New Impetus to Cancer Treatment and Research

The Hong Kong Cancer Institute of The Chinese University of Hong Kong held an inauguration ceremony for its two new centres, the Sir Yue-kong Pao Centre for Cancer and the Lady Pao Children's Cancer Centre, at the Prince of Wales Hospital on 16th February.

Established with a HK\$120 million donation from Dr. and Mrs. Peter Woo, the two centres house the world's most advanced magnetic resonance imaging machine which enables accurate localization of tumours, a confocal laser scanning microscope which can reveal the internal workings of living cells, a karyotyping machine which can detect damaged

chromosomes responsible for the development of some cancers, a special dispensary for cancer drug preparation, a paediatric cancer centre for young patients, and a day chemotherapy clinic. It is also hoped that the centres will serve as a base for public education and multidisciplinary research.

On the same day, following the inauguration of the new cancer centres, cancer specialists from the United States, the UK, the Netherlands, Australia, China, and Malaysia met their local counterparts in a symposium entitled 'Cancer into the 21st Century', organized by the Hong Kong Cancer Institute.

Over 15 papers were delivered at the symposium among which 10 were by overseas speakers who shared their latest research findings and experience in cancer treatment with local specialists and discussed the future directions in cancer research. Two of the speakers, Drs. Richard A. Rifkind and Frederick Becker, had served as advisers to the US president on medical research related to cancer.

In his opening speech, Prof. Philip Johnson, director of the Hong Kong Cancer Institute, underscored the University's commitment to battle Hong Kong's number one killer disease, and outlined the resources available at the new cancer centres.

On the morning of 17th February, local cancer specialists and scientific advisers to the Hong Kong Cancer Institute attended a series of workshops on topics ranging from breast cancer, nasopharyngeal carcinoma, soft tissue and bone sarcoma to liver cancer. Consensus reports were then presented in the second-floor lecture theatre of the Prince of Wales Hospital.

With state-of-the-art facilities and through continuous exchange of expertise with world-class medical personnel, the Hong Kong Cancer Institute aspires to become the territory's centre of excellence in cancer treatment and research.

Introducing Graduate Programmes in Engineering



The University's Faculty of Engineering held an open day last month to promote its graduate programmes.

On the morning of 11th February, over 100 people visited the newly built Ho Sin-Hang Engineering Building, which houses some of Southeast Asia's most advanced laboratories in telecommunications, electronics, and computer science. During an academic briefing held in the fifth-floor auditorium, representatives of various departments in the faculty answered questions ranging from application procedures to research expertise. Visitors were also able to talk to teachers and graduate students, and watch demonstrations of major research facilities.

The Faculty of Engineering currently offers M.Sc., M.Phil. and Ph.D. programmes in computer science, electronic engineering, information engineering, mechanical and automation engineering, and systems engineering and engineering management. Its areas of research include artificial intelligence, parallel and distributed systems, electronic devices and materials, image and signal processing, robotics, engineering management, and information systems.

31 Receive Long Service Awards

The 1994-95 Long Service Award presentation ceremony took place on 18th February at the University Guest House. Vice-Chancellor Charles Kao officiated at the ceremony held in honour of 31 award recipients (see list on the right), each of whom had served the University for at least 25 years.

Awardees on terms of service (A) were introduced to attending guests by Mr. Yeung Chung-kee, chairman of the Teachers' Association; those on terms of service (B) and (C) were introduced by Mr. Winston Y. S. Kan, chairman of the Staff Association. The vice-chancellor thanked the honorees for their dedication to the University and presented to them certificates acknowledging their loyal service. Those on terms of service (A) also received an 18-carat gold pin with the CUHK logo; honorees on terms of service (B) and (C) could choose either a HK\$4,000-cash prize or a gold pin and HK\$2,100.

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From the Deputy Registrar Origin of the Joint Admission Scheme

The idea of a centralized admissions scheme for tertiary institutions was first brought up by the Education Commission in its Report No. 2 published in August 1986, but it was not until September 1990 that the six degree-granting institutions funded by the UPGC launched a joint scheme, known as the Joint University and Polytechnic Admissions System (JUPAS), for processing applications for admission to undergraduate programmes. The main objectives of the scheme were (and have continued to be) to enable the institutions to run their admission exercise in a well coordinated manner, to allow students to make well-informed choices of institutions/ programmes, and to make the admission procedure simple for both institutions and students. Since at that time the institutions had different entry points and durations for undergraduate studies, the JUPAS operated on a two-year cycle and on the basis of a common decision point of admission for both institutions and students. Students applied for admission when they started their Secondary 6 year and were informed of the results of their applications at the end of Secondary 6. The successful applicants could then choose to accept firm offers and enter The Chinese University immediately or take up conditional offers for admission to the six institutions after Secondary 7. Applicants also had the flexibility of not accepting offers made to them so as to remain eligible for consideration by institutions/programmes which still had vacancies.

Revision of the Scheme and the New JUPAS

Following the introduction of

Advanced Supplementary Level subjects in the Hong Kong Advanced Level Examination from 1994 and The Chinese University's decision to admit students only after Secondary 7 in the same year, the JUPAS Board of Management undertook a major review of the JUPAS operation in 1991. The Board was of the view that because of the flexibility offered to applicants, the conditional offer approach had created serious uncertainty over intake targets and involved

too much guess-work on the part of both institutions and applicants; it was also too complex and not cost-effective. The Board therefore proposed a revised system (new JUPAS) which was based on the *iterative* model. The new JUPAS was accepted by the institutions for implementation with effect from the 1994 entry.

The JUPAS Exercise in 1993-94 (for 1994 entry)

The new JUPAS exercise for 1994 entry operated on a one-year cycle, and began in September 1993 when Secondary 7 students and private candidates were invited to submit applications. Appli-

cants were allowed to enter up to 20 study programmes which had to be placed in order of preference. They were also permitted to change their programme choices and/or the preference order of the programmes at any time until 15th June 1994. Individual institutions/programmes considered the applicants based on their own criteria, and in the case of The Chinese University, the selection criteria included the applicants' results in the Hong Kong Certificate of Education Examination and the Hong Kong Advanced Level Examination, and their school principals' reports. For those programmes which conducted admission interviews, applicants' performance at the interview was also taken into account. After the selection exercise, a list of applicants who were considered worthy of admission was drawn up in order of merit (ranking) for each programme. The applicant's 20 programme choices in order of preference were then matched against the applicant's merit rankings in these programmes in a computer *iteration process*, and the applicant was offered the highest of his preferences (*best offer*) for which his merit ranking made him eligible. *Main round offers* were then made to 11,867 successful applicants (47.2 per cent of the total) in early August 1994, and were accepted by 11,716 applicants. Joint University and Polytechnic Admissions System (JUPAS)

The exercise for selecting JUPAS applicants for entry in 1995 will soon begin. Mr. S.W. Lee of the Admissions Section, who has witnessed the launching of this joint admission scheme in 1990-91 and its subsequent revision leading to the implementation of a new JUPAS procedure in 1993-94, takes the opportunity to write on the scheme and explain how the new JUPAS procedure worked last year.

was the result of the JUPAS policy that applicants who did not take up the offer would not be further considered, and the fact that each successful applicant was already given the best offer. Places that could not be filled in the main round, together with those not taken up by successful applicants, were later filled by the institutions/programmes in the clearing round.

Some Observations on the 1993-94 Exercise

Although the new JUPAS was run for the first time in 1993-94, the operation was considered to be smooth and the system proved to be much more effective and much simpler than the old one. More than 91 per cent of the seven institutions' places were filled in early August, with only a negligibly small number of drop-outs later. The institutions had never been able to achieve this in the past.

Owing to a shortage of applicants, the places in certain disciplines, like the physical sciences and engineering, could not be completely filled in the main round. This was a territory-wide phenomenon and was believed to be the result of an insufficient supply of school leavers from the science

stream and/or a switch of students' interest from science and engineering disciplines to business and the humanities.

It was also observed that some applicants did not seem to understand the 'best offer' system of the new JUPAS and did not select and rank their programmes according to their genuine interests. As a result, they ended up receiving offers which they did not really like and which they had no alternative but to accept.

Targets for 1995

Applications for 1995 entry were invited from 1st September to 1st November 1994. A total of 27,923 applications were received, out of which 24,000 odd were submitted by school applicants. 196 programmes offered by the seven institutions are covered in the

JUPAS and 13,866 places are available, implying that one in every two applicants will have the opportunity of pursuing undergraduate studies in 1995-96. Among the institutions, The Chinese University offers the largest number of places and has received the largest number of 'Band A' (i.e. first, second and third choice) applications.

With the experience gained in last year's exercise, both applicants and faculty members of the institutions would now have a better understanding of the new JUPAS procedure. It is therefore expected that this year's JUPAS operations can be even more effectively and smoothly completed. As there is some increase in the number of applicants this year, it is also likely that the institutions will find it easier to achieve their 1995 admission targets.

The CUHK team came second after the City University of Hong Kong in the sixth Hong Kong Chemistry Olympiad jointly organized by the Hong Kong Chemical Society and the Royal Society of Chemistry. The annual function aims at promoting interest in chemistry among university students.

This year the olympiad took place on 21st January in the Hong Kong Science Museum.

CUHK team members were chemistry majors Cressida Ng Ching-yan, Ha Man-leung and Ho Suk-che. Their advisers were Dr. Kevin W. P. Leung and Dr. Raymond W. M. Kwok.

United Workshop Addresses Sex Issues

United College held its annual workshop on 10th February from 10.00 a.m. to 12.45 p.m. in Lecture Theatre C1. Panel speakers included Dr. Cheung Chan-fai from the Department of Philosophy, Dr. Eliza W.Y. Lee from the Department of Government and Public Administration, Ms. Cecilia Wong, local writer, and Mr.

Wong Kui-hung, dean of students of United College. They expounded their views on the subject of campus sex.

The panel presentation was followed by a heated discussion among participants on related themes such as the relationship between the two sexes and sexual harrassment.

Marriage of Academic Intent

The University recently signed a student exchange agreement with Simon Fraser University of Canada—the latest of many such agreements over the years. Other recently signed agreements include those with York University of Canada, Yonsei University of Korea, and various institutions in Japan. In bringing these cultural and academic exchanges to fruition, and in promoting educational quality and academic freedom, the work of the Office of Academic Links (OAL) is indispensable.


Set up in 1991, the OAL's role is to coordinate more effectively the academic links programmes in individual academic units, to negotiate with interested institutions outside the University and introduce them to interested parties within. Mr. Mark L. Sheldon, head of the OAL since its inception, said the trend for the last five years has been the closing of bilateral or consortial agreements at both the undergraduate and postgraduate levels, as opposed to oneway arrangements in the past which only allowed for incoming students. Mr. Sheldon attributes the change to a realization among the University community of the benefits of exchange.

Areas of Significant Development

According to Mr. Sheldon, one of the most rapid areas of expansion has been exchanges with Japanese universities effected by the Department of Japanese Studies. Previously a Japanese language section, it acquired full department status in 1991. The University currently has over a dozen agreements with renowned Japanese institutions, such as Sophia University, Nanzan University and Osaka International University.

Groundwork for the Japanese liaison was laid by the colleges which have had modest one-to-one exchanges with Japanese universities for many years, for example, Chung Chi with International Christian University, and New Asia with Asia University. In comparison, the exchanges brought about by the Department of Japanese Studies are far more extensive, involving a considerably larger number of students. In fact, all students majoring in Japanese studies at the University have now to spend at least a full academic year in Japan. Due to existing college-level exchanges and developments in the Department of Japanese Studies, Japanese students are now the second largest non-local student group at CUHK, after the Americans.

Another country high on the OAL agenda is Korea. Mr. Sheldon said the agreement with Yonsei University, one of the best private universities in Seoul, is only part of a broader initiative to begin Korean studies at the University. A proposal developed by Prof. John Jamieson, visiting professor of Asian Studies and director of the New Asia Yale-in-China Chinese Language Centre, and endorsed by the vice-chancellor,



Now in its fourth year, the Office of Academic Links (OAL) has been acting as a go-between for individual academic units and eligible potential partners for exchange all over the world. In a recent interview, OAL director Mark Sheldon describes the trends of the trade and how these interacademic and intercultural unions benefit those involved.

Prof. Charles Kao, has already been submitted to the Korean Foundation to organize library and student exchanges, seminars and research activities, in the hope of arousing local interest in Korean culture.

Benefit to Students

When asked how students can benefit from these exchange programmes, Mr. Sheldon said that since careers — academic, business, or otherwise — are international these days, their career prospects are greatly enhanced by international experience. Improved language abilities, heightened cultural sensibility and simply an added 'international dimension' in their résumés all make them compelling candidates for job opportunities. Besides, Mr. Sheldon said he noticed that students returning from abroad are more mature, independent, self-confident and assertive than they were before leaving. 'When you see students like that, you're convinced that it's worth it.'

On the other hand, attracted by the dynamism and importance of China as a growing economic area, students from all disciplines with specific Chinese-related or Asian studies interests are coming to CUHK. In order to give these students more exposure to local life and customs, the Office of International Studies Programmes (OISP) organizes many extracurricular activities, tutorial programmes and host-family activities for them. International students are also given local roommates as far as possible.

'Asian-Surname Students'

Mr. Sheldon said that for the last five to ten years, there has been a growing number of what he terms 'Asian-surname students' coming to CUHK. This is an interestingly diverse group consisting of American-born-Chinese, Canadian-born-Chinese, recent immigrants to the west from Taiwan, South China, Hong

Kong and other Asian countries, students originally from refugee camps in Hong Kong who are relocated to a third country, and so on. 'Very often they're cultural sojourners who've lived at the intersections of cultures, and it makes them sometimes very confused and sometimes very highly motivated, because they're finding some things out about themselves they weren't aware of.'

Mr. Sheldon said their reasons for coming are just as varied. Some want to

International Students Tend to Stay On

Another pronounced trend in recent years is for international students to look for jobs in Hong Kong or Asia due to the robust job market of the region. Mr. Sheldon said the bilingual ability of these students, their on-the-ground experience as well as their professional training make them attractive to companies and organizations

around here. Currently there are 60 to 70 alumni of the programme working in Hong Kong, with others working in Tokyo, Bangkok, Singapore, Shanghai, Shenzhen, Beijing etc.

Graduate Exchange

At the graduate level, the OAL runs two programmes: one with the University of Toronto and another, an endowed programme with the Center for Chinese Studies at the University of Hawaii at Manoa. Mr. Sheldon said that whereas in the past, all international students were undergraduates, there are now a large number of graduate students with highly developed research interests and often with a fellowship of some kind, such as a Fulbright grant, a Rotary grant or a Watson fellowship. According to Mr. Sheldon, these students are attracted by the good research facilities at the University, and




seek their roots: others simply want to be in an Asian environment; and yet others want to learn a Chinese dialect which they may be able to speak at home but can't read or write. Of the current international student population at CUHK, almost two-thirds are 'Asian-surname students', with students of Chinese descent being the majority.

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in some years, almost a third of the total non-local student population are graduate students.

Staff Exchange

The OAL administers a number of staff-level bilateral exchange programmes through the British Council, in addition to ad hoc arrangements for conferences or short-term research visits and modest exchanges with Japanese universities. Mr. Sheldon said the tripartite arrangements initiated by the British Council bring together CUHK staff and their counterparts in Britain and China on specific projects. The most active of those at present are in the Faculty of Medicine where staff from all three places conjoin over the use of a piece of equipment or a kind of surgery.

Besides, the University has had several Fulbright placements over the years. Arranged through the United States Information Service, these placements enable American academics to teach in tertiary institutions in Hong Kong. A current Fulbright scholar at the University is Prof. Clyde Haulman, honorary lecturer in the Department of Economics and associate director of the Hong Kong-America Center.

On the Asian front, the OAL runs a programme through the Association of South East Asian Institutions of Higher Learning (ASAHIL). Funded by various foundations and airline companies, ASAHIL subsidizes academic staff exchanges among its members — Thailand, Indonesia, Brunei, Singapore, Malaysia, the Philippines, and Hong Kong. Mr. Sheldon said that the University's participation in this is, however, infrequent.

Future Plans

The OAL is hoping to expand the present volume of exchange by four or five new agreements a year. Although his office receives far more requests for exchanges from abroad than they can accommodate, Mr. Sheldon said the fulfillment of their goal still depends largely on whether they can find ideal partners among the candidates for proposal to the departments or colleges, and then whether these departments or colleges find their proposals worth adopting. Not unlike a matchmaker, Mr. Sheldon's job concerns the first and foremost in every relationship - introduction. 'Often once I do that, I step out of the way. I could not do all these things with the small office we have,' he says modestly.

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
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Hong Kong Institute of Asia-Pacific Studies New Research Monograph

Traffic Enforcement on Campus

From the Security Unit:

Under the Road Traffic (Parking on Private Roads) Regulations, Cap.374, which took effect on 1st July 1989, the University is empowered as a private road owner to restrict access and parking, and to impound, remove or dispose of offending vehicles in accordance with conditions stipulated by legislation.

A 'private road' is different from a 'road within private property': the latter is not a 'road' within the Road Traffic Ordinance but the former is; the latter does not come under the jurisdiction or power of control of the police but the former does, although the control of access and parking is vested with its owner. In the University, the officers of the Security Unit are authorized by the Administrative Affairs Committee to control and impound vehicles in accordance with administrative procedures endorsed by

the Committee on Security.

A copy of the University's traffic regulations and a list of the general conditions for staff vehicle registration are issued to all University road users and parking label holders. A notice containing campus and traffic regulations is posted at both entrances to the University. A warning against possible impounding and removal is also included in the declaration forms issued to visitors prior to entering the campus.

The current priorities for traffic control and parking enforcement on campus are:

(a) To tackle serious obstruction

Any obstruction of thoroughfares, junctions, bus-stops, carpark and building entrances, fire-escape routes, utility stations, LP gas and dangerous goods stores, etc. will result in immediate impounding without warning.

(b) To clear 'No Parking' zones

Parking in zones with yellow lines designating no stopping, no waiting or no parking will also result in impounding. Normally drivers can find carparks or areas where parking will be tolerated near such 'No Parking' zones.

(c) To punish inappropriate parking in 'designated' places

Cars parked in places designated for other vehicles may also be impounded, but normally this is done upon receiving complaints from authorized users.

(d) To warn offenders

Violators of traffic regulations are normally warned before actions are taken; the law also prohibits discriminatory treatment against outsiders.

The Security Unit wishes to appeal to all road users on the campus to observe University traffic regulations.

The CUHK Convocation, a statutory body with all graduates of the University as its members, will organize a round-the-campus walkathon in conjunction with the Community Chest of Hong Kong on Sunday, 26th March to raise funds for auditorium facilities for the Department of Music, as well as for the Children's Cancer Foundation of the Prince of Wales Hospital and the Community Chest of Hong Kong.


ACU Looking for New Secretary General

Jointly organized by the Nanjing Museum and the CUHK Art Gallery, the exhibition 'Qing Imperial Porcelain of the Kangxi, Yongzheng and Qianlong Reigns' will feature products of imperial kilns of these three reigns of the Qing Dynasty.

Originally from imperial collections at the Fengtian and Rehe Palaces of the Qing imperial household, the exhibits include famille rose and enamelled wares, monochromes as well as reproductions of Song classical wares, and range from daily utensils to decorative items of monumental size. Their exquisite artistry reflects the high standard of ceramics manufactured in early Qing.

校園交通管制措施簡介

中大校園的交通措施,乃根據由一九八九 年七月一日起生效之《道路交通法私家路規 則)制定,校園內之泊車限制、處理棄置車輛 及扣押違例停泊車輛等措施,均符合《私家路 規則》條文。

私家路與一般道路相同,均受警方管制。 私家路與私有土地上之道路不同之處,在於前 者爲公開予公眾人士使用,任何人士皆可進 入,惟須遵守各項泊車及停車規定;後者則爲 私人擁有,須經業主邀請或准許方可進入。同 時,前者設有符合道路交通法例所訂明規格之 街燈及交通標誌,後者則未必如是。

大學保安組現行之鎖車及拖車等交通管制 政策及措施,悉經大學保安委員會制訂,並獲 行政事務委員會認可執行。

同人與學生申請本校「車輛登記證」時, 申請表格均附列本校交通條例及教職員專用停 車場使用規則,詳載違例事項及罰則,亦申明 大學當局有權處置違例停泊之車輛

所有進入校園之人士,無論其身分是否爲 大學員生,皆受法律保障及規限;在執行私家 路法例時,須公正無私,不能只針對校外人 現時保安組執行交通管制之緩急次序爲

- (一)防止嚴重阻塞——例如阻塞大路、路 口、巴士站、停車場出入口、樓宇出入口,以 及特殊地點(如防火通道、電力站、石油氣站 與危險品倉等)。
- (二)監察黃線區——黃線區設於常有車輛 違例停泊之處。校方在該等區域附近除設有合 法指定車位外,尚有可容忍之非法泊車位置。 而黃線之作用,是警惕駕駛者於該處泊車乃屬 違法,兼不能獲寬大處理。
- (三)管制違反泊車指示車輛-車位預留作特別用途或供某類特定車輛使用, 其他人士違反指定用途時,得受鎖車及拖車管 制。通常情况下,保安組在接獲投訴後,方執 行此項管制。
- (四)警告違例者——法規之執行,本無須 事先警告,因假定人人知法,否則法無以行。 通常在非嚴重阻塞情況下,保安組均會以口頭 或書面警告違例人士。

尚希校內員生留意上述措施,並經常與保 安組合作,保障校園的交通安全。

香港中文大學出版事務處出版

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新構思

爲配合大學的長期發展,建築處往 往需要預早規劃各項大型建設。今年一 月,校方向大學教育資助委員會呈交九 六至九七年度的校園擴建計劃,審核結 果最快於年底才可得知。究竟這份最新 的校園擴建計劃有些甚麼項目呢?本刊 率先訪問建築處主任陳尹璇先生,爲同 人作出介紹。須鄭重聲明者,所有項目 乃初步構思,待政府原則上同意各項計 劃並撥款作可行性研究後,校方才會詳 紐籌劃有關細節。

自動電梯上山 紓緩交通問題

除了乘搭校巴,學生及教職員如何 能更快捷方便地往來校園各處?建築處 經過初步研究,決定借鑑中環至半山區 的行人自動電梯系統,建議裝設兩組有 蓋的上行自動電梯,首段連接崇基教堂 側之小徑與何善衡工程學大樓對開的崇 基路,次段由前者往神學樓後山的小路 延伸至范克廉樓停車場(圖一),而連駁 的多節平路和梯楷,都擬加設上蓋,以 **免行人受風吹雨打及烈日暴曬之苦。他**



們由崇基教學樓步行及乘自動電梯到達 何善衡工程學大樓後,可乘升降機經行 人天橋通往校本部,穿過科學館北座可 再轉乘新科學大樓(預計後年落成)的升 降機直抵新亞校園。他們又可繞過神學 樓乘自動電梯至范克廉樓停車場,再轉 往馮景禧樓、梁銶琚樓及逸夫書院等地 點。整個自動電梯及有蓋行人路計劃約 需經費四千萬港元。

本科生及醫科學生新宿舍

陳尹璇先生表示,爲達至最低限度 有四成本科生入住宿舍的目標,校方已 向大學教育資助委員會申請撥款一億六 千五百萬元,用以興建三幢各容納三百 名本科生的宿舍,興建地點則有多處可 供選擇。

此外,醫學院醫科生收生人數不斷 增加,威爾斯親王醫院的何善衡夫人醫 科生宿舍現時只有一百四十多個宿位, 將不足以應付日後需要。故此,大學要 求於現有宿舍旁擴建,以增加一百個宿 位,整項工程費用約爲一千六百五十萬 元。

工程學大樓第二期

校方計劃在何善衡工程學大樓附 近,毗鄰崇基教職員宿舍D座或神學院 後山之平台, 興建另一幢工程學教學大 樓,建築費需一億零三百萬元。何善衡 工程學大樓前年秋季才啓用,爲何這麼 快又需增建? 陳先生解釋說: 「大學教 育資助委員會批准的首期工程學大樓計 劃,主要是提供設施予電子計算學、電 子工程學、訊息工程學及系統工程與工 程管理學四個學系。可是,工程學院發 展迅速,現已增設機械與自動化工程學 系及多項碩士和博士課程,地方已不敷 應用,所以需要增建新教學樓。」


崇基校園康樂中心

校方亦建議於崇基校園增建師生康樂 中心。新中心將設有飯堂和各種活動室, 供學生及教職員使用,建築費用預計爲九 千萬元。至於地點,則有兩個選擇,一是 **双志堂與牟路思怡圖書館之間的空地**,二 是聯誼會與池旁路之間的窪地。

幾重關卡

大學教育資助委員會將於短期內審 核各項目的撥款申請,估計最快也要於 今年年底才有結果。不過,就算委員會 支持中大提出的基建項目,有關撥款仍 須涌過政府財務科一關。大學教育資助 委員會的經費來自財務科,該科負責分 配公帑支出,會視社會整體需要的優先 次序而決定撥款與否,即使他們同意撥 款,數目亦可能與中大所要求的金額有 出入。

要是財務科也同意悉數撥款而其建 議獲立法局通過,大學才可著手籌備各 項計劃的細節如設計、依法定程序申請 審批圖則、招標興建等等。若一切順 利,各該建設工程最快也要在九八年年 底才陸續完成,供同人使用。



如果其中一個撥款或申請環節出現 阻滯,計劃便會延遲,甚或被擱置。

其他項目另謀經費

大學除倚賴政府劃撥經費外,一直 積極尋求額外資源,如私人捐贈和銀行 貸款,以資助大型基建。

資深教職員宿舍

校方已草擬初步計劃,向銀行申請 貸款,興建兩幢十二層高的資深教職員 宿舍,紓緩宿舍荒的情況。新宿舍擬建 於第十一苑以南的山坡上(圖二),合共 有七十二個單位,三房單位面積爲一千 六百廿二平方呎,兩房的爲一千一百三 十平方呎; 兩者數量比例爲二比一。要 是銀行批准貸款,可望於本年底動工興 建,九七年底落成。


研究生宿舍

本校研究生人數近年急增達二千 餘,現有宿位極度不足。校方亦擬向銀 行貸款,在大學運動場北端(即貯物房一 至五號)與建研究院宿舍樓群,約設四百 五十間單人房,房內有簡單盥洗設備, 另每八間房可共用一洗手間及浴室。該 樓群會有四個導師單位及兩個舍監單 位。至於動土日期,可能較資深教職員 宿舍的遲。

特定用途大樓

校方又委出一專責工作小組,研究 在大學火車站附近兩塊空地上興建特定 用途的大樓和設施。第一期發展的樓字 擬供工商管理學院、亞太工商研究所、 校外進修學院和其他管理課程使用。至 於該計劃的經費來源(捐款或其他財務安 排),正諮詢校董的意見。

香港癌症研究新里程

本校香港癌症研究所上月中爲全港 首間癌症醫療研究中心舉行正式啓用儀 式,並舉辦癌症國際研討會。

港督夫人林穎彤於二月十六日主持 「包玉剛爵士癌症中心暨包黃秀英女士 兒童癌症中心」的啓用禮。該中心位於 威爾斯親王醫院,樓高七層,設施獨 特,包括特設的癌症藥物配藥間,成人 日間化學療法病房、兒童病房、隔離 室、骨髓移植部等。

該中心由本校一群癌症專家於九一 年倡議成立,獲吳光正博士伉儷慷慨捐 資一億二千萬港元興建。香港癌症研究 所所長兼該中心首任總監莊立信教授表 示,中心設置最先進儀器,包括可準確 探測腫瘤位置的核磁共振掃描機、可分 析癌細胞結構的激光聚焦顯微鏡、可探 測引致若干癌症的受損染色體之染色體 分析儀等。該中心又會提供心理輔導服 務,在癌症醫療、研究和教育方面三管 齊下,全面照顧病人。

此外,「邁向廿一世紀的癌症研 究」國際會議亦於啓用儀式後連續兩天 舉行,十位來自美國、英國、荷蘭、澳

> 洲、中國和馬來西亞顯赫有名的腫 瘤學家,連同本校癌症專家,探討 癌症研究的新動向,並發表最新研 究成果。除乳癌、鼻咽癌、肝癌、 軟組織及骨癌等專題外,與會者亦 論及荷爾蒙藥物、抑癌基因治療、 中國現代癌症化療、癌症醫學教育 等課題。
