at least four years before graduation unless he has gained exemptions as stipulated in Regulation 3.3. In no case should a student attend courses for less than three years before graduation. He shall complete all requirements for graduation within six years from his first registration including any periods of leave of absence, suspension of studies and extension of studies.

A part-time student who for non-academic reasons has to extend his period of study beyond the prescribed four years, shall be required to obtain prior permission from the Faculty Board of Medicine on recommendation of the Department of Nursing.

A student who fails to complete the programme and pass the relevant examinations within the relevant prescribed period as stipulated above shall be required to discontinue his studies at the University.

6.0 Course Assessment and Grades

6.1 Course grades and their standards used in reporting shall be as follows:

6.2 The pass mark is 50%. A student who has gained grade 'D' or above in a course shall have successfully completed the requirements for that course.

7.0 Academic Probation and Discontinuation of Studies

- 7.1 Students who fail in a course with a mark of 40% or above shall be allowed a supplementary examination.
- 7.2 The supplementary examination will be held within five to six weeks after the departmental examination.
- 7.3 (a) Students who fail a required Nursing course with a mark below 40% will be required to repeat the course, unless allowed a supplementary examination at the discretion of the panel of examiners.
 - (b) Students who fail an elective Nursing course with a mark below 40% will be required to repeat or undertake another nursing elective course, unless allowed a supplementary examination at the discretion of the panel of examiners.
- 7.4 (a) Students who fail the supplementary examination of a required Nursing course will be required to repeat the course.
 - (b) Students who fail the supplementary examination of an elective Nursing course will be required to repeat the course or undertake another elective Nursing course.

7.5 Academic probation

- (a) Students who fail in two or more courses in a year and who are not allowed supplementary examinations shall be put on academic probation in the following term.
- (b) A student on academic probation may be required to take a reduced study load and his performance shall be reviewed at the end of the term in which he is put on probation. At this time if he has failed in no more than one course probation shall be lifted otherwise probation shall continue to apply for a further term.

7.6 Discontinuation of studies

A student shall be required to discontinue his studies at the University if:

- (a) he fails to complete all requirements for graduation after three years (full-time students) or six years (part-time students); or
- (b) he fails more than half of the courses he has taken in an academic year (full-time students) or two academic years (part-time students);
- (c) he fails to have his probation lifted after he has been put on academic probation for two successive terms of attendance.

8.0 Graduation

- 8.1 A student shall be eligible for the award of the degree of Bachelor of Nursing if he has:
 - (a) completed all the course requirements as stipulated in the regulations; and
 - (b) fulfilled all other University requirements.

- 8.2 A student who has successfully completed the course requirements of the Post-registration Bachelor of Nursing Programme and has satisfied other University requirements shall be awarded the Bachelor of Nursing degree with one of the following classifications:
 - (a) First Class Honours
 - (b) Second Class Honours Upper Division
 - (c) Second Class Honours Lower Division
 - (d) Third Class Honours
 - (e) Pass

The classification of the Bachelor of Nursing degree shall be based on the grade point average of relevant major courses coded 4000 and above as determined by the faculty board in accordance with the standards specified by the Senate.

1.0 Rules and Regulations

- Students pursuing undergraduate pre-registration Nursing studies shall observe rules and regulations stipulated by the University authorities which are applicable and the Regulations Governing Undergraduate Pre-registration Nursing Studies.
- The General Regulations Governing Full-time Undergraduate Studies shall be applicable to full-time pre-registration nursing students with the exception of the following regulations:

 - 7.1 7.2 concerning Course Load;

 - 16.1 16.4 concerning Graduation:

2.0 Admission

Application for admission to the University as pre-registration nursing students shall comply with the Regulations Governing Admission to Full-time Undergraduate Studies (hereinafter referred to as Admission Regulations).

3.0 Course Requirements

- 3.1 A student shall complete the prescribed Nursing courses unless exempted therefrom.
- 3.2 General Education and Physical Education
 - (a) A student shall also complete before graduation 11-12 units of General Education courses* as prescribed by the University and

^{*} Students admitted in 1998–99 and thereafter shall complete 12 units of General Education courses.

- the college to which he is assigned and two units of Physical Education courses.
- (b) Physical Education courses shall normally be completed in Nursing Year 1.

4.0 Course Load

A student shall take no less than three Nursing courses in any teaching term. He shall take no more than seven Nursing courses in any teaching term except with prior permission of the chairman of the department.

5.0 Period of Study

- A student shall register for and attend classes for at least four years before graduation.
- A student shall complete all requirements for graduation within six 5.2 years from his first registration including any periods of leave of absence, suspension of studies and extension of studies.
- A student shall take courses at this university in his final term. 5.3
- A student who fails to complete the programme and pass the relevant 5.4 examinations within the prescribed period as stipulated above shall be required to discontinue studies at the University.

6.2 The pass mark is 50%. A student who has gained grade 'D' or above in a course shall have successfully completed the requirements for that course.

7.0 Academic Probation and Discontinuation of Studies

Students who fail in a Nursing course with a mark of 40% or above 7.1 shall be allowed a supplementary examination.

- 7.2 The supplementary examination will be held within five to six weeks after the departmental examination.
- 7.3 (a) Students who fail a required Nursing course with a mark below 40% will be required to repeat the course, unless allowed a supplementary examination at the discretion of the panel of examiners.
 - (b) Students in their 2nd, 3rd and/or 4th years of attendance who obtain an average of less than 'C-' for Clinical Practice courses will be required to repeat that year.
 - (c) Students who fail an elective Nursing course with a mark below 40% will be required to repeat or undertake another Nursing elective course, unless allowed a supplementary examination at the discretion of the panel of examiners.
- 7.4 (a) Students who fail the supplementary examination of a required Nursing course will be required to repeat the course.
 - (b) Students who fail the supplementary examination of an elective Nursing course will be required to repeat the course or undertake another elective Nursing course.

7.5 Academic probation

- (a) Students who fail in two or more Nursing courses in a year and who are not allowed supplementary examinations shall be put on academic probation in the following term.
- (b) A student on academic probation may be required to take a reduced study load and his performance shall be reviewed at the end of the term in which he is put on probation. At this time if he has failed in no more than one Nursing course probation shall be lifted; otherwise, probation shall continue to apply for a further term.

7.6 Discontinuation of studies

A student shall be required to discontinue his studies at the University if.

- (a) he fails to complete all requirements for graduation after six years;
- (b) he fails more than half of the Nursing courses he has taken in an academic year; or
- (c) he fails to have his probation lifted after he has been put on academic probation for two successive terms of attendance.

8.0 Graduation

- 8.1 A student shall be eligible for the award of the degree of Bachelor of Nursing if he has:
 - (a) completed all the course requirements as stipulated in the regulations; and
 - (b) fulfilled all other University requirements.
- 8.2 A student who has successfully completed the course requirements of the Pre-registration Bachelor of Nursing Programme and has satisfied all other University requirements shall be awarded the Bachelor of

Nursing degree with one of the following classifications:

- (c) Second Class Honours Lower Division
- (d) Third Class Honours
- (e) Pass

The classification of the Bachelor of Nursing degree for pre-registration Nursing students shall be based on the grade point average of relevant Nursing courses coded 3000 and above and the grade point average of other courses as determined by the faculty board in accordance with the standards specified by the Senate.



1.0 Rules and Regulations

- 1.1 Students pursuing full-time undergraduate studies in Language Education shall observe all rules and regulations prescribed by the University authorities which are applicable and the Regulations Governing Full-time Undergraduate Language Education Studies.
- 1.2 The General Regulations Governing Full-time Undergraduate Studies shall be applicable to full-time language education students with the exception of the following regulations:
 - 5.1 5.6 concerning Period of Study
 - 6.1 6.6 concerning Course Requirements and Exemptions
 - 15.1 15.2 concerning Academic Probation and Discontinuation of Studies
 - 16.1 16.6 concerning Graduation

2.0 Admission

An applicant seeking admission to the full-time Bachelor of Education Programme in Language Education, shall have fulfilled the entrance requirements of the University as prescribed in the Regulations Governing Admission to Full-time Undergraduate Studies.

3.0 Period of Study

- 3.1 A student shall be expected to graduate after four years of attendance save as provided for in Regulation 3.2.
- 3.2 A student may apply on a prescribed form to the Registrar for an extension of his period of study. No such application, however, shall be accepted after selection of courses for his expected year of graduation.
- 3.3 No student shall graduate without having completed at least four years of attendance.
- Notwithstanding Regulation 3.3, a transfer student or any other student who has been granted course and unit exemptions on the basis of postsecondary qualifications may graduate in less than four years, provided
 - (a) he shall have attended this university for at least three years; and

- (b) his total period of attendance at this university and another university or institution of higher learning recognized by the Senate shall have been not less than four years.
- 3.5 A student shall take courses at this university in his final term.
- 3.6 A student shall complete all requirements for graduation within six years from his first registration including any periods of leave of absence and suspension of studies.

4.0 Course Requirements and Exemptions

- A student shall complete at least 123 units of courses before graduation. 4.1
- A student shall be required to complete before graduation at least 98 4.2 units of courses in his major programme.
- A student may register for one minor programme as approved by the 4.3 departments concerned. A minor programme shall require 15 to 30 units of courses.
- A student shall also complete before graduation the following 4.4 requirements:
 - (a) two units of Physical Education courses, to be taken in his first year of attendance; and
 - (b) 15 units of General Education courses as prescribed by the University and the college to which he is assigned.
- A student who has failed in any required course shall retake that course 4.5 or take a substitute course prescribed by the board of the Faculty of Education.
- 4.6 A student with recognized qualifications may be exempted from some courses and/or units required for graduation according to the procedure prescribed. Subject to the requirements given in Regulations 3.4 and 3.5, no students with such exemptions shall be allowed to graduate unless he shall have:
 - (a) completed at least two-thirds of his major requirements at this university; and
 - (b) completed at least two-thirds of his minor requirements at this university, if he wishes to graduate with a minor.

5.0 Academic Probation and Discontinuation of Studies

- Academic probation
 - (a) A student shall be put on academic probation if he has obtained a grade point average of below 1.5 in the preceding term unless Regulation 5.2 applies.
 - (b) A student on academic probation may be required to take a reduced load and his performance shall be reviewed at the end of the term in which he is put on probation, at which time if he has obtained a grade point average of 1.5 or above, probation shall be lifted, otherwise probation shall continue to apply in his next term of attendance unless he is required to discontinue his studies as prescribed by Regulation 5.2 or he has completed all graduation requirements as set out in Regulation 6.1.

5.2 Discontinuation of studies

A student shall be required to discontinue his studies at the University:


- (a) if his grade point average in a term is below 1.0 for two consecutive terms of attendance; or
- (b) if he fails in more than half of the units of courses taken in a term for two consecutive terms of attendance; or
- (c) if he still fails to have his probation lifted after he has been put on academic probation for two consecutive terms of attendance; or
- (d) if he fails to complete all requirements for graduation after six years as prescribed in Regulation 3.6.

6.0 Graduation

- To be considered for the award of the degree of Bachelor of Education, 6.1
 - (a) have satisfied all requirements prescribed in Sections 3.0 and 4.0;
 - (b) have obtained a grade point average of not lower than 1.5 in all major courses taken which are coded 2000 and above:
 - (c) have obtained a grade point average of not less than 1.0 in his final term.

A student who has satisfied the above requirements shall graduate, unless, in accordance with Regulation 19.0 of the General Regulations Governing Full-time Undergraduate Studies, he is required to terminate his studies at the University or be suspended from the University.

- Notwithstanding Regulation 6.1(b), a student who has obtained a grade point average of below 1.5 but not less than 1.3 in all major courses taken which are coded 2000 and above may be recommended by the Undergraduate Examinations Board for the award of a pass degree, subject to his satisfying all other requirements for graduation.
- Provided that he is not required to discontinue his studies, a student shall register for a further term or year or specific course/s as the case may be, if he fails to meet any of the requirements prescribed in
- 6.4 A student who has fulfilled the requirements of a minor programme for which he has registered in addition to satisfying all other conditions for graduation shall graduate with a minor. If he fails to fulfil any minor requirement, he shall graduate without a minor.



1.0 Rules and Regulations

- Students pursuing full-time undergraduate studies in primary education shall observe all rules and regulations prescribed by the University authorities which are applicable and the Regulations Governing Fulltime Undergraduate Primary Education Studies.
- The General Regulations Governing Full-time Undergraduate Studies shall be applicable to full-time primary education students with the exception of the following Regulations:

 - 10.1 concerning Change of Major and Minor Programmes
 - 11.5 concerning Leave of Absence

2.0 Admission

For admission to the full-time Bachelor of Education Programme in 2.1 Primary Education, an applicant shall have obtained a Teacher Certificate from the Hong Kong Institute of Education.

3.0 Period of Study

- A student's period of attendance at the Hong Kong Institute of Education 3.1 shall be considered as equivalent to one year of attendance as a registered student at an institution of higher learning.
- 3.2 With due regard to Regulation 3.1, a student shall complete all requirements for graduation within two years from his first registration.
- Notwithstanding Regulation 3.2, a student may under exceptional 3.3 circumstances be granted by the Board of the Faculty of Education an additional term or year for completion of requirements for graduation.
- A student shall take courses at this university in his final term.

4.0 Course Requirements

- 4.1 A student shall be required to complete before graduation at least 60 units of courses.
- 4.2 A student shall be required to complete the required units of major courses as prescribed in the study scheme concerned.
- 4.3 A student shall also complete before graduation at least six units of General Education courses as prescribed by the University and the college to which he is assigned.
- Minor programmes are not offered to full-time primary education 4.4 students.

5.0 Academic Probation and Discontinuation of Studies

5.1 Academic probation

- (a) A student shall be put on academic probation if he has obtained a grade point average of below 1.5 in the preceding term unless Regulation 5.2 applies.
- (b) A student on academic probation may be required to take a reduced load and his performance shall be reviewed at the end of the term in which he is put on probation, at which time if he has obtained a grade point average of 1.5 or above, probation shall be lifted, otherwise probation shall continue to apply in his next term of attendance unless he is required to discontinue his studies as prescribed by Regulation 5.2 or he has completed all graduation requirements as set out in Regulation 6.1.

5.2 Discontinuation of studies

A student shall be required to discontinue his studies at the University:

- (a) if his grade point average in a term is below 1.0 for two consecutive terms of attendance: or
- (b) if he fails in more than half of the units of courses taken in a term for two consecutive terms of attendance; or
- (c) if he still fails to have his probation lifted after he has been put on academic probation for two consecutive terms of attendance; or
- (d) if he fails to complete all requirements for graduation after two years from his first registration, unless permission for extension of studies is obtained from the Board of the Faculty of Education; or
- (e) if he still fails to complete all requirements for graduation at the end of the extended period of study granted by the Board of the Faculty of Education.

6.0 Graduation

- 6.1 To be considered for the award of the degree of Bachelor of Education, a student shall:
 - (a) have satisfied all requirements prescribed in Sections 3.0 and 4.0;
 - (b) have obtained a grade point average of not lower than 1.5 in all major courses taken which are coded 3000 and above; and
 - (c) have obtained a grade point average of not less than 1.0 in his final term.

- A student who has satisfied the above requirements shall graduate, unless, in accordance with Regulation 19.0 of the General Regulations Governing Full-time Undergraduate Studies, he is required to terminate his studies at the University or be suspended from the University.
- Notwithstanding Regulation 6.1(b), a student who has obtained a grade 6.2 point average of below 1.5 but not less than 1.3 in all major courses taken which are coded 3000 and above may be recommended by the Undergraduate Examinations Board for the award of a pass degree, subject to his satisfying all other requirements for graduation.
- Provided that he is not required to discontinue his studies, a student 6.3 shall register for a further term or year or specific course/s as the case may be, if he fails to meet any of the requirements prescribed in Regulation 6.1.



1.0 **Rules and Regulations**

Students shall observe all rules and regulations prescribed by the 1.1 University authorities.

2.0 Admission

- 2.1 An applicant seeking admission to an approved part-time course of study leading to a bachelor's degree shall have fulfilled the entrance requirements of the University as prescribed in the Regulations Governing Admission to Part-time Undergraduate Studies.
- 2.2 A successful applicant shall be admitted to a major programme.

3.0 Fees

- 3.1 The fees payable by students shall be prescribed by the University Council and may be varied from time to time at the University Council's absolute discretion.
- 3.2 All fees shall be payable on date/s specified by the University unless prior permission for deferment is obtained.
- 3.3 A student who has not paid his fees by the specified date/s shall pay a fine until the fees are paid. He shall be considered to have withdrawn from studies at the University if he fails to pay fees after a lapse of two
- 3.4 Caution money shall be payable on first registration as a deposit to make good any outstanding debts to the University incurred in, for example, damages to University and/or college property. This sum less any deductions made for outstanding debts shall be refunded on discontinuation of studies at the University. For graduating students, subject to no claim being outstanding, caution money shall be converted into graduation fee.
- 3.5 Apart from caution money, fees once paid shall not be refunded.

4.0 Registration

4.1 An applicant who has been offered admission to a part-time degree programme shall pay the fees and register in person with the Registry

- on the respective specified date/s and shall be considered to have enrolled in that part-time degree course of study from the date of his first registration.
- A student shall register for courses on the specified date/s in each 4.2 academic year. Anyone who fails to register for courses after a lapse of two weeks from the specified date/s shall be considered to have withdrawn from studies at the University.
- A student who is unable to register for courses on the specified date/s 4.3 must apply for deferment in writing to the Registrar beforehand.
- 4.4 A student shall not be registered simultaneously in another course of study or research leading to the award of a degree, diploma or certificate at this university or any other tertiary institution except by prior permission of the board of the faculty to which he belongs. A student in breach of this regulation shall be required to discontinue his studies at the University.
- A student shall register in the name which appears in his Hong Kong 4.5 Identity Card or passport.
- A student shall inform the Registrar immediately of any change of 4.6 name, address or other particulars entered in the student's registration record.
- 4.7 No application for changing a student's registered particulars shall be accepted after graduation or withdrawal from the University.

5.0 Period of Study

- 5.1 (a) A Secondary 6 entrant* shall register for and attend classes for at least six years (i.e. 18 terms) before graduation save as provided for in Regulation 5.1 (b). He shall complete all requirements for graduation within 10 years from his first registration including any periods of leave of absence and suspension of studies.
 - (b) He may apply for permission to graduate in less than six years, provided that he shall have registered for and attend classes for at least five years (i.e. 15 terms). Such an application shall be submitted at least two terms before the intending final term of
- 5.2 (a) A Secondary 7 entrant* shall register for and attend classes for at least five years (i.e. 15 terms) before graduation save as provided for in Regulation 5.2 (b). He shall complete all requirements for graduation within seven years from his first registration including any periods of leave of absence and suspension of studies.
 - (b) He may apply for permission to graduate in less than five years, provided that he shall have registered for and attend classes for at least four years (i.e. 12 terms). Such an application shall be submitted at least two terms before the intending final term of study.

A Secondary 6 (or 7) entrant means a student who has been admitted to the University after completion of Secondary 6 (or 7) in a school or equivalent qualifications.

- 5.3 A student who satisfies the special entrance requirement of a specific programme and is granted an exemption of 43 units shall register for and attend classes for at least four years (i.e. 12 terms) before graduation. He shall complete all requirements for graduation within seven years from his first registration including any periods of leave of absence and suspension of studies.
- A student who satisfies the special entrance requirement of a specific 5.4 programme and is granted an exemption of 63 units shall register for and attend classes for at least three years (i.e. nine terms) before graduation. He shall complete all requirements for graduation within five years from his first registration including any periods of leave of absence and suspension of studies.
- 5.5 Notwithstanding Regulations 5.1 to 5.4 above, a transfer student or any other student who has been granted course and unit exemptions on the basis of post-secondary qualifications may be permitted to graduate sooner, provided that:
 - (a) he shall have attended this university for at least two years; and
 - (b) his total period of attendance at this university and another university or institution of higher learning recognized by the Senate shall have been not less than three years.

Any application for such permission shall be submitted at least two terms before the intending final term.

- 5.6 A student shall take courses at this university in his final term.
- 5.7 A student who for non-academic reasons has to extend his period of study beyond the minimum number of years (or equivalent number of terms) as prescribed in Regulations 5.1 (a), 5.2 (a), 5.3 or 5.4 shall be required to obtain prior permission.

Course Requirements and Exemptions 6.0

- A Secondary 6 and a Secondary 7 entrant shall complete at least 123 6.1 and 99 units of courses respectively before graduation.
- 6.2 A student who satisfies the special entrance requirement of a specific programme and is granted unit exemption at the time of admission shall complete at least 80 or 60 units of courses before graduation depending on the category under which he is admitted.
- 6.3 Major programme
 - A student shall be required to complete before graduation 60 to 96 units of courses, and meet the minimum grade required for specific courses (if any), as prescribed in the study scheme concerned. A student who satisfies the special entrance requirement of a specific programme and is granted unit exemption at the time of admission shall complete courses as prescribed by his programme.
- 6.4 General education
 - A student shall be required to complete before graduation 12 units of General Education courses as prescribed by the University while a student who satisfies the special entrance requirement of a specific

programme and is granted unit exemption at the time of admission shall be required to complete nine or six units of General Education courses as prescribed by the University depending on the category under which he is admitted.

6.5 General Chinese and General English**

A student shall be required to complete before graduation six units of General Chinese and six units of General English, to be taken during his first two years of attendance. A student who satisfies the special entrance requirement of a specific programme and is granted unit exemption at the time of admission may be required to complete General English and/or General Chinese as prescribed by his programme.

- 6.6 A student who has failed in any required course shall retake that course or take a substitute course prescribed by the programme committee
- 6.7 A student with recognized qualifications may be exempted from some courses and/or units required for graduation according to the procedure prescribed. Subject to the requirements given in Regulations 5.5 and 5.6, no student with such exemptions shall be allowed to graduate unless he shall have:
 - (a) completed at least 60 units of courses at this university; and
 - (b) completed at least two-thirds of his major requirements at this university.

7.0 Course Load

- 7.1 A student shall take no less than three units of courses in any term and no less than 15 units in any year.
- 7.2 A student shall take no more than 27 units of courses in any year.

8.0 **Selection of Courses**

- 8.1 A student shall, after consulting the teacher/s designated by the programme committee concerned and making sure that there is no timetable clash among the courses he wishes to select, complete the prescribed procedure for course registration.
- 8.2 A student shall select his courses according to the study scheme of his programme. He shall be responsible for ensuring the timely completion of all requirements for graduation.
- 8.3 A student shall not repeat any course which he has taken and passed or from which he has been exempted except as required by regulations which prescribe otherwise.

9.0 Course Withdrawals and Additions

9.1 A student who wishes to apply for withdrawal or addition of course/s

^{**} Students admitted in 1994-95 and thereafter are not required to complete General Chinese and General English.

- shall complete the prescribed procedure within two weeks after the beginning of the teaching term.
- 9.2 Only under very special circumstances may a student apply for permission to withdraw from a course or enrol in a new course after the second week of the teaching term. Such applications shall be made on a prescribed form and submitted to the Registrar for consideration by the programme committee concerned.
- 9.3 A student who withdraws from a course without going through the prescribed procedure shall be given a grade of 'F' for the course.

10.0 Class Attendance and Leave of Absence

- 10.1 A student shall attend classes, tests and examinations as required by the teachers of the courses in which he has enrolled.
- 10.2 A student who has been absent for any period shall be responsible for applying to the teacher/s concerned for permission to make up any required work missed.
- 10.3 In case of illness necessitating absence exceeding one week, a student shall obtain permission from the Registrar through written application. Such applications shall be accompanied by a certificate signed by a registered medical practitioner and shall require the endorsement of the programme committee concerned.
- 10.4 A student who wishes to obtain a leave of absence exceeding one week for non-medical reasons shall obtain prior permission from the Registrar through written application. Such applications shall state the reasons for which leave of absence is sought and shall require the endorsement of the programme committee concerned.
- 10.5 Under no circumstances shall a student be granted leave of absence for more than one year in the first instance. In case he is still unable to attend classes after one year's leave, he may apply for extension for another year, beyond which no further extension shall be granted.
- 10.6 A student who, without permission to take leave, has been absent for a continuous period exceeding one month shall be considered to have withdrawn from studies at the University.
- 10.7 A student shall be required to take leave of absence if the condition of his health is considered as constituting a definite hazard to the University community. At the end of the prescribed period of absence, the student shall obtain a certificate of good health as required before he can apply to resume studies.

11.0 Course Assessment and Grades

- 11.1 A student shall be assessed for every course which he has registered for on the basis of his performance in the course. Criteria for assessment may include any one or any combination of the following: attendance, class work, written work, laboratory work, field work, research papers, tests, examinations, and any other criteria.
- 11.2 Course grades, their standards and converted points used in reporting

shall be as follows:

The grade point average of a student's course work shall be computed by dividing the total weighted converted points for courses taken by the total number of units attempted inclusive of courses failed, where the weighted converted points are converted points multiplied by the number of units of the course concerned.

11.3 A student who has gained a grade of 'D' or above in a course shall earn the unit/s of that course. However, the unit/s of a course which a student has passed but is required to repeat shall count only once towards the fulfilment of the number of units for graduation.

12.0 Examinations

- 12.1 A student shall take course examinations, if prescribed by the teacher/s concerned, in the form of written, practical or oral assessment, or any combination thereof.
- 12.2 If a comprehensive examination is prescribed by his programme, a student shall sit for the examination if he is certified by the programme committee concerned as having met the entry requirements, if any. Instead of a comprehensive examination, a graduation thesis or graduation project may be prescribed by his programme, to which regulations governing comprehensive examination shall also apply. where applicable. The grades, standards and converted points used in reporting results of comprehensive examination or graduation thesis/ project shall be the same as those prescribed in Regulation 11.2.

12.3 Absence from examinations

(a) A student who for medical or other compelling reasons is unable to sit for any course examination or the comprehensive examination, shall apply in writing with documentary evidence at the earliest possible moment but not later than 10 days after the

examination concerned to the Registrar for permission for absence. In the case of illness/injury, the application shall be accompanied by a certificate signed by a registered medical practitioner.

- (b) If his application for absence is successful, a student:
 - (i) in case of absence from an examination of any course, may be otherwise assessed at the discretion of the programme committee concerned: and
 - (ii) in case of absence from a comprehensive examination:
 - (1) shall be permitted to sit for the next examination without taking any course in the following term or year provided that he can meet the entry requirements, if any, and in such case he shall be considered for a degree with classification; or
 - (2) may request consideration for the award of an aegrotat degree under Regulation 14.3. If it is decided not to award him an aegrotat degree, he will retain the right to sit for the comprehensive examination as provided for in Regulation 12.3 (b)(ii)(1).
- (c) A student who is absent from any examination without permission shall be given a grade of 'F' in that examination.
- 12.4 A student who fails in the comprehensive examination shall register for courses, if any, as directed by the programme committee concerned in the following term or year, which may require him to retake some courses he has already passed. He shall sit for the comprehensive examination for the second time. A student who fails twice in the examination shall be required to discontinue his studies at the University.

13.0 Academic Probation and Discontinuation of Studies

- 13.1 Academic probation
 - (a) A student shall be put on academic probation if he has obtained a grade point average of below 1.5 in the preceding term unless Regulation 13.2 applies.
 - (b) A student on academic probation may be required to take a reduced load and his performance shall be reviewed at the end of the term in which he is put on probation, at which time if he has obtained a grade point average of 1.5 or above, probation shall be lifted, otherwise probation shall continue to apply in his next term of attendance unless he is required to discontinue his studies as prescribed by Regulation 13.2 or he has completed all graduation requirements as set out in Regulation 14.1.

13.2 Discontinuation of studies

A student shall be required to discontinue his studies at the University:

- (a) if his grade point average in a term is below 1.0 for three consecutive terms of attendance; or
- (b) if he fails in more than half of the units of courses taken in a term for three consecutive terms of attendance; or
- (c) if he still fails to have his probation lifted after he has been put on

- academic probation for two consecutive terms of attendance; or
- (d) if, after two attempts, he still fails to meet the minimum grade required for specific courses (if any) as prescribed by his programme, unless otherwise decided by the board of the faculty to which he belongs; or
- (e) if he fails twice in the comprehensive examination/graduation thesis/graduation project; or
- (f) if he fails to complete all requirements for graduation within ten, seven or five years as defined in Regulations 5.1 (a), 5.2 (a), 5.3 and 5.4.

14.0 Graduation

- 14.1 To be considered for the award of a bachelor's degree, a student shall:
 - (a) have completed all requirements prescribed in Sections 5.0 and
 - (b) have obtained a grade point average of not lower than 1.5 in all major courses taken which are coded 3000 and above (for STOT courses, coded 0300 and above);
 - (c) have passed the comprehensive examination or graduation thesis/ project, if any, as prescribed by the programme concerned; and
 - (d) have obtained a grade point average of not less than 1.0 in his final term.

A student who has satisfied the above requirements shall graduate, unless, in accordance with Regulation 17.0, he is required to terminate his studies at the University or be suspended from the University.

- Notwithstanding Regulation 14.1 (b), a student who has obtained a grade point average of below 1.5 but not less than 1.3 in all major courses taken which are coded 3000 or above (for STOT courses. coded 0300 and above) may be recommended by the Undergraduate Examinations Board for the award of a pass degree, subject to his satisfying all other requirements for graduation.
- 14.3 A student who is granted permission for absence from the comprehensive examination may be recommended by the Undergraduate Examinations Board for the award of an aegrotat degree, provided that he has met all other requirements for graduation. If an aegrotat degree is awarded, its acceptance by a student shall render him ineligible to present himself for any subsequent examination/s for the same bachelor's degree.
- 14.4 Provided that he is not required to discontinue his studies, a student shall register for a further term or year or specific course/s as the case may be, if he fails to meet any of the requirements prescribed in Regulation 14.1.

15.0 Degree Classification

- 15.1 A student who satisfies the conditions for graduation shall be awarded a bachelor's degree with one of the following classifications:
 - (a) First Class Honours

- (b) Second Class Honours Upper Division
- (c) Second Class Honours Lower Division
- (d) Third Class Honours
- (e) Pass
- 15.2 The classification of a student's degree shall be based on the grade point average of major courses coded 3000 and above or 4000 and above (for STOT courses, coded 0300 and above or 0400 and above respectively) as decided by the board of the faculty to which he belongs, grade point average of other courses and result of the comprehensive examination or graduation thesis/project, if any, in accordance with the standards specified by the Senate.
- A bachelor's degree (aegrotat) shall not be classified.

16.0 Transcripts


- 16.1 A student who wishes to apply for transfer or admission to another educational institution or for employment may apply for an official transcript giving details of all courses taken and grades obtained.
- 16.2 The official transcript shall not be issued to a student or any private individual. It shall be sent direct to the institution or prospective employer upon payment of the prescribed fees and postage.

17.0 Disciplinary Action

- 17.1 A student who violates any rule or regulation and/or commits any misconduct such as:
 - (a) defamation of or assault on or battery against the person of any member of the University;
 - (b) wilful damage to or defacement of any property of the University;
 - (c) theft, fraud, misapplication of University funds or property of any
 - (d) plagiarism in written assignments or cheating in tests or examinations:
 - (e) an offence in connection with examinations or violation of any of the regulations of the Senate governing conduct at examinations:
 - (f) falsification or serious misuse of University documents or records;
 - (g) refusal to comply with any regulations or orders by authorized persons and bodies prohibiting any conduct which disrupts teaching, study, research or administration of the University;
 - (h) any conduct which is detrimental to the reputation and well-being of the University:
 - (i) an offence of an immoral, scandalous or disgraceful nature of which the student has been convicted in any court of law; or
 - (j) misrepresentations or false statements made in any application or document submitted to the University;
 - shall be disciplined by the Senate and/or boards of faculties in accordance with the nature and gravity of the offence.
- 17.2 Disciplinary action may take the form of any of the following penalties which may be entered into the transcript of the student's academic

record:

- (a) reprimand;
- (b) suspension from part or all of the rights, privileges and/or the use of part or all of the facilities of the University for a specified period
- (c) demerit (a total of three demerits may result in termination of studies at the University);
- (d) suspension from the University for a specified period of time; or
- (e) termination of studies at the University.
- Penalty (d) or (e) may be imposed only with the approval of the Senate.
- 17.3 A student, on being informed of a decision to take disciplinary action against him, may within seven days write to request the Senate to review the decision.



1.0 Rules and Regulations

All students shall observe all rules and regulations prescribed by the University authorities.

2.0 Admission

- 2.1 Minimum requirements for admission
 - The minimum requirements for admission shall be as follows:
 - (a) For the Doctor of Philosophy, Doctor of Education or Doctor of Music programme, the applicant shall
 - (i) have a master's degree from a recognized university; or
 - (ii) have a bachelor's degree, normally with Second Class Honours in the upper division or above, and have been registered in a course of study for a master's degree at this university for at least one year and have demonstrated research ability; or
 - (iii) have been registered in a course of study for a doctoral degree at a recognized university for at least one year, and have been approved for admission by the Graduate Council; or
 - (iv) have obtained the degrees of MB ChB, or equivalent, or under special circumstances, the degree of bachelor, for admission to programmes of the Faculty of Medicine.
 - (b) For a master's programme other than the Executive Master of Business Administration Programme, the applicant shall have:
 - (i) graduated from a recognized university and obtained a bachelor's degree, normally with honours not lower than second class; or
 - (ii) graduated from an honours programme of a recognized university with a bachelor's degree, normally achieving an average grade of not lower than 'B' in undergraduate courses; or

- (iii) completed a course of study in a tertiary educational institution and obtained professional or similar qualifications equivalent to an honours degree.
- (c) For the Executive MBA programme, the applicant shall have obtained a bachelor's degree or professional qualifications equivalent to a degree.
- (d) For the one-year full-time Postgraduate Diploma in Education Programme, the applicant shall have graduated from a recognized university and obtained a bachelor's degree with a major/minor subject in an area of study within the secondary school curriculum.
- (e) For the two-year part-time Postgraduate Diploma in Education Programme, the applicant shall
 - (i) have graduated from a recognized university and obtained a bachelor's degree with a major/minor subject in an area of study within the secondary school curriculum; and
 - (ii) be an in-service full-time secondary school teacher.
- (f) For the Postgraduate Diploma in Psychology Programme, the applicant shall have graduated from a recognized university and obtained a bachelor's degree.
- (g) For the Postgraduate Diploma in Nursing Programme, the applicant
 - (i) have graduated from a recognized university and obtained a bachelor's degree in nursing or a related subject; and
 - (ii) be registered as a nurse with the Hong Kong Nursing Board.

2.2 Additional requirements

Each graduate division/board may set further requirements, including a subject test or language test, and may also waive such additional requirements in particular cases.

3.0 Fees

- 3.1 The fees prescribed by the University Council shall be payable on dates specified unless prior permission for deferment is obtained.
- A student in arrears shall be subject to fines. A student in arrears for 3.2 more than two weeks shall be considered to have withdrawn from studies.
- 3.3 Caution money shall be payable on first registration as a deposit to make good any outstanding debts to the University. This sum less any deductions made for outstanding debts shall be refunded on discontinuation of studies at the University. For graduating students, subject to no claim being outstanding, caution money shall be converted into graduation fee.

3.4 Apart from caution money, fees once paid shall not be refunded.

4.0 Registration

- An applicant who has been offered admission shall pay the fees and 4.1 register on the respective specified date/s. Thereafter, a student is normally required to register on the specified date/s in each academic year. Anyone who fails to register after a lapse of two weeks from the specified date/s shall be considered to have withdrawn from studies at the University.
- Permission for deferment of registration may be granted on prior 4.2 application in writing to the Office of the Graduate School.
- An applicant who has been offered admission but is prevented by illness 4.3 or other unavoidable cause from registering for an academic year or a teaching term shall apply in writing to the Office of the Graduate School for deferred admission for a period not exceeding one year. Such an application shall be made before the specified date/s for registration. Application for deferred admission on medical grounds must be accompanied by a certificate signed by a registered medical practitioner.
- 4.4 A student shall not be registered simultaneously in another course of study or research leading to the award of a degree, diploma or certificate either at this university or at any other tertiary institution except by prior permission of the board of the faculty to which the student belongs. A student in breach of this regulation shall be required to discontinue studies at the University.
- A student registered for a full-time course of study or research shall not 45 take up any full-time or part-time employment, paid or unpaid, during term time within the normative period of study except by permission of the Graduate Council.
- 4.6 A student shall register in the name which appears in his/her Hong Kong Identity Card or passport.
- A student shall inform the Office of the Graduate School immediately 4.7 of any change of name, address or other particulars entered in the student's registration record.
- No application for changing a student's registered particulars shall be 4.8 accepted after graduation or withdrawal from the University.

5.0 Period of Study

5.1 The period of study for each programme shall be as follows:

- For a student holding a degree of comparable level, the period of study may be shortened by permission of the Graduate Council on the recommendation of the graduate division/board concerned, subject to the statutory minimum of 12 months for master's programmes and 24 months for doctoral programmes.
- In special cases, the Graduate Council may on the recommendation of 5.3 the graduate division/board concerned grant a student extension beyond the maximum period of study.

6.0 Course Requirements and Exemptions

6.1 A student shall take the required number of units in any academic year as specified in the programme of studies concerned.

For a student holding a master's degree in a closely related field, the normative period may be reduced to 24 months.

The normative period may be reduced to 36 months by permission of the Graduate Council on the recommendation of the graduate division/board concerned.

^{***} For part-time MBA students who take the summer term, the normative period may be reduced to two years.

In special circumstances, the maximum period may be five years if so recommended by the head of the graduate division concerned.

6.2 A student who has completed comparable courses may be exempted from some courses and/or units according to the prescribed procedure, but in no case will a student's normative period of study be shortened. except as provided in 5.2 and 13.3.

7.0 Selection of Courses

- 7.1 A student shall complete the prescribed procedure for course registration.
- 7.2 A student shall select courses according to the programme of studies concerned, and shall be responsible for ensuring the timely completion of all programme requirements.

8.0 Course Withdrawals and Additions

- 8.1 A student who wishes to apply for withdrawal or addition of course/s shall complete the prescribed procedure within two weeks after the beginning of the teaching term.
- In very special cases, the head of the graduate division/board concerned 8.2 may, after examining the student's written application, grant permission for withdrawal from a course or addition of a course after the second week of the teaching term.
- 8.3 A student who withdraws from a course without going through the prescribed procedure shall be given a failure grade for the course.

9.0 Residence Requirements

- 9.1 Definition of residence
 - (a) A student is classified as being in residence if he/she is attending courses as prescribed by his/her programme, and in the case of research postgraduate students, also receiving supervision on a regular basis.
 - (b) A student who is in Hong Kong except for absences not exceeding two weeks continuously and not exceeding one month aggregate in any one academic year shall be deemed to be receiving regular supervision, and provided he/she is also attending courses, if required, shall be regarded as in residence.
 - (c) A student who is not in Hong Kong shall normally be deemed to be not receiving supervision, and shall be regarded as not being in residence. In cases where the student would nevertheless receive adequate supervision on a regular basis while away from Hong Kong, or where the absence from Hong Kong is related to an academic purpose, an application should be made beforehand to the Graduate School, with the endorsement of the supervisor and the head of the graduate division/board concerned, to regard the student as being in residence during that period of absence.
 - (d) A student may also be regarded as being in residence while away

from Hong Kong if the programme of studies approved by the Graduate Council and the Senate so provides.

9.2 Residence requirements

- (a) Except for periods of approved leave, and except as provided in 9.2(b) and (c), all students are required to be in residence during their period of study.
- (b) Students registered in taught programmes (MA, MArch, MBA, MClinPharm, MDiv, MEd, MNurs, MPH, MSc, MSSc, MSW, PGDE, DipPsy, DipNurs) are not required to be in residence between teaching terms.
- (c) Residence requirements may be waived for part-time students for up to six months in any academic year, upon the written approval of the supervisor and the head of the graduate division/board concerned.

10.0 Leave of Absence

- 10.1 In case of illness necessitating absence exceeding three weeks, a student shall submit an application for sick leave to the Office of the Graduate School together with a certificate signed or countersigned by the Director of the University Health Service in the case of a full-time student, or signed by a registered medical practitioner and countersigned by the Director of the University Health Service in the case of a part-time student.
- 10.2 A student who wishes to obtain a leave of absence for more than three weeks for non-medical reasons shall apply in writing to the Office of the Graduate School beforehand, stating the reasons for which leave of absence is sought. Such applications shall be subject to the approval of the dean of the Graduate School.
- 10.3 Leave of absence is limited to a maximum of one year in the first instance, and any extension is limited to a maximum of one more year, beyond which no further extension will be granted.
- 10.4 A student who has been absent without leave or who is in breach of the residence requirements for a continuous period exceeding one month shall be considered as having withdrawn from studies at the University.
- 10.5 A student whose health is considered by the Director of the University Health Service as constituting a hazard to the University community shall be required to take leave of absence. At the end of the prescribed period of absence, the student shall obtain a certificate of good health signed or countersigned by the Director of the University Health Service in the case of a full-time student, or signed by a registered medical practitioner and countersigned by the Director of the University Health Service in the case of a part-time student, before applying to resume studies.

- 10.6 A student who has been absent for any period shall be responsible for applying to the teacher/s concerned for permission to make up for any required work missed.
- 10.7 Unless otherwise stipulated by the Rules for Postgraduate Diploma in Education Programmes, the above regulations shall normally apply.

11.0 Examinations

- 11.1 Examinations in the form of written, practical or oral tests, or continuous assessment, or any combination thereof, shall be held at times to be determined by the graduate division/board concerned.
- 11.2 A student who for medical or other compelling reasons is unable to sit for any examination or any part thereof shall apply in writing to the Office of the Graduate School for withdrawal from the examination or any part thereof. The Office of the Graduate School will determine in consultation with the graduate division/board concerned what followup action is required. Application for such withdrawal for medical reasons shall be accompanied by a medical certificate signed or countersigned by the Director of the University Health Service. A student who is absent from an examination for non-medical reasons without prior application for withdrawal shall be considered as failing in that examination.

12.0 Grades

- 12.1 A student's performance shall be assessed on the basis of any or all of the following:
 - Class work, written work, laboratory performance, field work, research papers, assignments, tests and examinations and any other method of academic assessment.
- 12.2 Course grades, their standards and converted points used in reporting shall be as follows:

13.0 Unsatisfactory Performance

- 13.1 A student shall be required to withdraw from the programme:
 - (a) if the cumulative average of the courses taken is 1.0 or below, or
 - (b) if there are failure grades in two courses or more, or
 - (c) if additional requirements laid down for the programme by the graduate division/board concerned are not satisfied.
- 13.2 If at any time the supervisor is of the opinion that a student is not making satisfactory progress or is unlikely to attain the standard required for the degree, and the assessment is endorsed by the head of the graduate division/board concerned and by the Graduate Council, the student shall be required to discontinue studies in the Graduate School.
- 13.3 A student required to withdraw from a programme of study may repeat the whole programme in special circumstances if permission is granted by the Graduate Council on the recommendation of the graduate division/board concerned. He/she may also apply to the Graduate Council for exemption from courses previously completed and/or shortening the period of study.
- 13.4 A student receiving a failure grade in a required course must repeat the course or take an approved substitute course.
- 13.5 A student whose thesis/portfolio is found not up to the required standard by the Thesis/Assessment Committee shall be required to re-write and re-submit the thesis/portfolio to the satisfaction of the thesis/assessment committee before being recommended for the award of a degree. Such re-submission/s must be made within 12 months from the date of the official notification of the result of the first examination and within the prescribed maximum period of study.

14.0 Transcripts

- 14.1 A student who wishes to apply for transfer or admission to another educational institution or for employment may apply for an official transcript giving details of all courses taken and examination results.
- 14.2 The official transcript shall not be issued to a student or any private individual. It shall be sent direct to the institution or prospective employer upon payment of the prescribed fees and postage.

15.0 Disciplinary Action

- 15.1 The University may take disciplinary action against a student who violates any rule or regulation prescribed by the University authorities, and/or commits any misconduct such as:
 - (a) defamation of or assault on or battery against the person of any member of the University;
 - (b) wilful damage to or defacement of any property of the University;

- (c) theft, fraud, misapplication of University funds or property of any
- (d) plagiarism in written assignments or cheating in quizzes, tests or examinations;
- (e) an offence in connection with degree, diploma, or certificate examinations, including violation of any of the regulations of the Senate governing conduct at examinations and unauthorized access to examination papers prior to the conduct of examination;
- (f) falsification or serious misuse of University documents or records:
- (g) refusal to comply with any regulations or orders by authorized persons and bodies prohibiting any conduct which disrupts teaching. study, research or administration of the University;
- (h) any conduct which is detrimental to the reputation and well-being of the University;
- (i) an offence of immoral, scandalous or disgraceful nature of which the student has been convicted in any court of law; or
- (j) misrepresentations or false statements made in any application or document submitted to the University.
- 15.2 Disciplinary action may take the form of any of the following penalties in accordance with the nature and gravity of the offence:
 - (a) reprimand;
 - (b) suspension from part or all of the rights, privileges and/or the use of part or all of the facilities of the University for a specified period of time;
 - (c) demerit (a total of three demerits would result in termination of studies at the University);
 - (d) suspension from the University for a specified period of time; or
 - (e) termination of studies at the University.
 - Penalty (d) or (e) may be imposed only with the approval of the Senate.
- 15.3 A student, on being informed of a decision on disciplinary action, may within seven days write to request the Senate to review the decision.
- 15.4 Penalties on a student may be entered into the transcript of academic record.

ENERAL Rules for **Postgraduate** Studies Leading to the Degrees of Doctor of Philosophy Doctor of Education and Doctor of Music

1.0 General

These rules should be read together with the General Regulations Governing Postgraduate Studies.

2.0 Supervision

- 2.1 A student shall be assigned a supervisor as soon as possible by the graduate division/board concerned.
- 2.2 The student shall meet the supervisor at regular intervals.
- 2.3 The supervisor shall
 - (i) advise the student on the fulfilment of programme requirements;
 - (ii) ensure that an appropriate research topic is chosen by the student;
 - (iii) advise the student on the preparation of the thesis/portfolio.
- If at any time the supervisor is of the opinion that a student is not making satisfactory progress or unlikely to attain the standard required for the degree, the student may be advised to transfer to a course of study for a master's degree as provided in Rule 4.1. The student may also be required to discontinue studies in the Graduate School in accordance with 13.2 of the General Regulations.

3.0 Candidature for PhD, EdD or DMus Degree

- Advancement to PhD, EdD or DMus candidature is conditional upon the successful completion of the following:
 - (i) Study of a language other than Chinese and English where deemed necessary by the graduate division/board concerned;
 - (ii) Course work of varying scope deemed necessary by the graduate division/board concerned for the partial fulfilment of degree requirements; and
 - (iii) An examination, if required by the graduate division/board concerned.

These requirements must be satisfied within a maximum length of time

after the initial date of registration as specified in the programme of studies or as decided by the graduate division/board concerned, depending on the length of postgraduate training previously received by the student and the nature of the discipline.

4.0 Transfer of Candidature

- A student who has been registered in a course of study for a PhD, EdD 4.1 or DMus degree may, on the recommendation of the graduate division/ board concerned, and with the approval of the Graduate Council, be transferred to a course of study for a master's degree provided that such a transfer takes place before the thesis or portfolio is submitted.
- A student who has been registered in a course of study for a master's 4.2 degree and has completed the first year of studies may be permitted, on the recommendation of the graduate division/board concerned and with the approval of the Graduate Council, to transfer to a course for a PhD, EdD or DMus degree provided that the student meets the admission requirements.
- A student who has been registered for a master's degree and who 4.3 subsequently becomes a student for a PhD, EdD or DMus degree in the same field of study shall date the period of study from the date of commencement of master's studies.

5.0 Thesis

- After admission to PhD or EdD candidature, the candidate shall submit 5.1 for examination a thesis embodying the results of his/her research, which shall substantially be an original contribution to the knowledge of the subject concerned.
- The exact title of the thesis must have prior approval of the head/ 5.2 convener of the graduate division/board concerned. The thesis shall be submitted in such form as prescribed by the Graduate School.
- 5.3 A thesis may be submitted at any time after admission to candidature. Notice of intention to submit a thesis, embodying the title, shall be given to the dean of the Graduate School.
- In non-science subjects, the length of the thesis shall normally not exceed 150,000 characters in Chinese or 100,000 words in English, while in science subjects, it shall normally not exceed 75,000 characters in Chinese or 50,000 words in English.
- 5.5 A thesis may not be submitted for which a degree has previously been conferred on the same candidate by this or any other university; but part of a previous study may be incorporated for a thesis covering a related field.
- The candidate shall indicate in a written declaration how far the thesis embodies the result of original research and to what extent it depends on the work of others or on his/her previous work submitted in partial fulfilment of the requirements for a degree.
- If, on the recommendation of the thesis committee provided in Rule 7.1, a candidate is required to submit a revised thesis, such re-

submission/s must be made within 12 months from the date of the official notification of the result of the first examination and within the prescribed maximum period of study.

6.0 Portfolio

- 61 After admission to DMus candidature, the candidate shall submit for examination a portfolio of musical works completed after the date of first registration.
- If, on the recommendation of the assessment committee provided in 6.2 Rule 7.1, a candidate is required to submit a revised portfolio, such resubmission/s must be made within 12 months from the date of the official notification of the result of the first examination and within the prescribed maximum period of study.

7.0 Thesis/Assessment Committee

- For the assessment of a candidate's thesis or portfolio, there shall be a thesis/assessment committee chaired by the division head concerned (or his/her representative), and composed of at least three internal examiners, including the supervisor and the division head (or his/her representative), and one external examiner to be nominated by the graduate division/board concerned. For the assessment of the thesis or portfolio of a part-time PhD, EdD or DMus candidate who is a fulltime staff member of this university of the rank of assistant lecturer or above, the thesis/assessment committee shall include two external examiners. Where it is impracticable for the external examiner to be present at the oral examination, an additional external examiner who can attend shall be appointed.
- Members of the thesis/assessment committee shall each make a separate written report on the merits of the thesis or portfolio and the grounds upon which the candidate is or is not recommended for the degree.

8.0 Conduct of Examination

- The eligibility of a candidate for the conferment of the PhD, EdD or DMus degree shall be assessed by the thesis/assessment committee on the basis of:
 - (i) a thesis or portfolio,
 - (ii) an oral examination, and
 - (iii) a written examination, if prescribed by the graduate division/board concerned.
- 8.2 The oral examination and written examination, if any, on the thesis or portfolio shall be conducted at such place and time as the graduate division/board concerned may direct. Normally, such an examination shall be held within four months after the submission of the thesis or portfolio.
- 8.3 The oral examination and written examination, if any, may cover not only the subject matter of the candidate's thesis or portfolio but also the knowledge in related fields deemed essential to the field of

- specialization.
- 8.4 If the thesis or portfolio is considered adequate and of an acceptable standard but the candidate fails in the oral or written examination held in connection therewith, the thesis/assessment committee may recommend another oral or written examination within a period not exceeding 12 months. A candidate who fails a re-examination shall not be eligible for any further examination.
- If the thesis or portfolio is found to be of sufficient standard, yet needing 8.5 minor revisions, the thesis/assessment committee, if satisfied with the results of the oral/written examinations taken by the candidate, may require that such revisions be satisfactorily carried out by the candidate within 12 months without requiring re-examinations.
- If the thesis/assessment committee finds a candidate's thesis or portfolio 8.6 to be poor in quality or the examination results unsatisfactory, it may recommend that the candidature be discontinued.

9.0 Results of Examination

- On the recommendation of the thesis/assessment committee and the 9.1 graduate division/board concerned, the Graduate Council may
 - (i) recommend that the PhD, EdD or DMus degree be conferred on a candidate:
 - (ii) request the thesis/assessment committee to further advise the Graduate Council;
 - (iii) appoint additional examiners to settle cases in dispute;
 - (iv) require a candidate to revise the thesis or portfolio for reexamination:
 - (v) recommend that the PhD, EdD or DMus degree be not awarded; or
 - (vi) recommend that an MPhil or MMus degree be awarded instead.
- 9.2 Each candidate shall be notified of the results of the examination after the approval of the Senate.



MD 1.0 General

- The general conditions governing the conferment of the MD degree shall be as stipulated in Sections 8 and 10 of Statute 26 of the University Ordinance, which read:
 - 8. Save as provided in paragraphs 10 and 11, the degree of Doctor of Literature, Doctor of Science, Doctor of Social Science, Doctor of Business Administration or Doctor of Medicine shall not be conferred upon any person unless
 - (a) he shall be a graduate of the University of not less than seven years' standing; and
 - (b) he shall have made, in the opinion of the examiners, a sustained contribution of distinction to the advancement of his subject.
 - 10. The Senate may recommend the award of the degree of master or doctor in any faculty to any member of the academic staff of the University and for this purpose may exempt any such person from any of the requirements prescribed for the conferment of the degree other than the examination therefor.
- There shall be an MD Sub-Committee consisting of the chairmen of the Department of Medicine and the Department of Surgery, the Director of Medical Education, and the chairmen of the curriculum and examinations sub-committees in the Faculty of Medicine as ex officio members, two other members appointed by the Faculty Board of Medicine, and a representative of the Graduate Council.

MD 2.0 Admission to Candidature

- An applicant seeking admission to MD candidature shall either:
 - (a) have held the degree of Bachelor of Medicine and Bachelor of Surgery of The Chinese University of Hong Kong for at least three years; or
 - (b) (i) have held for at least three years the degree of Bachelor of Medicine and Bachelor of Surgery or a degree or other qualification of another recognized university or institution,

- and have been qualified as a medical practitioner recognized by the Hong Kong Medical Council; and
- (ii) have had at least three years' continuous standing as a staff member of a recognized institution, including at least one year as a full-time or part-time member of the academic staff in one of the departments of the Faculty of Medicine of this university. Honorary academic appointments shall not normally be considered as full-time or part-time members of the academic staff for this purpose except in special cases based on strong recommendations from heads of the departments concerned and approval of the Faculty Board of Medicine of this university.
- Only in very special circumstances and with the approval of the Senate on the strength of the evidence of acceptable research experience shall admission be granted to an applicant under Rule 2.1 (a) and (b) with less than three years' standing after graduation.
- The applicant must submit satisfactory evidence of his postgraduate training and appropriate experience in the field of study proposed to the MD Sub-Committee at the time of application for admission.

MD 3.0 Registration

- 3.1 A successful applicant shall be permitted to register forthwith. Registration shall include the payment of fees prescribed by the University.
- 3.2 A candidate shall be required to submit his thesis not later than at the end of five calendar years from his date of first registration.

MD 4.0 Thesis

- Normally the MD candidate shall, at least three months prior to the submission of his thesis, submit to the MD Sub-Committee a title and a précis of the thesis for approval by the Graduate Council. After the title of the thesis has been approved, it may not be changed except with the approval of the Graduate Council.
- The candidate shall produce evidence to satisfy the Graduate Council and the MD Sub-Committee that he has been engaged in practice and/ or research in a manner appropriate to the subject matter of the thesis submitted.
- 4.3 Each candidate must submit four copies of a thesis, including the original, all properly type-written or printed or copied and bound in a form approved by the Graduate Council.
- 4.4 The candidate shall not be permitted to submit a thesis which has previously been submitted to this or any other university for a degree conferred on him.
- The candidate must indicate in a written declaration how far the thesis embodies the result of his own research and to what extent he has availed himself of the work of others.

MD 5.0 Conduct of Thesis Examination

- The thesis shall be examined by a board of examiners nominated by the MD Sub-Committee through the faculty board for approval by the Senate. Two members, who are not members of the University, of the board of examiners shall be external examiners appointed by the University on the recommendation of the faculty board.
- 5.2 The candidate may be subjected to an oral examination on the subject matter of his thesis.
- 5.3 The board of examiners may require the re-submission of a thesis with corrections or additional work.
- 5.4 If the board of examiners finds a candidate's thesis and/or performance at the oral examination to be unsatisfactory, it may recommend that the candidature be discontinued.

MD 6.0 Conferment of Degree

- On the recommendation of the board of examiners and the MD Sub-Committee, the Graduate Council may
 - (i) recommend to the Senate that the MD degree be conferred on a candidate:
 - (ii) request the board of examiners and the MD Sub-Committee to further advise the Graduate Council; or
 - (iii) recommend that the MD degree be not awarded.
- 6.2 Each candidate shall be notified of the results of the thesis examination after the approval of the Senate.

equlations for the Degree of Doctor of Science

DSc 1.0 Conditions for Award of Degree

The degree of Doctor of Science (DSc) may be awarded for an original and distinguished contribution which adds substantially to knowledge or understanding of any branch of science. A candidate shall produce evidence from published work that he has made such a contribution.

DSc 2.0 Conditions for Admission to Candidature

- A candidate for the degree shall be either:
 - (a) a graduate of this university of at least seven years' standing; or
 - (b) as provided in paragraph 10 of Statute 26 of the University Ordinance, a graduate of another approved university of at least seven years' standing who has been a full-time member of the academic staff of this university for at least three years.

DSc 3.0 Application for Admission to Candidature

- Having satisfied the conditions as laid down in Regulation 2, a potential candidate shall apply to the Graduate School for admission to candidature. Such application may be made at any time during the academic year.
- An applicant shall be required to pay an application fee as prescribed by the University and to present:
 - (a) a statement of his degrees and of other qualifications and research experience, so to establish his eligibility under Regulation 2;
 - (b) three copies of the published papers and/or books which he proposes to present for the degree;
 - (c) a written statement on how far the work embodies the result of his own research and, if necessary, to what extent he has availed himself of the work of others in case of joint authorship or work done in collaboration with others

- 3.3 Works for which a degree or other equivalent academic qualifications has/have been awarded, or works which are under consideration by another institution for the award of a degree or equivalent academic qualification shall not be accepted under 3.2(b). They may, however, be submitted as supporting documents if necessary, to illustrate the development of the candidate's career in research. In such a case, precise indications of their previous use must be given.
- 3.4 Upon the applicant's completion of the above procedures, the dean of the Graduate School, in consultation with the dean of the faculty concerned, shall nominate two to three members from within and/or outside the University for appointment by the vice-chancellor to form a perusal committee to advise whether admission to candidature shall be granted.
- 3.5 If all the members of the perusal committee are against admission, the applicant shall be so informed by the Graduate School and be advised that he may seek admission again after a minimum period of two years from the date of submission of application.
- If at least one member of the perusal committee recommends admission 3.6 of the applicant, candidature shall be granted. In such case where the opinion of the perusal committee is not unanimous, the applicant shall be so informed and be given a chance to withdraw his application.

DSc 4.0 Registration

An applicant who has been recommended for admission to candidature shall be permitted to register forthwith. Registration shall include the payment of an examination fee as prescribed by the University.

DSc 5.0 Presentation of Publications for Examination

Within six months after registration, a candidate shall submit four copies of the published work that he proposes to present for the degree in a form approved by the Graduate Council.

DSc 6.0 Conduct of Examination

- The work submitted by the candidate shall be examined by a board of examiners whose membership shall have been nominated by the dean of the Graduate School in consultation with the dean of the faculty and the division head/s concerned for endorsement by the Graduate Council, and approval by the Senate.
- The board of examiners shall comprise three scholars of repute in the 6.2 field. At least two shall be external examiners, persons who are not members of the University.
- 6.3 Having read the publications, the examiners shall report individually to the dean of the Graduate School on the merit of the work as a contribution to learning, and recommend as follows:
 - (a) submitted work justifies award of the degree; or
 - (b) submitted work would justify award of the degree after a written amplification on certain specified aspects of the work has been

- submitted to the satisfaction of the examiners; or
- (c) submitted work does not justify award of the degree.

DSc 7.0 Results of Examination


- If the examiners are unanimously in support of the award of the degree, the Graduate Council shall recommend to the Senate that the degree of Doctor of Science be conferred. The candidate shall be informed by the Graduate School after approval for the award of the degree has been granted by the Senate.
- 7.2 If at least one of the examiners is against the award of the degree, the candidate shall be considered unsuccessful. The Graduate School shall report accordingly to the Graduate Council and shall then inform the candidate.

DSc 8.0 Second Attempt

8.1 A candidate whose work has not been considered by the board of examiners as worthy of the degree may apply for admission to candidature again after a minimum of three years following the date on which he was notified of the result by the Graduate School. If he should fail in the second attempt, he may not offer himself again for the degree.

DSc 9.0 Deposition of Publications

Two copies of the work presented under Regulation 5.1 by a candidate who is awarded the degree shall be deposited at the University Library for circulation and archival purposes. One copy of the work shall be retained by each division concerned.



(Not applicable to students of the MBChB Programme and the Theology Division)

(For programmes jointly offered by different departments, the term 'department' in the regulations refers to the committee concerned.)

1.0 Rules and Regulations

Associate, auditing and associate research students shall observe rules and regulations prescribed by the University authorities.

2.0 Admission and Application

2.1 Associate and associate research students under the Office of International Studies Programmes (OISP)

Overseas students are normally admitted to the International Asian Studies Programme (IASP) to study for OISP administered courses not leading to a degree of the University. These courses are open to qualified students of any nationality who have sufficient command of either Chinese or English to benefit from the programme. Applicants should currently be enrolled in or have graduated from an accredited college or university. Exchange students are accepted in accordance with exchange agreements.

(a) Associate students

This category includes undergraduate students who have completed at least two terms of university studies and postgraduate applicants with a bachelor's degree or equivalent. Students should have obtained a grade point average (GPA) of at least 3.0 on a 4.0 scale (B average or better). Applicants from institutions not using the GPA system will be assessed on their overall academic performance.

An associate student shall pursue an approved course of study not leading to a degree or a diploma of the University, and shall receive an academic report on the course/s he has taken.

(b) Associate research students

This category comprises students enrolled in a postgraduate degree programme at another university and who come to the University to undertake research for or write their master's theses or doctoral dissertations.

2.2 Associate and auditing students of full-time undergraduate programmes 2.2.1 Associate students

- (a) An applicant whose educational standard is considered adequate by the department and the board of the faculty concerned may be admitted as an associate student to pursue an approved course of study not leading to a degree of the University.
- (b) Application for admission as an associate student shall be supported by a certified true copy of academic record and made to the Registrar by a specified date.
- (c) An associate student shall receive an academic report on the course/s he has taken.

2.2.2 Auditing students

- (a) An applicant whose educational standard is considered adequate by the department and the board of the faculty concerned may be admitted as an auditing student.
- (b) Application for admission as an auditing student shall normally be made to the Registrar by a specified date.
- (c) An auditing student shall not receive any grade or other academic recognition for the course/s taken.

2.3 Auditing students of part-time undergraduate programmes

- 2.3.1 An applicant whose educational standard is considered adequate by the programme concerned and the Senate Committee on Parttime Degree Programmes may be admitted as an auditing student.
- 2.3.2 Application for admission as an auditing student shall normally be made to the Registrar by a specified date.
- 2.3.3 An auditing student shall not receive any grade or other academic recognition for the course/s taken.

2.4 Associate and auditing students of postgraduate programmes

2.4.1 Associate students

- (a) An applicant whose educational standard is considered adequate by the graduate division concerned may be admitted upon the approval of the Council of the Graduate School as an associate student to pursue an approved course of advanced study or research not leading to a certificate, diploma or higher degree of the University.
- (b) Normally, application for admission as an associate student shall be supported by a certified true copy of academic record and made to the Office of the Graduate School via the graduate division concerned by a specified date.

2.4.2 Auditing students

- (a) An applicant whose educational standard is considered adequate by the graduate division concerned may be admitted as an auditing student.
- (b) Normally, application for admission as an auditing student shall be made to the Office of the Graduate School via the graduate division concerned by a specified date.
- (c) An auditing student shall not receive any grade or other academic recognition for the courses taken.

3.0 Fees

- 3.1 The fees payable by students shall be prescribed by the University Council and may be varied from time to time at the University Council's absolute discretion.
- 3.2 All fees shall be payable on date/s specified by the University unless prior permission for deferment is obtained.
- A student who has not paid his fees by the specified date/s shall pay a 3.3 fine until the fees are paid. He shall be considered to have withdrawn from studies at the University if he fails to pay fees after a lapse of two
- 3.4 Caution money shall be payable on first registration as a deposit to make good any outstanding debts to the University incurred in, for example, damages to University and/or college property. This sum less any deductions made for outstanding debts shall be refunded on discontinuation of studies at the University.
- Apart from caution money, fees once paid shall not be refunded. 3.5

4.0 Registration

- An applicant who has been offered admission to an approved course of study or research shall pay the fees and register in person with the Registry/Office concerned on the respective specified date/s and shall be considered to have enrolled in the approved courses of study or research from the date of his first registration.
- 4.2 A student shall register for courses on the specified date/s in each academic year. Anyone who fails to register for courses after a lapse of two weeks from the specified date/s shall be considered to have withdrawn from studies at the University.
- 4.3 A student who is unable to register for courses on the specified date/s must apply for deferment in writing to the Registrar/office concerned.
- 44 A student registered for a full-time course of study or research shall not take up any full-time employment, paid or unpaid, during term time.
- No student shall be allowed to change his status to that of a candidate 4.5 for a certificate, diploma, degree or higher degree of the University unless he has already satisfied the University's requirements for admission to an approved course of study or research leading to a certificate, diploma, degree or higher degree of the University and unless the change of status is specially recommended by the department/ programme/graduate division concerned and approved by the Senate.
- 4.6 A student shall register in the name which appears on his Hong Kong Identity Card or passport.
- A student shall inform the Registrar/office concerned immediately of 4.7 any change of name, address or other particulars entered in the student's registration record.
- 4.8 No application for changing a student's registered particulars shall be accepted after departure from the University.

5.0 Course Load

Undergraduate associate students shall normally take a full load of 12-5.1

- 18 units (credits) of courses in any term except with prior permission of the department/programme/graduate division concerned. However, no student shall be allowed to take more than 21 units in any term.
- 5.2 Associate research students under OISP usually establish a consultative relationship with one or more faculty members who will supervise their work on the theses or dissertations. In total, they may take up to 10 units of courses each term (including language courses). In some cases special language courses (reduced units) can be arranged so that a student can take a combination of language and non-language courses. Any postgraduate student who takes a total course load per term of more than 10 units will be considered an associate student for the purposes of fees and academic requirements.
- 5.3 Associate students of postgraduate programmes shall take the courses as specified by the graduate division concerned.
- 5.4 Auditing students shall take the courses as approved by the department/ programme/graduate division concerned.

6.0 Selection of Courses

(not applicable to auditing students)

- A student shall, after consulting the teacher/s designated by the department/programme/graduate division concerned or by OISP and making sure that there is no time-table clash among the courses he wishes to select, complete the prescribed procedure for course registration.
- 6.2 A student shall select his courses according to the study scheme of his programme of study.

7.0 Course Withdrawals and Additions

(not applicable to auditing students)

- A student who wishes to apply for withdrawal or addition of course/s shall complete the prescribed procedure within two weeks after the beginning of the teaching term.
- 7.2 Only under very special circumstances may a student apply for permission to withdraw from a course or enrol in a new course after the second week of the teaching term. Such applications shall be made on a prescribed form and submitted to the Registrar or OISP for consideration by the department/programme/graduate division concerned or Director of OISP.
- 7.3 A student who withdraws from a course without going through the prescribed procedure shall be given a grade of 'F' for the course.

8.0 Class Attendance and Leave of Absence

(not applicable to auditing students)

- 8.1 A student shall attend classes, tests and examinations as required by the teachers of the courses in which he has enrolled.
- 8.2 A student who has been absent for any period shall be responsible for applying to the teacher/s concerned for permission to make up for any required work missed.

- In case of illness necessitating absence exceeding one week, a student shall obtain permission from the Registrar/office concerned through written application. Such applications shall be accompanied by a certificate signed by a registered medical practitioner and shall require the endorsement of the department/programme/graduate division concerned.
- A student who wishes to obtain a leave of absence exceeding one week for non-medical reasons shall obtain prior permission from the Registrar/ Office concerned through written application. Such applications shall state the reasons for which leave of absence is sought and shall require the endorsement of the department/programme/graduate division concerned.
- 8.5 A student who, without permission to take leave, has been absent for a continuous period exceeding one month shall be considered to have withdrawn from studies at the University.
- 8.6 A student shall be required to take leave of absence if the condition of his health is considered as constituting a definite hazard to the University community. At the end of the prescribed period of absence, the student shall obtain a certificate of good health as required before he can apply to resume classes.

9.0 Course Assessment and Grades

(not applicable to auditing students)

- 9.1 A student shall be assessed for every course he has registered for on the basis of his performance in the course. Criteria for assessment may include any one or any combination of the following: attendance, class work, written work, laboratory work, field work, research papers, tests, examinations, and any other criteria.
- 9.2 Course grades, their standards and converted points used in reporting shall be as follows:
 - (a) For undergraduate courses:

The grade point average of a student's course work shall be computed by dividing the total weighted converted points for courses taken by the total number of units attempted inclusive of courses failed, where the weighted converted points are converted points multiplied by the number of units of the course concerned.

- Notwithstanding Regulation 9.2 above, an OISP student taking a course 9.3 offered by the New Asia Yale-in-China Chinese Language Centre may within two weeks after the beginning of the teaching term, apply to the New Asia Yale-in-China Chinese Language Centre to have his assessment result in that course reported on a pass/fail basis. The course grade for a student who has taken this option will be either 'pass (PA)' or 'fail (FA)', and will not be included in the calculation of the grade point average.
- A student who has gained a 'pass' or above in a course shall earn the 9.4 unit/s of that course.

10.0 Examinations

(not applicable to auditing students)

- 10.1 Course examinations
 - A student shall take course examinations, if prescribed by the teacher/s concerned, in the form of written, practical or oral assessment, or any combination thereof.
- 10.2 Absence from course examinations
 - 10.2.1 A student who for medical or other compelling reasons is unable to sit for any course examination, shall apply in writing with documentary evidence at the earliest possible moment but not later than ten days after the examination concerned to the Registrar/office concerned for permission for absence. In the case of illness/injury, the application shall be accompanied by a certificate signed by a registered medical practitioner.

- 10.2.2 (a) A student who is absent from course examination/s and whose application for absence is successful may be otherwise assessed at the discretion of the department/ programme/graduate division concerned.
 - (b) A student who is absent from any examination without permission shall be given a grade of 'F' for that examination.

11.0 Transcripts

(not applicable to auditing students)

- 11.1 A student may apply for an official transcript giving details of all courses taken and grades obtained.
- 11.2 The official transcript shall not be issued to a student or any private individual. It shall be sent direct to an institution or a prospective employer upon payment of the prescribed fees and postage.

12.0 Disciplinary Action

- 12.1 A student who violates any rule or regulation and/or commits any misconduct such as:
 - (a) defamation of or assault on or battery against the person of any member of the University:
 - (b) wilful damage to or defacement of any property of the University:
 - (c) theft, fraud, misapplication of University funds or property of any
 - (d) plagiarism in written assignments or cheating in tests or examinations:
 - (e) an offence in connection with examinations or violation of any of the regulations of the Senate governing conduct at examinations;
 - (f) falsification or serious misuse of University documents or records;
 - (g) refusal to comply with any regulations or orders by authorized persons and bodies prohibiting any conduct which disrupts teaching, study, research or administration of the University;
 - (h) any conduct which is detrimental to the reputation and well-being of the University;
 - (i) an offence of an immoral, scandalous or disgraceful nature of which the student has been convicted in any court of law; or
 - (j) misrepresentations or false statements made in any application or document submitted to the University;
 - shall be disciplined by the Senate, Council of the Graduate School, the board of faculty and/or college assembly of fellows concerned in accordance with the nature and gravity of the offence.
- 12.2 Such disciplinary action may take the form of any of the following penalties which may be entered into the transcript of the student's academic record:
 - (a) reprimand;
 - (b) suspension from part or all of the rights, privileges and/or the use of part or all of the facilities of the University for a specified period of time:

- (c) demerit (a total of three demerits may result in termination of studies at the University);
- (d) suspension from the University for a specified period of time; or
- (e) termination of studies at the University.
- Penalty (d) or (e) may be imposed only with the approval of the Senate.
- 12.3 A student, on being informed of a decision to take disciplinary action against him, may within seven days write to request the Senate to review the decision.



The University Library System consists of the University Library in the L central area of the campus and the branch libraries at the colleges and at the teaching hospital. The University Library houses an extensive research collection as well as many undergraduate materials and the pre-clinical portion of the medical collection. The branch libraries contain reference and curricular materials, some special subject collections according to the needs of the colleges, and books and periodicals to support general education. Library regulations apply to all the libraries. The Senate Committee on the University Library System reserves the right to revise these regulations at any time.

Details about opening hours are posted at the entrance to each library. Opening hours are adapted to the semester schedules.

Library Privileges

Library privileges are personal and individual. They may not be transferred to, or used on behalf of, other persons.

Privileges fall into three categories:

1. **Borrowing**

Borrowing privileges are extended to all registered students and academic/administrative staff of The Chinese University of Hong Kong.

Others may apply to the University Librarian for special Borrowers' Cards. Clerical staff, technicians and spouses of the faculty and administrative staff of the University may also apply to the University Librarian for borrowing privileges.

2. Reading

The privilege of reading is extended to visiting scholars, to researchers and to graduates of this university according to established regulations. Reserve books, however, are for the exclusive use of students and faculty of the University.

3. The use of special facilities

Carrels: not reserved for any category of library user; they are available for the convenience of all.

Study rooms in the University Library: on application to the

University Librarian, faculty members and PhD students may reserve a room for one month. The reservation is renewable once if continued use of the room is justifiable. These study rooms may not be transferred to another person.

Seminar rooms in the University Library: upon application to the University Librarian, a user may reserve a seminar room for a lecture or meeting or for a series of lectures which would benefit from the use of library materials and resources.

Photocopying: photocopying machines are available in all libraries. A reader may obtain at cost photocopies of materials, provided there is no infringement of copyright.

Interlibrary loans: the Interlibrary Loan Librarian will attempt to obtain from other libraries books and other materials which are not owned by the University Library System and which cannot be readily purchased.

Admission to the Libraries

Every user of the libraries must show a University Identification Card, or a Reader's Card at the entrance of the library. Applications for Borrowers' Cards and Readers' Cards are made at the Circulation Desk.

The loss of a Borrower's Card must be reported to the Library immediately; a duplicate card may be issued two weeks after the loss is reported. Only one duplicate will be granted within a semester. Change of address should also be reported to the Library as soon as possible.

Borrowing Regulations

Borrower Categories

CUHK Library users are grouped into the following groups:

- Registered students of The Chinese University of Hong Kong (including undergraduate students, graduate students and exchanged students).
- 2. Staff members of Terms A, B and C who have valid borrowers' cards issued by the University Librarian.
- Others: spouses of staff members, alumni, visiting scholars and readers 3. approved by the University Librarian.

Borrowing Limits

The borrowing limits for different categories of users are as follows:

- Category 1. Undergraduate students: 15 volumes for 14 days
- Category 2. Postgraduate students: 30 volumes for 30 days
- Category 3. Research assistants: 30 volumes for 30 days
- Category 4. Faculty members: 50 volumes for 60 days
- Category 5. Administrative staff (Terms A): 30 volumes for 60 days
- Category 6. General non-teaching staff (Terms B): 10 volumes for 14 days
- Category 7. Staff members of Terms C: 3 volumes for 14 days
- Category 8. Spouses members: 3 volumes for 14 days
- Category 9. Others: according to special arrangement

(Maximum limit of 15 volumes and maximum loan period of 30 days at the Li Ping Medical Library)

Categories 2 to 5 may charge out periodicals. Bound periodicals may be borrowed for three days. Current and single issues may be borrowed for one day only.

All books taken from the book stacks must be charged at the Circulation Desk. Reserve books must be charged at the Reserve Books Desk: there are varying borrowing limits on these books.

Books obtained from interlibrary loan are borrowed through the courtesy of other libraries and their restrictions as to loan period and renewal are therefore observed. Usually the loan period is two weeks. Photocopies of periodical articles may be obtained at cost.

Reference books, rare books and microfilms do not circulate.

Renewals

Borrowers may renew loans for two additional periods. Renewals must be made on or before the last date of the initial loan period. Otherwise, overdue fines will be charged.

Members of categories 4 and 5 listed above may renew loans in writing. After two renewals, however, the book must be returned to the library shelves so that it may be available to others.

No book may be renewed if it is required by another person.

Recall

When needed by other users, circulating books and journals are subject to recall at any time. In the recall notices, a new due date will be given, i.e. 14 days after the date of the notice.

Borrowers should respond to a recall promptly. Late returns will be fined [see Fines (b)].

Overdue

The responsibility of returning books on time lies with the borrower. When the loan period expires, an overdue notice is sent to all categories of borrowers.

Fines

- (a) Overdue — All categories of borrowers who keep books/items beyond the loan period are subject to a fine of HK\$1.00 per item per day up to a maximum of HK\$100.00. A fine of HK\$1.00 per hour will be charged for each reserve book overdue.
- (b) Recall — The fines for not responding to recalls for all categories of borrowers are as follows:
 - HK\$5.00 per item per day
 - five working days after issuing of second recall: the library could take any appropriate action to retrieve the items.

Losses

Borrowers who fail to return books or who return books damaged beyond repair will be charged the cost of replacement in addition to the processing cost of HK\$100.00 and any accumulated fines. Damaged books and marked pages should be reported at the Circulation Desk as soon as noticed.

Categories 4 and 5 borrowers who fail to return or renew books after

120 days and three recalls will be subject to the above charges, which will be sent to the Bursar's Office for collection.

Control Counter

Bags and briefcases may be brought into the libraries whereas umbrellas should be deposited on entering the libraries. No food or beverages may be taken into the library. On a user's leaving the library, all his books, etc., may be inspected.


Loss of Privileges

Infractions, such as smoking, shouting, use of mobile phones, pagers and other disturbances, are forbidden in all parts of the libraries. The librarian or an appointed deputy may expel from the library building for the remainder of the day any person who is acting to annoy others or who is damaging books or other property. Payment must be made to cover all damages.

A gross breach of the regulations may subject the borrower to a loss of library privileges.

- Overdue books After normal recall procedures, a written warning will be sent. If this is ignored, borrowing privileges will be withheld in all the libraries until the return of the book(s) and the payment of accrued
- (b) Payment of charges If a person refuses to pay any outstanding charges (fines, replacement costs of damaged books or repair of damaged property), all the libraries will withhold his borrowing privileges until the account is cleared.
- In case of materials which have not been charged out properly at the Circulation Counter:
 - 1. The user's name will be recorded in the library's register;
 - 2. The user's borrowing privilege will be suspended for eight weeks from the day of violation;
 - 3. Compensation for the damage of the item if necessary;
 - 4. For the student, a letter to this effect will be issued by the library to the faculty dean, college dean of students, and department chair to which the student belongs, and/or authority concerned.
- Unreturned Library Materials (d)
 - 1. The user's name will be recorded in the library's register;
 - 2. An invoice will be sent to the user with the warning that his borrowing privilege will be suspended if the books are not returned or the account is not settled.

Repeated offenses may lead to a total loss of the privilege of using the libraries.






